Jon Bishop Head Coach

Bishop takes over at Fayette

The Fayette Falcons enter 2018-19 high school basketball with a new head coach, but it's one who both the basketball program and the community are familiar with.

Jon Bishop, formerly the head coach of the Higbee Tigers, has taken over the program after eight seasons at Higbee. Fayette's former head coach, Ben Pallardy, accepted a head coach position at Eldon after the conclusion of the 2017-18 season. He had a 63-66 record after five seasons at Fayette.

Bishop has lived in Fayette over the past several years, and is familiar with both the program and the community. Higbee has been a regular on Favette's basketball schedule. The two teams meet again this season on Dec. 6 at Higbee.

"I've been able to watch some of them grow up and play and compete," Bishop said about his new basketball players. "That was one of the nice reasons about transferring and coming over here and having the opportunity. I've gotten to know them over the summer. We had a good summer. We had a lot

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of participation. We had a leadership role after Dawlot of guys that came out. Being new, you have a lot of new faces showing up, the guvs that just kind of want to test it out and give it a shot with a new coach and a new program."

Bishop said his team will do a lot of things similar to what they did under Pallardy. Over the past five seasons, the Falcons were playing a style of basketball that featured a fast tempo on offense paired with stingy pressure on defense. The Falcons will do things similar to that this season.

One thing that will be different this season is that Favette fans won't see the "No. 10" they watched on the court the last four years. Blake Dawson, who finished his varsity career with more than 1,500 points and was the go-to scoring option for the Falcons, has graduated.

However, the Falcons will have plenty of options to which to refer for offensive production. Sophomore Kyle Schleeter, who played his way into the starting lineup as a freshman, is back. The same goes for senior Vince Roberts, who finds himself in a

son's departure. Junior Cale Polson emerged last season as a reliable scorer, and showed he could be dangerous both in the paint and behind the perimeter.

Dawson averaged 21 points per game last season. Having so many scorers on the team this season puts Favette in a fortunate position. Rather than finding a way to "replace" Dawson's production, they have the pieces to "recreate" that production. What's even more dangerous is that this recreating comes from multiple contributors.

"You work hard every day in practice to really find a niche for somebody," Bishop said. "We have guys that are capable of scoring. I'll be truthful, I think we have four guys that are capable of doing that. Obviously, with four of them, it's going to be tough to get one of them 20 points per game. But, I think with that dynamic, of course Kyle averaged about 11-and-a-half or so, and Vince was about 10. We have weapons, and we're going to use them as

New head coach brings 'enthusiasm' to Lady Falcons

The Fayette Lady Falcons enter the 2018-19 basketball season in what is unfortunately a familiar spot. They have a new head coach, making this the fourth head coach of the program over the last five years.

Jeff Martin held the position the past two seasons. The Lady Falcons won 15 games over those two seasons. Martin has retired, and now Valerie Kimball takes over as the head coach of the program.

Kimball was once the head coach of the Keytesville junior high girls basketball program. This is her first time coaching high school basketball. She is approaching this first season with enthusiasm, she said.

"I am hoping to get the fundamentals of the girls cleaned up," Kimball said. "That is my main goal. I've seen them play. Right now, I just feel like the fundamentals could really be worked on. That's what we're hitting pretty hard."

Kimball said that in addition to working on fundamentals, she has introduced them to some different offenses. She hopes something

clicks with the team, she said. The Lady Falcons are trying an offense this season that is more reaction-based and less positional-based.

"The girls are very used to 'what position do I go to next," Foland said. "I'm trying to teach them patterns on how to react to the ball, so it's more reaction-based."

Kimball said she's also had her players work on conditioning, saying that a basketball team can't be productive if they can't run the floor.

"I think another strength they haven't utilized in the past is their speed," Foland said. "Right now, I want them in top shape so that maybe we could get some cheap points off of fast breaks. They're all fast girls, so I want to utilize that."

Four players from last year's starting lineup return this season. Foland said that senior Emma Hoover will remain the starting point guard. Hoover averaged 3.2 assists per game last season and 4.8 points per game. She missed seven games last season after suffering an ankle injury at the Slater Wildcat Classic.

Junior Abbey Conrow returns as the team's leading

scorer. She averaged 13.7 points per game last season. Conrow made a team-high 53 3-pointers while shooting 38 percent from behind the line last season, and scored 357 points.

"We have really tried to consistently hone down on her shooting," Foland said. "It will be more consistent, but right now she's kind of in between the back and front of the rim, so we've been focusing on getting it right over the front, hand in the kindergarten cookie jar kind of shooting drills."

Seniors Jennifer Nelson and Maddie Reed are two post players who can shoot well from outside, Foland said. Reed was the second-leading scorer last season with 6.2 points per game and led the team with rebounding.

Also on the team this season are juniors Cameron Bias and Murphy Quint, sophomores Shay'aira Lee-Mc-Quitty, Abbey Nation, Kylea Hoover and Breanna Estes, and freshmen Jordyn Ball, Laci Fuhlage, Sydney Spielbauer, Emma Chew and Audrey Johsson.



Bulldogs reload for another title run

The New Franklin Bulldogs are coming off a season where they won 20 games, the Central Activities Conference title, and advanced to the Class 2 District 14 title game.

The Bulldogs won the CAC for the second time in three years. They also reached the 20-win mark for the second time over that same span. They lost 60-39 to the Sacred Heart Gremlins in the district championship.

New Franklin head coach Ross Dobson returns for his second year as the head Bulldog. He brings back a squad that lost its two main contributors from last season — Mason Bailey and Bailey Lyons.

Dobson said he brings back 6-foot-2 Kolby Anson, who is the lone senior on the current roster. Anson has practiced against Bailey and Lyons the past three years, so he knows what is expected of him in the paint in his senior season. "He's been put through the ringer against two All-Conference players, for sure," Dobson said. "We see him to step up in that role. Jackson Dorson has also kind of been that same thing. He's been going against those two guys the last few years. We see those guys stepping up along with Crayton Gallatin."

A Class 2 school can find itself in a position where it would have to rebuild in a season after losing significant contributors, like New Franklin losing Bailey and Lyons. Instead, with the size the Bulldogs bring back, Dobson is in a position to not rebuild, but recreate.

Gallatin stands at 6-foot-2, and Dorson is 6-foot-1. In addition, the Bulldogs are able to play the same style that led them to a 20-win season and a conference championship a year ago. Anson, Gallatin and Dorson can play in a rotation on the inside, while New Frank-

put lin's speedy guards can ainst line the perimeter.

One of those guards is junior Gavin Bishop. Standing at 6-foot-2, Dobson said Bishop has the chance to be an all-around player for the Bulldogs. Bishop was another major contributor on last season's team, and the team will try to get him as many scoring chances as possible, Dobson said.

Junior Tyler Perkins returns as the starting point guard. He assumes his role at the point for the third straight year. Dobson said Perkins' maturity began to show last season. His growth as a player sets him up to be one of the team leaders this season. He will also be expected to fill the scoring void left by Lyons and Bailey, Dobson said.

"We're hoping he can pick up some of the slack in the scoring effort and

Lady Bulldogs anxious to begin season

The New Franklin Lady Bulldogs are entering a new season experiencing significant turnover, and will have a smaller team than they have had in the past.

Head coach Morgan Vetter enters her third season with New Franklin, and she has seven players on the current roster. Of those seven, Lauren Evans and Shelby Breshears are the only two seniors.

Vetter said that despite having such a small roster, she is anxious to get the season started and see what her team is capable of doing.

"Our numbers don't lie," Vetter said. "We've very limited on numbers, so we're interested to see how during season play things are going to turn out."

Vetter said that all seven players will be expected to contribute significant minutes. She said that all seven of her players already know they are expected to play a lot of minutes.

The Lady Bulldogs are without 5-foot-9 All-Conference forward Madison Matney. She was the team's leading scorer and leading rebounder last season. The good news for New Franklin is that Breshears returns. She missed more than half of last season when she suffered a torn ACL.

Breshears and Matney spent part of last season and a full season before as a tandem in the paint on both sides of the court. After Breshears' injury last season, Matney had that role to herself. Breshears finds herself in that same position as New Franklin enters this new basketball season.

"(Madison) was her own breed just like Shelby is kind of her own breed, in the sense that they both did very different things," Vetter said. "They both are very aggressive, and post players at that. I think this year, we'll be maybe not as one-dimensional. Hopefully, we'll have some outside play along with some inside play. We should be long and pretty lanky."

The other senior leader for the Lady Bulldogs this season will be Evans. Vetter said Evans will again run the point guard position while also being another scoring option for New Franklin.

In addition to Evans being on the perimeter, Vetter said New Franklin will have "several" people who can shoot from outside. Evans is one of them. Another is Madelyn Chaney, who contributed significant minutes last season as a freshman.

"We had five people that played big minutes last year, so those five people should be decent outside threats," Vetter said. "We have two freshmen I think that will contribute to that as well."

Those two freshmen are Kristin Flick and Abby Maupin.

The Central Activities Conference will look a little different this season. The Community Lady Trojans have joined the Conference, giving the league eight teams.

With eight teams now in the CAC, the conference is split into two divisions. New Franklin is in the West Division, and they will play the other three teams twice. Those teams are Slater, Glasgow and Pilot Grove.

Cairo won the CAC last season. They bring back most of the experience that took them to the Class 2 Show-Me Showdown last season. They are the favorite to repeat as conference champions again this season.

"With the East and the West side, I'd be interested to see how that will play out," Vetter said. "Overall, our conference is always a pretty competitive conference, for sure. The bottom side (West side) of the conference is definitely competitive."

Yellowjackets will be much faster this season

Mick Cropp had to introduce a new style of play last season for his Yellowjackets after they lost three 1,000-point scorers.

Under that new style, the Yellowjackets won 15 games and advanced to the semifinal round of the Class 1 District 9 tournament. Glasgow will use that style again this season, and they will be much more dangerous after having a full season to get acquainted with it.

Cropp said his players liked playing that way. They liked the fast pace, he said.

What is that style, exactly? It's one with quick transition on both ends of

Glasgow head coach the court. Last season, it was led by seniors Kabyl and Gage MacMillan. Those two have graduated, but Cropp has more guards to put in their place.

Taking over at the point this season is sophomore Antwaun Herriford. He played varsity as a freshman in a bench role. Last season, he was being groomed as a point guard, Cropp said.

He becomes a starter in his sophomore season. Joining Herriford along the perimeter is senior guard Adris Hamilton. The two had a whole season together last year last year, and that should translate to success in this new campaign.

"When you see Adris you see Antwaun, and when you see Antwaun you see Adris," Cropp said. "They're basically joined at the hip, so they play together all the time. That's all they do, play basketball together. They do compliment themselves pretty well."

Herriford slides into his new role as the team's main facilitator, but also has an ability to score the ball. He can cut, spin and slash his way to the basket and score in the paint. Hamilton plays with a similar style, and also has a deadly shot from behind the 3-point line. Cropp said the team will look to *Continued on Page 23*

Lady Jackets bringing whole new style

For four years, Glasgow fans watched as two post players who stood taller than six feet took the court night in and night out.

Those two have graduated, as well as three other seniors, who all played significant roles in getting the Lady Jackets to the Show-Me Showdown two times in three years.

Jaden Monnig, a threetime All-State player who finished her career with 1,500-plus points and 1,000-plus rebounds, was one of those who graduated. The other player who stood taller than six feet was Abby Littrell. Molly Reynolds and Kristin Stockhorst, two deadly 3-point shooters, and Carrington Frevert, who served as the team's "sixth man" last season, were the other three key pieces from last year's team.

Glasgow head coach Molly Monnig said she and her team are looking at all the turnovers as "exciting," as they are able to play with a new style this season. Last season, the Lady Jackets played an inside-out style, with their post players either scoring inside or setting up an outside shot for one of their guards.

This season, the Lady Jackets will feature with much more motion. This Glasgow team has less size than a year ago, but just as much speed.

"We get to play a whole new style both offensively and defensively," Monnig said. "It's, at times, stressful for the girls because there are a lot of new things happening. We get to play a much more energetic style, so they also enjoy that."

One example of how things will be different is the play people will see from freshman forward Brenna Hubbard. She is quickly establishing herself as an impact player, but it's the style she brings that sets her apart from past post players at Glasgow.

Hubbard can score inside, and she can also shoot from behind the perimeter. This season's starting lineup features a second freshman quickly establishing her self as an impact player — Malia Carmack.

"They've played a lot of basketball, and I think it's very obvious with the way they play," Monnig said. "They understand a lot of things and they can really score the ball. They can run in transition and do a lot of different things."

Senior guard Madisyn Parks is the only returning starter from last season, and is one of three seniors on this year's roster.

"She's been a great leader," Monnig said. "All of my seniors have been great leaders so far. I think their leadership has really given our younger kids a lot of confidence."

The other two seniors

are forward Teagan Howell and guard Brooke Hackman. Howell will be a post player, while Hackman will serve as one of the team's guards.

"Teagan is very, very stong, plays very, very physical and she's a vocal leader," Monnig said. "She's helped a lot of our younger post player wings kind of understand their role.

Monnig said the Lady Jackets will mainly focus on guard play this season, giving them opportunities to attack the basket on offense, and be more aggressive on defense. Having as much speed on the court gives them an advantage in transition night in and night out.

Monnig said one thing about her team that's being overlooked is that the sophomore and junior guards playing for her this season gained a lot of experience practicing against the seniors from last season. People might look at the fact that the Lady Jackets are without four starters from a year ago and will have a lot of new faces on the court. These players have some seasoning, and have the speed and basketball smarts to adapt to a new style.

"We're going to do a lot of different things," Monnig said. "We're going to really get after it in the full court and halfcourt, and try to apply a lot of pressure. We'll play a lot of four-out, one-in type of things."

Four-out, one-in per-

tains to one player in the post and four players outside. People might also see Hubbard playing in the post. Matchups each night will determine her role.

On the defensive end, Monnig said the Lady Jackets will be aggressive. They will use their speed to try to create chaos, and hopefully turn that chaos into points at the other end, she said.

The Central Activities Conference will look a little different this season. The conference has added an eighth team in the Community Lady Trojans. Glasgow is somewhat familiar with Community, having played them in the Class 1 sectional round last season.

With eight teams now in the CAC, the conference is split into two divi-







An era comes to an end, but the Bulldogs continue on

The Harrisburg Bulldogs saw significant turnover at the end of last season, as eight seniors finished their time with the program.

Those eight seniors were a part of a team that won back-to-back district titles, and made a trip to the Class 2 Show-Me Showdown in 2017.

"It's something we haven't had around here in a while," Harrisburg head coach Kyle Fisher said. "Probably five or six years ago, we had a big senior class leave. It is a little bit of a year of transition, the system is not going to change. Expectations aren't going to change. We may tweak some things here and there offensively and defensively, but, for the most part, we're going to keep things the same. We'll expect guys to rise to the occasion and to not have a letdown."

Two of those departed seniors are All-State players Cody Karl and Cade Combs. Both players passed 1,000 career points while at Harrisburg, and were named Lewis and Clark All-Conference and All-District multiple times. Last season, the two accounted for nearly 40 points per game for the Bulldogs.

Karl was the team's starting point guard for the past three seasons. Fisher said that Karl left "big shoes to fill" after his departure, and that he has yet to determine who the new starter will be at the position.

"He's really a guy that's going to be tough to replace on both ends of the floor," Fisher said. "We have Aaron Sims coming back. He played some point guard for us last year. We have a couple of freshmen and sophomores who have a chance to compete for that spot, as well."

Fisher said Karl dominated the point guard position the past three years and stayed on the floor as much as possible. This year, point guard could be kept to a rotation, he said, while he tries to figure out

the best matchups on any given night.

it really sorts itself out." Fisher said that while so many significant contributors left after last season, he looks to retool, and not rebuild. It won't come from just two players, he said, but will come from a "multitude" of players. With that, the scoring production could be a little more balanced this season, he said.

In Year Two, Richardson brings everyone back

The Harrisburg Lady Bulldogs enter the 2018-2019 season in a unique situation. They ended last season with no seniors on the roster, and every key player returns this year.

Head coach Ryan Richardson is beginning his second season at the position. He took over after long-time coach Dan Bachmeier retired. Not only was it his first time coaching girls high school basketball, it was also his first head coaching experience.

"You always come in thinking you're ready," Richardson said. "I spent 10 years as an assistant coach, and I worked under a lot of great head coaches. I thought I was prepared. X's and O's-wise, every head coach X's and O's. The hardest part, and where I really had to grow up, was managing. Managing personalities, managing parents and managing even your assistant coaches. I made a lot of mistakes in managing. I spent a lot of time during my offseason learning how to manage up. That's players, staff, and parents, and that's the hard part you don't really get until you're thrown into the fire. You have to be the one that answers every question and every problem."

The Lady Bulldogs went 7-17 in Richardson's first season. They began the year with a 52-49 upset over Southern Boone. Richardson said Harrisburg fell behind 12-0 to begin the game before chipping away at the Southern Boone lead. A 3-pointer from Emma Barton at the end of the third quarter gave the Lady Bulldogs a spark, and they carried that momentum into the fourth quarter.

"We got on a roll after that (3-pointer) and won the game," Richardson said. "I always told myself I would remain calm, whether it was a win or a loss, in front of the people. I don't know if I ever worked so hard to not show emotion like I did in that 30 seconds. After I shook all their hands, and shook their coach's hand, I was walking back and the first person I saw when I went around the corner was my dad, and my dad is not a guy that shows a ton of emotion. I'm pretty sure he squeezed me so hard and threw me up almost through the ceiling. I think he was more excited than I was."

Three of the Lady Bulldogs' 17 losses last season were by less than 10 points. One of those games was against the Marceline Lady Tigers. Harrisburg lost 51-45 in overtime. Richardson said every player on the team remembers the feeling after that game.

"That's a game that I knew we should have won and we didn't," Richardson said.

Leading Harrisburg this season will be seniors Sydney Fischer and Kyla Heuer. Fischer is the returning lead scorer with 7.3 points per game last season. Heuer averaged four points per game.

Another scoring threat for the Lady Bulldogs will be junior Emma Barton.

Harrisburg's first opponent and the start time of the game are to be determined.

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



Burton takes on an additional role

Jon Bishop was the head coach of the Higbee Tigers for eight seasons. He has accepted the same position at Fayette, as Tanner Burton takes over the Higbee boys basketball program.

Burton was already set to enter his sixth season as the Lady Tigers' head coach, where he has accumulated an 85-46 record in those five seasons. He now takes on a new challenge, where he will be handling two basketball programs at the same time. "It was my choice and I asked for it," Burton said. "That was one of the things I felt I needed, a different challenge. I needed something to round me out better as a coach. I wanted to give them everything I've got, and I've coached most of these boys before. It's just a matter of being a juggling act at this point."

The Tigers enter the 2018-19 season with seven players on the roster. The program is experiencing significant turn-

over, with seven players from last season moving on after graduation.

Looking at it only as seven players leaving doesn't say much about what Higbee lost after last season. The departing players held significant size. Four of those players stood at least 6-foot-2, something not seen often in Class 1.

John Schell (6-foot-4) was the team leader in scoring (14.5 points per game) and rebounding (11.6 rebounds per game.). Wade Spilman was the second leading scorer with 11.5 points per game. Spilman had the size (6-foot-2) to play in the post, and was an effective player from the perimeter.

"We went from a post-loaded team to a guard-loaded team," Burton said. "There's a lot of change happening. With low numbers, it creates another challenge for us. But again, it's one of those things where we say there's no excuses. It's one of those things where we have to own it and we have to play with what we've got."

Burton said his players will have to play disciplined to avoid foul trouble. Each player will be given a role, and in March, they will know how each player handled their respective role, he said.

Junior William Gibson is one player who returns this season. He is the returning leader in varsity minutes, scoring and assists.

Gibson averaged 10.6 points per game and 4.9

assists per game as the starting point guard. He is one of two juniors on the roster.

The other junior on the roster is Seth Kirby. Burton he said Kirby played what he felt wasn't a lot of minutes at the varsity level last season. This is expected for a sophomore on a senior-heavy roster.

Burton said the remaining five players on the roster have little to no varsity experience.

Three of them are freshmen (Jaime Smith, Pat Squires and Luke Ridder). Two sophomores are on the roster, Keaton Rediford and Brett Nauerth.

"Obviously, they're going to make an impact out of the gates," Burton said. "I have seven."

Burton said his players will have a different role from what they've done before. He said Smith was a post-dominant player in junior high, and now will be an undersized player in high school.

"For these kids, as freshmen, it's a bigger jump for boys than girls," Burton said. "They have to adapt faster, and hopefully we're

preparing them through the summer and through our practices now, and they'll be able to come in and there won't be that big disparity between them. The older guys will have to do a good job of being great leaders and stepping in and reinforcing the positives and leading the team like they're supposed to."

Gibson and Kirby have been named as team captains, Burton said, and will be the two guys he looks for to "keep their heads on straight" and keep the team focused.

"I think that's where the success lies," Burton said. "How do they make sure that we're keeping the ship headed in the right direction at all times. I think they'll do a great job of that."

Burton said he hopes the team can form some sort of an identity by January. For now, he said he is trying different things and trying to find what works. Some of it will be motion offense, he said, and some of it will be positionless basketball.

Burton said he views Jamestown and Prairie Home as the top two teams in the Cooper County Activities Conference this season. Higbee will have three conference road games, with Bunceton being the only home game.

Higbee's next home game is Dec. 6 against the Fayette Falcons. Fans will want to pack the Higbee gym and give Fayette head coach a warm welcome. The game tips at 7:30 p.m.

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



The Higbee Lady Tigers from a season ago left another mark on the girls basketball program, winning 20 games and advancing all the way to a district title game.

Three players who played a significant role in Higbee's 20-8 season in 2017-18 have moved on, but head coach Tanner Burton said he expects the 2018-19 Lady Tigers to continue to carry the program going forward.

"We have three seniors who are captains for us this year, and all three look to really send themselves out," Burton said. "That's the thing that's been sticking with us, what legacy do they want to leave and what kind of impact do they want to leave on the program. Fortunately, for us right now, we're in a pattern that these kids for us are all having a profound impact on our program."

The departing senior class from last season is (so far) the winningest senior class in program history. Geocie Sager, Sam Nelson and Claire Berendzen won 78 games in their four years at Higbee.

This season, Grace Westfall, Shelby Clark, and Alexis Whisenand have emerged as the senior leaders. Burton began coaching high school and middle school girls basketball at Higbee six years ago, and he said these three are the first group he has coached since the seventh grade.

"The expectation is here for them to be successful," Burton said. "A lot of people think this will be one of my more successful senior classes. I think that's extremely special, because none of those kids, as of right now, have been the kids that put up thousands of points and stuff like that."

These three have played with three players over the past two years who did reach the 1,000-point milestone. Sager reached 1,000 points last season. Two years ago, Sabrina Huddleston and Rhiannon Runyon reached the millennium mark for scoring. "I think that right now what you see is you have some really good teammates who sat behind the wings, similar to what you saw with Geocie last year, that sat back and never scored more than nine or 10 points a game," Burton said. "All of a sudden, they're seniors and now they can cut loose and run the show. I think you'll continue to see this turnover where we have kids step up and play at a high level their senior year. They want to set the bar higher for the next class."

Burton said the current senior class could tie the previous class in wins if they can win 21 games this season. He said reaching that mark was one of the things his seniors talked about at the beginning of the season.

"This team has great potential to be successful," Burton said. "It's a matter of how high do they want to go. Are they going to set limits on themselves, or are they just going to play the game and let the wins come?"

Burton said the Lady Tigers' schedule is filled with good competition, with teams around the area reaching their "peak." Games could be competitive night in and night out, and will make for fun basketball, he said.

With Burton now

having three seniors on his team who have been with him since the beginning, he now has what is a foundation of players rising through the grades from seventh grade to the high school level. Players spending this much time playing together for so many years build a camaraderie, he said, and they have built a culture at Higbee.

"These kids have bought in, and they were the kids that showed up when I needed them to," Burton said. "They've really been something special, and I think that's the expectation this year, for this to be a special year."

Westfall was close to averaging a double-double last season, scoring 11.4 points per game while grabbing 8.4 rebounds. Whisenand averaged 9.7 rebounds per game, and had a career-high 23 rebounds against Bevier on Jan. 23. She had eight double-doubles last season.

Sager was the team's starting point guard last season, and that position in the starting lineup became vacant upon her graduating. Burton said he could go with a non-specific point guard assignment this season, with as many as five players running the point during a game. It would depend on matchups and situations, he said.

Not only was Sager the starting point guard last season, she also was the team's go-to scorer. She had seven games where she scored more than 20 points, and averaged 15.7 points per game for the season. Burton said Westfall could step into that role as the go-to scorer this season.

She eclipsed 20 points in two of the last three games of last season.

Burton said another player who could be that person is junior Devin Clark. She re-joined the Lady Tigers last season after taking a year off from basketball. She eased back into playing the game with the team early on, but really began to stand out toward the end. She recorded a double-double in four of Higbee's last six games.

'She's extremely athletic and has no idea how high the ceiling is for her," Burton said. "She doesn't understand the fact that she's extremely gifted and athletic. She just plays the game for fun, and that makes her extremely dangerous."

Higbee opened the 2018-19 season at the Northwestern Invitational with a game against Keytesville, winning 60-31. Clark had a double-double, scoring 13 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. Westfall had 13 points. Freshman Macey Whisenand led the team with 14 points.

Burton said he could

have as many as five players who could reach as many as 15-20 points in a game, and seven players who will consistently reach double-figures in scoring. The benefit is being who they are, he said, is that opposing teams early on will have their sights set on Westfall and Alexis Whisenand. The other players, including Clark and Macey Whisenand, are currently under the radar.

Burton said that winning the Cooper County Activities Association has been a goal the program wants to achieve. The Lady Tigers dropped a pair of tough losses to Bunceton and Prairie Home last season. They also lost to Calvary Lutheran, last season's CCAA champion.

Burton said his team has three conference games on the road this season, and any game played on the road is tough. One of those games is at Calvary Lutheran. Burton said Calvary Lutheran is believed to be the conference favorite this season.

signed to Class 1 District 10 this season. They are in the district with Bevier, Canton, Community, Madison, Marion County, North Shelby and Wellsville. Community was a district winner last season, losing in the sectional round to Glasgow. Madison was a district winner two seasons ago, but lost to Community last season in districts.

The Lady Tigers have lost three 1,000-point scorers over the past two seasons. However, they are in a different situation this year. Those past two seasons, most of the scoring was handled by only

one or two players. Entering this season, the Lady Tigers have plenty of variety as far as putting points on the scoreboard.

best we can."

Preseason began on Oct. 29. When teams in Missouri were allowed to hold official practices, Bishop had only one-third of his team. The rest were still playing football. The football Falcons won the Class 1 District 5 title, their first district title in 11 years. One thing being considered was if the basketball team would have only five players in uniform when it opened the season at the 88th Annual Glasgow Tournament on Nov. 26.

Winning a district title in football put Fayette in the Class 1 state playoffs, and it was unclear just how far they would go. Bishop said that while he wasn't certain when he would have his whole team on the court, he didn't consider it a setback.

"Any of these guys, and any coach, and any player are going to tell you that if you're going to trade losing or having to forfeit the Glasgow Tournament due to a lack of players versus being prepared and ready throughout the (football) season and have an opportunity to win districts, they're going to take districts any time," Bishop said. "I'm going to preach that as well. We love the Tournament. Glasgow We love playing in it. It's close, It's competitive. We obviously won it last year

and we want to continue to do that, but, of course we have to wait on our other guys."

Bishop said that calling it a "setback" could be perceived as wishing ill will on another sport, something he made clear he did not want to do.

Athletes at Fayette have put in work through head football coach Roger VanDeZande's weight room philosophy over the past three years, and that philosophy has brought success to the basketball program. Those athletes have seen increases in both size and athleticism. Bishop said he wants to carry that into the basketball season.

Senior Isaiah Estes and

Polson were running backs in VanDeZande's offense. Bishop will use them to drive the ball inside and score in the paint. Roberts has the speed and athleticism to move the ball up and down the court quickly. Seniors Kolby Skaggs and Chris Dunivent bring size to the post. Once this team fully adjusts from football to basketball, they could cause matchup dilemmas for opposing teams.

The Falcons won the Lewis and Clark Conference title last season, their first since 2008. Bishop said that winning the conference again this year is up to the senior class. They won the Lewis and Clark Conference in football. "Those are all things we can feed off of, and it is very important (to repeat as conference champions)," Bishop said. "It's a very tough conference."

Bishop said that Harrisburg lost some talented players from last year, while Salisbury returns a decent team and Westran will be improved. It will be a conference where teams will have to show up and play hard every night, he said.

The Falcons have been assigned to Class 2 District 14 this season. This season is different since they are not in a district with Harrisburg. The Bulldogs have been a thorn in Fayette's side in district play the past four seasons. Every district tournament loss for Fayette has come at the hands of Harrisburg over that span.

The Falcons are sharing the district with Howard County rival New Franklin this season. Also in Class 2 District 14 are Sacred Heart, who won the same district last season, Cole Camp, Smithton, Stover, Sweet Springs, and Tipton. The district host is to be determined.

Fayette's next game is Dec. 6 at Higbee. This game holds some significance, as it will be Bishop's first game in Higbee's gym since accepting the head coach position at Fayette. The game is scheduled to tip at 7:30 p.m.

"Last year, we went about seven or eight deep most nights," Fisher said. "I think this year we could go 10-12 deep most nights."

The Harrisburg Bulldogs have featured a combination of size and speed in recent seasons, something that can be considered rare at the Class 2 level. Fisher said he thinks this year's team could be bigger and just as athletic.

"Last year, we were extremely fast at pretty much every spot," Fisher said. "This year, we bring Cody (James) back, and we have Ryan Freeman coming back with him as a senior big who played some big minutes down the stretch for us last year. We have some young kids coming up who have some really good size, some freshmen coming up and some sophomores who have some speed and some strength. As far as size and speed, we'll be right there where we've been the last couple of years."

James is the only returning starter from last season. Freeman came in off the bench during games, but was a key part of the Bulldogs' rotation. Tyler Cockrum and Jonah Sanford are another two players who contributed varsity minutes last season, who Fisher said could be inside players in the rotation this season.

"He works extremely hard and really does whatever the team needs," Fisher said about Sanford. "Whether it's scoring, rebounding, defending, getting on the floor and drawing charges, he's just a great kid to have in the program. I really think with those four, that's a good place to start with replacing some of those rumblers that we lost down low last year."

The Bulldogs finished second in the Lewis and Clark Conference last season. They lost a close game to the Fayette Falcons early in the season. They had a shot at winning a share of the conference title, with a chance to repeat as conference champions, but a loss to Salisbury on the last night of the regular season negated that opportunity.

Fisher said he thinks that Fayette appears to be the favorite to win the conference this season. They have a new coach, Jon Bishop, who accepted the job after Ben Pallardy became the head boys basketball coach at Eldon High School. Bishop was previously the head coach of the Higbee Tigers.

Fisher said that despite having a new coach, the Falcons return most of their team from a year ago. Blake Dawson, their leading scorer, and Chavez Kent moved on after graduation. Everyone else returns, and they should be looked at when talking about who has a good shot at winning the Lewis and Clark Conference crown, Fisher said.

"After that, I think it's wide open," Fisher said. "I

think we'll have a chance to compete for the title. Salisbury lost four starters, but they're going to be in the mix year in and year out. Marceline brings back a couple of All-Conference kids. The schools up north, Knox (County), Schuyler (County) and Scotland (County), are always talented. Paris had a young team last year, not a great record but were really playing well at the end of the year. Westran brings back two All-Conference players, so I think last year it was pretty top-heavy with the top two or three teams. I think you'll see a little more balance this year. I like our chances, and the main thing we use our conference for is to try to get ourselves ready to compete

for a district title."

Last year, Harrisburg was one of four ranked teams in their district. They other three were Fayette, New Bloomfield, and Eugene. Those were the four teams to reach the district semifinals. Harrisburg defeated New Bloomfield in a close game where Cade Combs scored 48 points to lift the Bulldogs to their second straight conference crown.

The Bulldogs have been assigned to Class 2 District 7 this season. They share the district with New Bloomfield, Calvary Lutheran, Sturgeon and Russellville this season. Cairo has moved up to Class 2 this season, and they are in District 8, as are Salisbury and Westran.

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be more of a threat offensively," Dobson said. "Defensively, as well, he needs to make sure he steps it up there, too. He needs to improve his overall ability on the floor, both offensively and defensively."

Last season, the Bulldogs advanced to the championship game of two in-season tournaments — the Glasgow Tournament and the New Franklin Tournament. At both tournaments, New Franklin lost to the Fayette Falcons.

Fayette's Cale Polson made a steal and scored a layup with :28 remaining in the Glasgow Tournament championship game. New Franklin had the final possession and used all :28. Perkins dribbled around the perimeter and took a wide-open 3-pointer that bounced off the back of the rim. Lyons grabbed the rebound and attempted a putback. The putback attempt missed, and Fayette escaped with a 52-51

win and the Glasgow Tournament first place trophy.

Dobson said the goal at these in-season tournaments is not necessarily earning a first place trophy, but to take home any kind of trophy. To take home a trophy in a tournament, a team must win at least two games.

"Even if it's a consolation, we're coming out with two wins," Dobson said. "It's third place with two wins, or a championship with three wins. Our goal every tournament is to get at least one trophy. We did come very close at the Glasgow Tournament last year. We had a late turnover that led to them shooting a wide-open layup. And then, they came up here to our tournament. We didn't play very well for the first three quarters. We decided to finally turn it on and kind of make it a ballgame."

When asked if his team hopes to run into Fayette in another tournament this season, Dobson said it doesn't matter who his team plays. The only

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thing they are looking for is a trophy, regardless of who they meet in each tournament.

New Franklin's first conference game is Dec. 7 at the Madison Panthers. Beginning with that game, the Bulldogs will begin their conference title defense. Dobson said he doesn't view any specific team as a threat to remove them from the conference throne this season, saying that every team in the CAC will give them a challenge.

The Community Trojans are new to the CAC. They are the one unfamiliar foe this season for New Franklin. The Trojans went 9-17 last season. Their season ended with a 56-40 loss to Chamois in the Class 1 District 10 semifinals.

Dobson said that Pilot Grove returns a majority of their starting lineup last season. Glasgow also returns most of their team. Slater advanced to the Class 1 state quarterfinals last season, losing 51-48 to Chamois. The Cairo Bearcats bring back experience, as do the Sturgeon Bulldogs and the Madison Panthers. The CAC looks to be at near-even strength this season.

The Bulldogs are assigned to Class 2 District 14. Sacred Heart, the team who beat them in the district title game last season, are in that district. Dobson said that while he and his Bulldogs know that they can only play who they are matched with come district time, they do have a taste for revenge against Sacred Heart.

Fayette is also in District 14 with New Franklin. A meeting in the district tournament between these two teams would heighten the stakes in this Howard County rivalry.

Also with New Franklin in District 14 are Cole Camp, Smithton, Stover, Sweet Springs and Tipton.

The Bulldogs played at Fayette on Dec. 4. Results were not available at press time. New Franklin's next home game is Dec. 11 against Slater. The game is scheduled to tip at 7: 30 p.m.
