Under the guidance of Bunting the students were encouraged to create the holiday windows throughout the entire

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

Winners of KVHD board election, a close race

While there was no doubt that Katheryn Elconin was top on the list of candidates winning votes for the board of the Kern Valley Hospital's, Kern Valley Healthcare District, with Fred Clark coming in second place. Incumbent John Blythe was on a rocky road of pins and needles for the board seat against contender Gene Parks Jr, winning by a very close margin.

Blythe told the Kern Valley Sun, Thursday, November 21, "This election has been a little bit on pins and needles because it's changed so many times. The last count that I saw, it was neck and neck, between myself and Gene Parks Jr. It should be coming down to the wire now." Blythe was still ill at ease, that day to declare his victory, though publisher John Watkins believed Blythe had a clear path to

"I think at this point they've gone through enough of the ballots that were mailed, just before the election that I don't think there's going to be much fluctuation," Blythe reluctantly said."Since I've been on the board this is probably the first that we've had some pretty serious contenders for the seats on board."

Blythe said that Gene Parks Jr and Albert Landry, who were also on the ballot, both had some interesting points he read about, online, previously. Blythe said Landry has good points about behavioral health. Neither contender spoke about things with Blythe in conversation though Blythe read some online posts.

"I'm definitely excited to serve another term." Blythe said, "I'm happy to serve the constituents of the district again for another four years."

Katheryn Elconin who was a sure win told the press that people come up to her saying they voted for her. She said, "I'm just so grateful. The only thing that I would wish from the community is they would come or watch the videos. I'm grateful for the support. But I would truly love for them to be

Fred Clark, a clear winner for the seat, seemed to be in good spirits over his victory. "We had five people running for the board. Luckily enough Katheryn, myself, and John are still in the lead," said Clark. "Katheryn is ahead of me now by 45 votes, so she's kicking my butt. And John Blythe is about 400 behind me but he's still about 28 above Gene Parks Jr. So he's going to be in okay. We had 5 people

that wanted to be on the board to better

the district so there's nothing bad to say about that."

Clark, who brings to the board knowledge of insurance, from working in the insurance industry said, "I would like to believe that the health care district would have remained on its current course no matter what happened on the board. There's a lot of key agenda items that have got to take place within our health care district, in the not too distant future, so that we make sure that we abide by the all the state regulations brought before us." He was most concerned about the master project with the retrofit of the facility.

Elconin said she also hopes if the public has any concern they'll bring it to the board.

She wanted people to know that the hospital board meetings are on the Internet, and they can come to the meetings live and look at minutes and the agendas online.

She said, "I truly do appreciate the votes. I take them personally. I have a heart for that hospital. I always have."

Elconin's husband's mother was once a doctor at Kern Valley Hospital. Elconin was also hired at the Skilled Nursing Facility as a CNA in 1992.

This week in the Kern River Valley, we experienced lovely weather, leading to big bites on the water. The Upper Kern River's trout bite is on fire right now, with more inclement weather continuing to roll in. The worse the weather,

the better the trout bite.

Trout are smart predators, and they know that changing weather will benefit them. Typically, bites become more aggressive as the barometric pressure changes before a storm rolls in. Winds before the storm can cause massive feeding frenzies and provide excel-

lent fishing opportunities as the storm approaches.

Timing is essential because you want to get out before heavy rain and wind begin; dropping barometric pressure is when you want to get out. You want to use the weather and environment to your advantage, so pay attention to weather and insect activity.

One of the big reasons for trout's storm excitement is more food. Bugs and bad weather do not mix, so they get knocked out of trees, blown down into the water, floating into a trout's starved mouth. While wind and trees are angler's enemies, they offer good fishing and can create feeding frenzies, with trout striking on the top

Fishing along shorelines can be another great idea. When the rain comes, it washes everything into the water. Slightly murky water makes it hard for prey to see predators; trout know how

use it to their advantage.

Topwater feeding frenzies are visible and can offer the chance to get out some dry flies or surface baits. In a frenzy, trout will hit just about anything because they are trying to fill up before the storm, and they return to deeper water, where it's calmer.

Trout are just some of the fish that enjoy lousy weather; bass are known to hunt the shorelines during storms for prey. When the barometric pressure is low, bass are put in the feed bag and into a feeding frenzy.

Anglers need to entice them to bite, and they will hit anything that looks like prey if you put it in front of them. With the murky water, bass have a more challenging time seeing threats and are likelier to hit that lure you plopped in front of


them. I like to use a spinner bait for bass in bad weathfish. During storms, you will tend to see plankton being pushed to the shore, with bait fish following the plankton. Bass will come shallow to hunt baitfish. The spinnerbait vibrates and flashes, which should catch the attention of the bass. The spinnerbait's optimal casting conditions are muddy water with a gusty wind blowing into it.

Now, it is good to note that not all bad weather brings good fishing. When the water temperature drops too low, fish slow down, and cold weather or heavy rain will kill the bite. Pay attention to the weather and watch the conditions. You are the best judge to know if you want to get out and fish. But don't let a little rain stop you from getting out. The best time to go fishing is when you can.

Remember, my friends, tight lines and leave no trace.



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


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

Cemetery district makes progress preparing delinquent audits

District Auditor Kevin Brejnak gave a presentation to the board of trustees at the last board meeting of the Kern River Valley Public Cemetery District, November 12, regarding the 2016-2017 Fiscal Year End Audit.

The district has been behind several years on audits, among other issues, which the

Grand Jury report suggestions included the district catch up on. Therefore the

district has been scrambling, after hiring a new District Manager and administrators to catch up with things the district was behind on, due to low manpower.

Brejnak gave the trustees a summary document with information pre-COVID.

On pages one and two it had an opinion on the financial statements, which means the audit was unmodified and was accurate and fairly representative of the district's results, and is free of material misstatements.

It included samples and

conclusions based on those samples. It included receipts, and expenditures, and payroll documents as well as transactions that cleared, matching the sub-receipts.Brejnak explained to the board that the management's discussion on analysis provides a comparison from the prior fiscal year to the current fiscal year. So it contains an executive summary report for the audit, followed by fund financial statements notes, which can be examined more closely on pages 16-33 and a discussion on accounting policies, cash

holdings and investments, and information on the CalPERS pension plan.

In the information Brejnak provided the trustees there is an original adopted budget and expenditures explanation as well as compliance with government codes, laws and regulations noted in a separate letter. The close out for this audit

ought to have been presented by June 2018. The next seven years audits were also not turned in by the due dates.

Brejnak said the next step was for the board to accept

the audit and turn it in to Kern County. Once that fiscal year is closed out, and all this information, the district would be better able to prepare the next several fiscal years

Administrator John Blythe asked if the momentum kept going, whether the next years' fiscal audits would be on track to be turned in to the county, in time to be in compliance, with government requirements. Brejnak thought the district would be in compliance providing the information needed to

conduct the audits would be made available in a timely fashion.

Blythe said the board having a treasurer going forward would assist with things keeping on track and moving ahead. "We'll get it filed with the county and we'll just keep chugging away on the next year," said Blythe.

The board then took action to receive the audit as is, and voted to approve the audit to be turned into the county.

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

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Tribal leader speaks at school for National Native American Month

Tribal chairman, Chief Robert Gomez of the Tubatulabal Tribe spoke with grade-7 students of the new VIP Jr. Gentlemen Club, at Wallace Middle School, November 19.

He was chosen speaker to represent National Native American Month to the students.

Gomez is one in a series of speak-

ers that school counselor Beatrice Alcantar enlisted to speak on character topics. Gomez' taught the boys about courage and how it plays out

in various types of situations. Gomez also sang a song for the club in his native language and taught a phrase to the kids in his native language, which Gomez has sought to keep alive to Native American youth.

Alcantar started the club, which Gomez spoke at, for grade 7 and

grade 8 boys. She began the club to impress upon the boys positive character traits they can take into their adulthood.

Interestingly, during this meeting another class joined the club, with a substitute teacher, because Alcantar wished for more students to learn about Native American culture.

This speaking engagement was not Gomez's first teaching gig. Apparently he was previously a teacher and mostly taught Spanish. He also

formerly worked as a police officer, which explains his knowledge on the topic of courage.

He asked the students about their definitions of courage. He told the students that sometimes courage entails remaining silent. He agreed with one of the boys that courage sometimes means standing up for others. Gomez asked the children about their responses to bullying. Gomez also used examples like the holocaust to emphasize how sometimes escaping and running can be a form of courage.

Alcantar said Gomez was originally supposed to speak, for the school in honor of National Native American Month, which is November. Alcantar said, "I'm trying to bring cultural awareness to the school."

Last school year Alcantar had a similar character club for Wallace Elementary School boys.

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
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



Note: No other stats were made available for this game. Kern Valley will now have quite the layoff as they will not play again until Dec. 2 when they go on the road to take on Mam-



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
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
