s many districts celebrate the last week of school, they also look at proactive approaches to ensure the 2022-'23 school year runs smoothly. One hurdle in particular is being addressed now: finding bus drivers.

Bus driver shortages are having a rippling effect on schools, students and families across the country - especially in Webster County. The shortage has resulted in longer routes for students and double routes for drivers. To combat the shortages, district's have come up with several incentives and creative ways to band-aid the problem.

Marshfield's school district has responded by offering paid training and the opportunity to earn extra income before and after school. A number of teachers and paraprofessionals have taken advantage of the opportunity; including Assistant Superintendent Rocky Valentine.

"I tell people all the time, it is probably my favorite thing. Getting to jump in and drive across the district, it's beautiful in our area, and working with the students is great,"

explained Valentine. "But the district has consolidated some routes, resulting in our routes to be little bit longer and I know nobody enjoys that. We don't love that either, but that was not a financial decision... it's been a limited staffing situation."

The Marshfield district requires its drivers to span 1,300 miles every school day; with 31 routes in the morning and 32 in the afternoon. Equally so, the Fordland's district puts on quite the balancing act as well, juggling multiple drivers throughout the day.

Marshfield predator turns himself in for slew of crimes

A Marshfield man has been charged with promoting child pornography in the first degree, a Class B felony punishable by up to 15 years in jail. The discovery was made during an extensive background check performed by a local church where the accused was seeking employment. Nicholas Ryan Wallace, 32, walked into the Webster County Sheriff's Office on Thursday, May 5 and turned himself in for having child pornography stored on his phone. According to the probable cause statement, Wallace waived his rights and confessed to the crimes during an interview with a Webster County deputy. "The local church ministers handled it pretty much exactly like you would want to see anybody handle it," said Sheriff Roye Cole. "They discovered something that wasn't right and went to this person saying it's probably the right thing to do to go turn yourself in and that's exactly what he did. He confessed to a whole host of crimes, some of which are obviously very serious."

Financial excellence for city of Marshfield

It takes a lot of people performing different jobs day in and day out for a city to work seamlessly. Most of the time city employees do their jobs without much acknowledgment or spotlight because as long as your water is running, there isn't much to worry about. But, there is more to keeping a city running smoothly than running water and it starts with the budget.

This past week the City of Marshfield received a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting award from the GFOA (Government Finance Officers Association) "They (GFOA) takes the financial statements from the city, audited or otherwise, and they review the information," explained Monica Robinson, Finance Director for the City of Marshfield. "If you have questions ask them, its (the budge and reports) are there for everyone, our citizens, to review. More than 150,000 individuals battling addiction have received lifesaving treatment from Drug Court, including folks here in Webster County.

The program is not new to our area, in fact almost 20 years ago, Judge Ken Thompson, Gail Barnekow, Dr. Ward Lawson, Brad Stocker, and other forward-thinking citizens helped open the doors of the Webster County Drug Court.

"From the time I was 18, a boyfriend of mine introduced me into meth... from then on it was just every now and then," explained Brake. "I'd use for several months and end up committing crime after crime. It'd be three to five

months, maybe, and I'd end up back in jail every time. They sent me to prison four times, county jail countless times. This last time, I actually escaped jail."

As of 2020, the #1 leading cause of deaths for ages 18-44 in Missouri is drug overdose. A serious number for a serious and on-going epidemic in the state of Missouri. Round-Up: Refrigerators for Kings

In 2008, Gayle Savage had a vision of meeting a need for the residents and seniors in Seymour. "We provide food for the southern half of Webster County; Rogersville, Fordland, Seymour." explained Winona Owens, Administrator at Kings Food Pantry. "Gayle felt it was laid upon her heart to start food pantries and that's what she did. She did the paperwork and got it started and advocated for volunteers."

"It started way before any of us ever got here and several of our volunteers have been here from the beginning," reflected Owners. "They started out in the old school building in Seymour, the 'old rock building' and we've grown from there."

"We work with four different organizations to provide food," explained Owens. The largest of the four being the USDA and the CSFP (Commodities Supplemental Food Program). "The USDA allows us to provide food for about 204 households each month and the CSFP, a special program that is for people over 60, provides around 140-40 pound boxes of shelf stable food for seniors each month."

"I volunteered here at the end of 2019 and immediately after that COVID hit. We used to be set up to where people could come in and "shop". When COVID hit we couldn't do that anymore. We didn't know what it was going to look like going forward," reflected Owens. "Ozarks Food Harvest started sending tons of food out because they were getting a ton of food but it took a lot of management. Someone had to date it, put it away, figure out when it needs to go out. I enjoyed doing it and they (the rest of the volunteers) were like 'will you do it' and I was like SURE," laughed Owens.

"For a vear and a half we didn't have any food expenses. Now we are getting back to what we refer to as "pre-COVID". We went from receiving 30 items (30 separate items), down to 5-10 maybe 15," Owens shared about the current status of incoming food. "I'm calling them (Ozarks Food Harvest) 'what do I do there is no food' and they say 'this is how it's going to be, this is what it looked like pre-COVID'. Food prices are going up, we are buying more food, and it's costing us more money," stated Owens.

With growth and an increase in need for food, the Webster Electric Round-Up grant opportunity couldn't have come at a better time. "We have what we call the refrigerator room, it holds 7-8 refrigerators that are at least 10 plus years old. Last summer, on the hottest days, they struggled to maintain temps. I told the board this was going to be a concern and since then we have lost one fridge," explained Owens. The Kings Food pantry applied for and received a grant from Webster Electric in the amount of \$4,599 to purchase a refrigerator. "We are hoping the new three door fridge will not only reduce our electric usage but also increase the amount of space we have for food storage."

To combat the rising cost of food and the increase in food purchasing, the Kings Food Pantry has partnered with the Masons to have one of the Masons' famous "Trash Can Feeds". "They are cooking and providing everything for us. It's \$10 per plate and everything will benefit the pantry," shared Owens. The event will be held at the Seymour Park on June 4th at 6:00 p.m. In addition to the Trash Can Feed, the city of Seymour is also hosting "Music in the Park" the same evening.

Distributions are on Thursdays; the first Thursday from 9 a.m.- 4 p.m., third Thursday 1:30-6 p.m., and the fourth Thursday from 9 a.m.- 4 p.m. The entire organization is completely volunteer run by about 15 people. The King's Food Pantry and Thrift store is now located at 732 S. Division St. Seymour, MO.

In 2018, Brake's nephew had been arrested and was in need of money. With the desire to help him, and a warrant out for her arrest, Brake turned her self in. However, once dressed out in the jail's jumpsuit she proceeded to escape through the elevator's doors at the Webster County Jail. Brake was apprehended two days later. Brake was facing the same "old" fate she always did, until both of her sisters joined her in jail on drug related charges.

That is when Brake made a plea to Webster County Prosecutor Ben Berkstresser to be accepted into Drug Court. The prosecuting attorney is generally referred to as the "gatekeeper" due to the fact they decide who gets an application to drug court. Berkstresser stated there were many factors that played a role in his decision.

"Amanda was a real tough sell to get into drug court because I'd known her since I became a practicing attorney in Marshfield. She went on a string of crimes that were very serious and showed just a general lack of remorse. When she escaped the jail, she had earned a 10-year sentence from the Department of Corrections," explained Berkstresser. " I was resolved. Her attorney was a public defender, by the name of Joe Porter and Joe begged for me to take an opportunity to speak to Amanda and so I did."

Prior to meeting with Berkstresser, Brake had been in jail for several months. Brake emphasized that her sisters needed someone to be an example for them and insisted that she wanted to change. "I listened to her and I thought I'd give her a chance, but she'll have to do the work. When she got into the system and started treatment, it was amazing," shared Berkstresser. "She faced moments where things were real tough. She worked so hard and was diligent."

Berkstresser described himself as a "cheerleader" as Brake successfully navigated through Drug Court.

"Amanda has just a charismatic personality. She is very likable and I thought if she can get through this, potentially, her sobriety could have "It has saved my life. All credit goes to drug court," said Brake. "Drug court is an intense program. If people are looking for the easy way out better just go to prison because drug court is not it. I've been to prison, I've done that time and it is a cakewalk compared to drug court."

Brake attended numerous therapy sessions, drug court meetings, check-ins with her parole officers and more.

"They expect a lot and if you're in that program, it's because they see something in you and they believe in you," smiled Brake. "So, after 18 months I completed it. A lot of others don't complete it in 18 months, but I did. I went in there. I told them I was ready and I meant business. I put in 100% and just did everything they asked me to do... and I found solutions to have a more successful life, not only while you're in drug court, but after." Now 39, over four years have passed since Brake's successful completion of Drug Court. Brake currently works as a Certified Nurse Assistant in a nursing facility near Buffalo, MO, but has plans to move back to Marshfield in the near future. The reason: she wants to vote in Webster County.

"I am fixing to move back and the reason is gonna sound crazy," laughed Brake. "I love my Webster County judges and prosecutors. I love all of them and so I want to vote. I've never been able to vote. When you're a felon, you can't do that. I recently got off felony probation for good, so I can vote now. I'm moving back here because I found out you have to register in the town you live in. I don't want to vote for people in Dallas County. I want to come back here to my hometown and support the very same people who supported me." Brake's story is just one of the thousands of individual stories across the country that demonstrate why treatment courts are so critical in the effort to address addiction and related crime.



I gave her a chance, which I didn't want to do, but I did. After that, I became just a little bit of a cheerleader. She's certainly somebody I'm very proud of because it would have been easy to take the prison sentence."

Aquatic Invasive Plants

t's the time of year when boating activities on area lakes swing into high

gear, which means it's a great time to remind everyone of a plant that's a major threat to area waterways.

Hydrilla isn't what most people think of when they think of taking their boat out to the lake, but this aquatic invasive plant is definitely on the minds of aquatic biologists, anglers and other people who care about the great fishing and water resources we have in Missouri. As long as hydrilla is being found in Missouri, people will be hearing about hydrilla each year. And, unfortunately, hydrilla is still being found in Missouri.

Hydrilla (Hydrilla verticillata) is native to Asia and was first seen in the United States in the 1950s. It is thought to have come here via the aquarium trade. It is currently found in 29 states, including Missouri. A mature hydrilla plant has green leaves up to five millimeters wide

and 10-20 millimeters long. Leaves grow in whorls (a circudistinguish them from look-alike plants like elodea. The plant's growth rate is both

impressive and problematic. Hydrilla plants can grow up to one inch per day during their peak growing periods and can double their biomass every two weeks. This rapid growth causes the plant to form dense vegetative mats on the water's surface.

These dense stands of vegetation can choke out native vegetation, alter predator-prey relationships among fish, decrease dissolved oxygen and increase water temperature by absorbing sunlight. All of these are factors that negatively impact aquatic life, fishing and recreational boating. In addition to causing problems in these areas, thick mats of hydrilla plants

can clog intake structures at power generation and water supply facilities.

Hydrilla has multiple methods of reproduction and this can also be troublesome for aquatic habitats. One way is through fragmentation - small stem fragments can take root and become new plants. Hydrilla also reproduces by buds called turions. Still another method it uses is by tubers – parts of the plant that can remain viable in underwater sediment for several years. These propagation methods

bring us to boating. This brings us back all the recreational activities that's going to take place at lakes in the months ahead. Hydrilla has not been found in any of the Show-Me State's large lakes thus far. To date, discoveries of the plant in this state have been in ponds and small impoundments. However, that doesn't mean that hydrilla fragments, turions or tubers aren't present at large reservoirs-they just haven't been found at those sites yet. Evidence from other states shows that one method for spreading the plant is by recreational boats that carry these plant parts from existing sites to new sites.

As a result, "clean, drain and

other aquatic animals before transporting your equipment. Examine all parts of your equipment (motor, trailer, etc.) and remove any potential hitch-hiking species. Drain water from all equipment before transport.

Clean and dry everything. Do not release plants, fish or animals into a body of water unless they came out of that body of water. (This includes live bait.)

It should also be noted that those who like to keep fish should never dump the contents of an aquarium into a nearby stream, pond or lake. Even though hydrilla is classified as a noxious weed and is no longer sold commercially, it still shows up in aquariums on occasion. Regardless of whether hydrilla is in your fish bowl or not, dumping aquariums into streams or ponds is never

a good idea because it's a way to introduce unwanted species into a watershed.

"Our high school secretary is running an afternoon route, our Ag teacher is running a morning route, our baseball coach drives the OTC bus in the morning and we have our bus mechanic driving the pickup OTC route," explained Fordland Superintendent Chris Ford.

Logan-Rogersville has recruited parents to obtain their Commercial Drivers License (CDL), driving students to school functions, tournaments and games.

"We have a couple of cases where we have parents that are certified drivers," shared Jennifer Katzin, Logan Rogersville Assistant Superintendent. "We have a father that drives to soccer games and tennis matches because his kids play soccer and tennis... We've also encouraged our coaches to get their CDL." To ensure the 2022-'23 school year does not face the same challenges, districts are recruiting drivers now, giving plenty of time to obtain a CDL.

"This is one of those niche positions for us and it's so unique in the hours. It can be difficult finding somebody that wants to do that. It takes a special skill set to be able to do it; both driving and working with students," said Valentine. "We are always appreciative and amazed at what our community does for the district. We are hopeful that members of our community are willing to use that skill set and help the district. This is definitely an opportunity for them to help us out and succeed as a district in the upcoming school year."

"I think people get intimidated by driving a large vehicle...but it is such an important job," shared Katzin. "We have these plaques on some of our buses that says

According to Cole, the investigation is still ongoing. The defendant showed authorities some evidence voluntarily and the sheriff's office currently has search warrants underway to gather further evidence in the case.

The probable cause statement said that Wallace admitted to having around 500 images of child pornography on his phone and also had videos which had been deleted prior to turning himself in. The defendant stated that he knew the people in those images were underage (13-17 years old) and it was illegal to possess them.

"Normally you would think somebody who was in trouble would think, oh, I better delete that. I'm going to get rid of it," Cole explained. "It's actually the opposite. They just

think they're going to hide it better. You can't hide anything on a phone... we're going to find it."

Wallace would create fake profiles on apps such as KIK, Snapchat, Reddit and Discord to talk to and receive photos and videos of children. He would pose as a 32-year-old woman to acquire the images, which he would then use for personal gratification and forward to a group on KIK. He said he did this on at least 50 occasions. He also admitted that he is attracted to children, has a problem and needs help.

Wallace was arrested the day he confessed to the crimes and posted a \$50,000 surety bond on Wednesday, May 11. His initial appearance was held on that date and his next appearance in front of Judge Replogle will be at 8:30 a.m. on Thursday, July 19.

To fight this epidemic, the Webster County Health Unit is taking the battle to medicine cabinets: campaigning against the misuse of prescription drugs. Hanging on to old prescriptions or having easily accessible medications can result in drug abuse, addiction or even death. Studies by the Missouri Department of Health show that nearly 20% of students (6-12 grade) state it is "Very" or "sort of easy" to get prescription drugs that have not been prescribed to them.

The Health Unit recently partnered with the Community Partnership of the Ozarks and received additional drug prevention funding delegated to a local coalition: the Webster County Comm'UNITY'. Louise Bigley, Webster County Health Unit's Public Health Nurse, states that the Health Unit is working hard to implement three drug-fighting objectives throughout the community. The first objective is working with local law enforcement and community members to place more permanent disposal boxes or drug drop boxes throughout the county.

"We've recently placed a permanent disposal box in both the Seymour police department and in the Fordland Police Department," explained Bigley. "That actually increases the number of permanent disposal boxes. There's one at the Rogersville pharmacy, and two here at the Webster County Sheriff's Office. This improves access for

our community members, so they don't have to drive 20 miles back and forth to dispose of their old medications. In addition to that we've been able to provide our law enforcement... with some disposable pouches."

The disposal pouches are a new tool that allows for safe at-home disposal and are available to the public through various pharmacies, police stations and at the Health Unit. The packets dissolve leftover pills, patches and liquids neutralizing the substance. The pouches are biodegradable and also meet EPA guidelines. The Health Unit does not recommend flushing unused or old medications down the toilet or holding on to it for safekeeping.

"We do know that people often will flush medications because it's now out of their presence, but it moves into always good for the environment. If we can look at a way of disposing of them that's healthier for the environment and secures that so that no one can get to it," stated Bigley. "Sometimes it is a double edged sword when someone gets ahold of medicine that's really old. Not only is it bad for them because it's not good to take other people's medicine, but it's bad because the medicine breaks-down and changes over time. It can really cause some damage." The second objective is

our waterways. That's not

educating and empowering community leaders to be a resource to the public.

"We reached out to community partners, law enforcement and trusted leaders who could potentially have a conversation about the proper handling of prescription medication: pharmacists, veterinarian, dentist or funeral home directors," explained Bigley. "We have even been able to provide them with disposable pouches or alert them to the permanent disposal boxes in their area."

In addition to those two efforts, the Health Unit's third objective is working to keep the community healthy and provide educational resources throughout the county.

"We're trying to just improve the community; the community's health and reduce misuse. We know that youth sometimes like to experiment and sometimes they can make a poor choice by getting into someone's medication. If that leftover or old medication is just laying around, we can remove it from the environment and properly dispose of it,"

it's less of a temptation or something for them to experiment with. Youth and adults alike, can be facing a mental health crisis and if something is available -like old medication- they may turn to it at a weak moment. They may make a decision that they may not recover from. If we can remove those items and provide a safer environment then it's just healthier for our county as a whole. That's ultimately what we're working on, improving the community's health and reducing the availability of old medications."

There are many people, young and old alike, who have hearing problems, including selective hearing! There is someone out there right now saving, "what did he say?" Actually, that could be me! Be thankful for the gift of hearing, it should be one of those things to be grateful for each day. That prayer could be something like this: God, thank you for letting me hear the birds chirping and singing in the trees. Thank you for letting me hear the train as it roars down the tracks, and thank you for Your soft, sweet voice that whispers in my ear. God is so good, Amen?

Good communication is 80% listening and 20% speaking. The ability to hear is obviously extremely important to communicate with others. Also extremely important is our understanding of what is being said. In Jesus' conflict with the Jews and Pharisees, He said: "If God were you Father, you would love Me, for I proceeded forth and came from God; nor have I come of Myself, but He sent Me. Why do you not understand My speech? Because you are not able to listen to My word:. John 8:42-43.
