### Area business leaders take issues to Madison

MADISON - Business, industry and education leaders from central Wisconsin spent a recent afternoon taking their top issues directly to those in the best position to do something about them - state lawmakers.

Centergy, Inc. hosted its annual Central Wisconsin Days Feb. 12-13 in Madison, featuring 30-minute sessions with area lawmakers or their representatives at the state

"We had a wonderful turnout," said Centergy President/ CEO Angel Laidlaw. "We had roughly 75 individuals registered for the advocacy day and it was a busy session with them (legislators) being on the floor and being in caucus, but it sounded like we made some really good headway and some support for the pieces of legislation we were supporting."

The topics for this year's Capital visit focused on workforce challenges including business tax credits, childcare, and rural bridges.

"How Centergy picks issue papers is we form together, I would say, a quasi-committee of private sector, public sector, municipalities, and then we say, 'Here are some issues that are on the floor. What are your thoughts?' And we do it as a collaborative effort," Laidlaw added. "And then we also reach out multiple times to our legislators and we invite them to multiple meetings to talk about what's low-hanging fruit, what are they working on that we could help push to that next stage, so it's a really good collaborative effort. And then from there we define those even deeper and then we research them for production."

For the second consecutive year, the Centergy group talked to legislators' aides about incentivizing businesses to champion childcare. Central Wisconsin businesses have identified childcare as their foremost workforce challenge, and Centergy supports tax credits tailored for Wisconsin businesses actively involved in establishing, operating, or financially supporting a childcare program for their employees' children.

'It's really creative thinking how we can pull together members of the community and businesses who have a very vested interest in childcare," said Kelly Borchardt of Childcaring.

Laidlaw also told us at the end of the two-day event the

group not only measures success by the legislation they were able to impact, but also by simply being present in Madison to show lawmakers their level of interest.

"It's really about giving our attendees the opportunity to share their stories and talk about what's going on because maybe they're not hearing it," she said. "That's the success that we have found. They feel valued. They feel they have a voice and then they go back to their communities and they're sharing that."

Laidlaw says the group also follows up with area lawmakers, not only on the impact of Centergy's issue papers and the bills they were aimed at, but also on any questions the legislators or their staff members may have had during the group's visit.

"That way the attendees know that we're doing our due diligence and we're not leaving any legislator without an answer to a question," she added. "Centergy is launching a legislative update every quarter."



### Voters narrow list of school board candidates

MARSHFIELD – Retired English instructor Karen Ott was the top votegetter among seven candidates seeking six spots on the April 2 ballot.

Ott secured 2,248 votes in the Primary runoff Feb. 20 to easily make it to the spring election. Nicole Forst locked up her future ballot spot with 1,972 second-place votes in the Primary, followed by Steven Kizer in third place with 1,783 votes. Current Board of Education President Frances Bohon grabbed 1,536 votes in a fourth-place finish, followed by fellow incumbent S.A.M. Steiner, who got 1,391 votes. Richard Kranz received 1,310 votes and grabbed the sixth and final ballot position in April. Eliminated in the runoff was Charles Norton, who received 218 votes in a seventh-place finish.

The top three vote-getters in April will land spots on the Marshfield School Board. Incumbent Karen Shulman is not seeking another three-year term on the board, and filed a statement of non-candidacy on Dec. 13, 2023.

# Garbage fire caught early at Waste Management

MARSHFIELD – A smoldering fire within a large pile of garbage inside Waste Management Solution's transfer station was discovered before any real damage was done. Marshfield Fire & Rescue Department crews were called shortly after 5 p.m. on Feb. 19 to the Waste Management facility, at 501 S. Hume Ave. on the city's southeast side. Upon arrival, crews discovered a large rubbish fire inside the transfer station.

Marshfield Fire & Rescue responded with 10 personnel to a report of large amounts of fire and smoke. Upon arrival smoke was seen coming from the transfer station. Crews made entry to find a large pile of rubbish on fire. The fire was quickly knocked down with the use of handlines. Smoldering within the pile of rubbish was noticed. Waste Management used one of their end loaders to empty the area of the fire and spread the trash outside while fire crews put out all hot spot. Fire is believed to have been caused by hot garbage being loaded into the transfer station and was unintentional.

No injuries were reported. Damage was limited to two blackened concrete walls and visible heat stress marks on the exterior metal sheeting in the location of the fire.

### Marshfield 150 for 150: Miss Agnes L. Noll

### NOMINATED BY HER GRANDNEPHEW, THOMAS HAYDEN

Former Marshfield businesswoman Miss Agnes Noll's keen interest in her business and affairs outside of that business, her personal sense of duty and her high ideals significantly benefitted the community throughout her life.

Agnes was born Aug. 13, 1898 in Marshfield to Frank and Sadie (Harkin) Noll. She attended St. John's Parochial School, McKinley High School, and was a journalism graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. After graduating in 1921 she returned to Marshfield, where she was associated with the William Noll Hardware Store.

William Noll, her grandfather, established the William Noll and Sons Company on Jan. 15, 1887. Five years later,

Helen Martha was born on August 16, 1942, in Mt Horeb Wisconsin to Benedict and Bertha (Vils) Zimmermann. In 1947 her family moved to Switzerland where she attended grade school for two years before returning to settle in Cen ral Wisconsin, and then finally, Marshfield in 1952.

She attended St John the Baptist Grade School and gradu ated from Columbus High School, class of 1961. Helen and Ronald Gotz were married on November 25, 1961. Together they owned Clover Breeze Farm, Registered Holsteins.

Helen always possessed a spirited attitude and was unafraid to try a new adventure. She was one of the Associated Milk Producers Inc (AMPI) Girls and was instrumental in founding the Dairy Breakfast in Marshfield, (later known as Dairyfest) at the Parkway grocery store. She was a co-owner of what is now the Winterberry subdivision in the town of McMillian. Helen was also a member of the St. John's Altar Society. In addition to being a homemaker and farmer, she was a long time Avon Lady, delivered telephone books, managed rental properties and worked for years at her son' store, GL Hobby.

Helen had many talents and hobbies. She painted pumpkins and birdhouses. She loved cardinals (not the baseball team,) the Cubs (yes, the baseball team,) the Packers, romance nov els, dancing, music and took nearly as much pride in grow ing her flowers as she did in growing her children. She was a tremendous cook and baker, insisting on never divulging her

Helen and Ronald were married for 62 years. They were rue partners in life and on the farm. Her children and grand children were a joy to her, but her love for Ron animated her

In addition to her husband Ronald, she is survived by five children, Brian (Marcy) Gotz, Van Patrick (Renee), Joe (Karen), Gretchen (Charles) and Angela (Russell Field), fif een grandchildren, McKenzie (William Herian), Matthew (Rebekah), Abigail (Seth Pratt), Zachary, Staci (John Bieraugel), Benjamin (Taylor), Jakob (Vivienne), Sydney, Alyssa and Emily (Daschel), Laurel (Aaron Margetta), John, Leah, Maria and Peter (Field), eight great grandchildren, seven siblings Paul (MariLynn) Zimmermann, Karl (Cathy) Zimmer mann, Mary (James) Weigel, Peter (Sharon) Zimmermann, Katherine Switlick, Henry (Alonie) Zimmermann and Thomas Zimmermann.

She was preceded in death by her parents Benedict and Bertha and her siblings, Elizabeth (Kenneth Soper), Benedic Ir (Geraldine) Zimmermann, Joseph Zimmermann and Bernard (Betty) Zimmermann.

the business was incorporated as "William Noll Hardware," a name which existed in Marshfield until 1963. One of the sons, Charles, died in 1902, and the founder died March 23, 1908, leaving the two remaining sons to operate the business. Frank A. Noll obtained a controlling interest by purchasing the stock held by his brother, William W. Noll, in 1925. Two years later the death of Frank Noll left the management of the business to his daughter, Agnes Noll, who had been assisting in the store for the previous two

The business continued with Miss Noll serving as secretary and treasurer and her brother, Attorney Frank W. Noll, Aberdeen, South Dakota, as president of the concern, a closed corporation with all stock held by members of the Noll family.

The original store was one of the many buildings destroyed when the Marshfield fire of 1887 swept the thriving lumber town and was immediately rebuilt as a brick structure. Years later another structure of similar size was erected adjacent to it, and in 1922 the store was completely remodeled and modernized, with the double building transformed into a single large room.

In 1941, Agnes saw this single space divided into two store fronts. The hardware store continued operations in the north half of the building. Within the hardware store, Miss Noll included a small gift department featuring crystal glassware, dinnerware, pottery and other items. She expanded the gift department into the south half of the building in 1945 as Noll's Gift Shop. The new store was operated as a separate enterprise by Miss Noll until her death in 1979. The hardware business was sold to Don and Barb Hiller in 1963

Even as an active businesswoman, Agnes Noll's volunteerism added to the character of the community. During the late 1930s and into the 40s, Agnes, a member of the Helping Hand Society, headed the annual local sale of penny Christmas seals. Half of the proceeds of these sales went to the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association and the remaining half was retained by the Marshfield Anti-Tuberculosis Association for use in local projects directed against the white plague.

During World War II, Miss Noll served as the city chairman for the women's division of war loan drives multiple times. Under her guidance the division raised its quota or more during every bond drive, contributing to similar successes for the entire North Wood County Drive which contributed millions of dollars toward support of the war effort.

To support the North Wood County War Bond Committee, Miss Noll, president of the Business and

Professional Women's Club, led that group in conducting a Marshfield consumer survey. They completed a house-tohouse canvass to obtain the names of all employed adults, the number of children in each family, and the addresses for use of the committee.

In April 1950, Agnes Noll was appointed to the Board of Trustees for the Marshfield Free Library by Mayor A.J. Reeths. She served as a resolute and hard-working board member, secretary, and president for nearly thirty years. Her efforts contributed greatly to such accomplishments as the new library building on East Second Street in 1960, installation of the Stierle Bird Collection display, and development of a wide range of services offered by the library, and particularly for the children's department.

For the new library dedication, Miss Noll wrote a 12-page history of the library with special emphasis on Amander E. Beebee, whose generosity made the building possible, features of construction, and stories of the staff who served the library and community through the years.

In addition to these, Miss Noll was a member of Sacred Heart Church, Catholic Daughters of America, Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, Operation Downtown Update's Government and Liaison Committee, Downtown Business Association, Stierle Bird Club, and the State Council of Library Development. Furthermore, she chaired the Store Front Improvement Committee, was past president of the American Legion Auxiliary, and from 1943-45, 1948-49, and 1954-55 president of Marshfield Business and Professional Women's Club.

Marshfield lost a pioneer who had spent countless years serving the community when Miss Agnes Noll died at the age of 80 on Feb. 25, 1979. Her service to the community was long and varied and through the years touched many, many segments of the city. Miss Noll was always a woman to speak her mind. But her talk and action and leadership were always tuned to the best interests of the community.

and somebody else says another thing, and then the conversation continues on and


I feel this strongly when I am with my grandchildren spending time with them; they are young and don't have the disruptions and distractions of the world yet. They are just



an efficient meeting using Robert's Rules of Order. Quiz Bowl, an FFA trivia contest where middle school teams battle head-to-head on



We are very proud of the accomplishments of these students and look forward to seeing them on our teams in future events

### School District of Greenwood Update

On April 2, voters will be asked to vote on an operational referendum that replaces the current referendum to exceed the revenue limit for the next four years. This referendum is vital to the School District of Greenwood to continue offering services to our students that allows them to adequately prepare for their future. An operational referendum is just that, money needed to operate. There are many reasons districts such as Greenwood continue in this pattern of needing operational dollars from their local taxpayers. It is a system that was put in place back in 1993 by Governor Thompson and has not changed since, revenue limits. Although the idea was good, and many would argue effective to keep property taxes lower, it has not allowed school districts to keep up with inflation. The School District of Greenwood is over \$3,000 per student behind the standard rate of inflation since the inflation indicator was stopped from being used to calculate per pupil funding. The School District of Greenwood will ask the community to vote on this operational referendum that replaces the current operational referendum to exceed the revenue limit by \$225,000 in 2024-2025, \$1,525,000 in 2025-2026, \$1,625,000 in 2026-2027, and \$1,725,000 in 2027-2028. We currently have an active referendum for the 2024-2025 school year, the \$225,000 will help cover the projected deficit looking ahead. The goals of our school board with this referendum are to maintain student programming by operating a balanced budget, maintain a healthy fund balance to avoid any short term borrowing, and keep the mill rate at a place lower than it has traditionally been in our school district. The school board and I will be hosting informational sessions in the coming weeks to share more details about this referendum, answer questions from our community, and clarify any misconceptions about this referendum.

As always, I am thankful for the supportive community we live in. Greenwood is strong because of the membership and dedication to our kids and our school! We have great kids, great families, great staff and great facilities, which is the recipe for success! MARSHFIELD year marks the 25th anniversary of a real theater malfunction that could never be timed better.

A power outage darkened the stage at what's now **UW-Stevens** Point Marshfield during the Campus Community production of Players' The Hot l Baltimore. It's a comedy about a dying hotel where an eclectic group of residents dealt with calamities that included ...

yes, the lights burning out. Oct. 21, 1999 may have been the only night at the Helen Connor Laird Fine Arts Building where unplanned reality happened "right on cue." The initial shock was brief before the cast of 12 finished the play without missing a beat.

This was one of just two play reviews to which I was assigned during my 43year full-time journalism career. Back then, the Marshfield News-Herald sent reporters to CCP productions. Because this was new to me, now-retired Editor Bill Heath said to be kind in reporting my observations.

He was not saying I shouldn't "report it like it is" as I was long trained to do. But I knew what he meant. Before my brief 30-month stint at our city's daily newspaper, I admired performances of people I knew from their totally unrelated professions. A dentist, other medical

personnel, a funeral director, private business workers. musicians. educators and students are just a sampling of those who've graced the Connor Theater's stage since Marshfield's UW branch opened in the early 1960s.

Still, it was appropriate for my editor to point out that these are not pros, and they should not be evaluated as such.

Heath didn't need to tell me the value of community theater. For the performers, there's no better way to express their acting and musical talents in front of people they know. And at least some folks in the seats can be downright surprised by what those on-and-behind the stage do away from their main occupations.

On this night, the university's electric system stole the show - a rare "man bites dog" story that helps make journalism what it is. Beyond that, a relatively voung cast was up to the challenge of reflecting the play's colorful figures after the power outage.

The Hot l Baltimore is Lanford Wilson's comedy from 1973, staged in the hotel's lobby on a day when residents learned the decaying business would soon close: They received eviction notices in their mail. The "Hotel" in its name was missing its "e" on the front sign. Complaints about the facilities were loud-and-long; a window wouldn't shut, no hot water,

etc. Prostitutes and others raised havoc with clerks and the manager. Others spilled out memories about their lives and what they'll remember about the hotel.

The intense human emotions and passions gave this play its charm. No music; no orchestra; just the fascinating words of the

people on stage. I saw their

passion in this. The outage occurred as two characters were pondering their during the first scene after the intermission. When they finished their lines. some house lights went on as now-retired CCP Director Greg Rindfleisch told the audience he had two choices: send everyone home or let the play continue on a less-thanperfect stage so the theater goers could see the ending.


It was midnight in the hotel's lobby by then, and the script itself - including a dimmed hotel lobby -helped the performers feel right at home.

At least they looked calm-and-collected to this observer, one of close to 150 that night in a theater that was about two-thirds full. My News-Herald review mentioned the following cast members who survived this most-unusual obstacle: Dave Houston, Colleen Coy, Travis Lee Nelson, Debra Lulloff, Cathie Anderson, Theresa Anderegg, Corrine Kirsch, Andy Kaiser, Eric Garfield, Paul Lamberson and Aighleann McKiernan. # Wisconsin ROPS Rebate **Program re-launched**

### Oneida County farmer glad he made the call

MARSHFIELD --Wisconsin ROPS Rebate Program has announced new funding and a new reimbursement scheme limiting farmers' out-ofpocket expenses to \$500, no matter the total cost purchasing, shipping and installing a rollover protective structure.


The rebate program is run by the National Farm Medicine Center at Marshfield Clinic Research Institute and is made possible through generous philanthropic support from the Auction of Champions. More than 340 ROPS have been installed through the program since its inception

pleased "We're announce a recent increase in donor funding, which will enable us to start working through our wait list," said Casper Bendixsen, Ph.D., director of the National Farm Medicine Center.

Oneida County farmer John Engel, 58, started the new year by retrofitting his John Deere 3020 through the program. Engel will pay just \$472 out-of-pocket (after a rebate of \$1,101, or 70 percent of the total cost).

The JD 3020 was Engel's only tractor (out of six) without rollover protection,

which gnawed at him. "Due to the nature of our work, it's not unusual to take a person who has never driven a tractor before, and set them on this particular tractor to maybe rake straw or something, because the

3020 doesn't require a huge amount of skill to operate," Engel said.

He said he wouldn't be able to live with himself if a hired person or family member suffered a rolloverrelated injury while driving this tractor.

"The first tractor I owned was a Farmall B (built in the 1940s) and my daughter, who was probably 14 at the time, liked to drive it," Engel said. "Well, one day she popped a wheelie with it and that scared me. At that point I said, 'Hmm, I personally might take that

risk, but I am not going to put somebody else on a tractor that doesn't have that rollover protection and a seat belt, because one doesn't do any good without the other.' I got rid of that tractor."

Tractor overturns are the leading cause of farmrelated deaths in the U.S. That's why it's so important

that each tractor have a ROPS. A ROPS, when used with a seatbelt, is 99 percent effective in preventing injury or death in the event of an overturn.

More than half the tractors in Wisconsin do not have this protection. ROPS did not become standard on U.S.-manufactured tractors until 1985.

Engel grew up in Leon, near Sparta, in the hilly region of the state known as the Driftless Area. He did a lot of farm work as a youth. grandmother was pretty good at volunteering me to help neighboring farmers."






