Chestnut Center marks twentieth anniversary

MARSHFIELD – The Chestnut Center for the Arts has been around now for two decades, and those who run the place hope you'll be able to enjoy it for at least another twenty years.

Marshfield named Purple Heart City

MARSHFIELD - Marshfield has become just the third city in Wisconsin to receive Purple Heart City designation. The honor was officially announced May 23, during the Marshfield Area Chamber of Commerce & Industry's Business After 5 event, held last month at American Legion Post 54.

"Paul Rogers and Kathy Banks approached me with this idea, and here we are celebrating Marshfield as a Purple Heart City. Also, Tammy Neve, Commander of this outstanding American Legion Post 54, who too helped to make this happen, thank you all three and thank you everyone for the support," said Mayor Lois TeStrake, after she had read the official city proclamation supporting the naming of Marshfield as a Purple Heart city. "The banners up around the city, they look amazing. I'm sure you've seen a few, and there's quite a few, and thank you. Thank you to the City of Marshfield for allowing this to happen, Visit Marshfield - who actually paid for the banners on Veterans Parkway – what a great community effort that they have put forth with us, and also Heinzen Printing for doing the job seamlessly and beautifully."

The Purple Heart designation is a significant milestone in Marshfield's ongoing efforts to recognize and appreciate the acts of resiliency demonstrated by the brave men and women who have served our country, read an official press release. The Purple Heart is awarded to United States Armed Forces members who have been wounded or made the ultimate sacrifice in combat. It is a symbol of courage, sacrifice, and unwavering dedication to the principles of freedom and democracy.

Mayor TeStrake's proclamation underscores the city's commitment to supporting and honoring its veterans and their families, the release continued. The Purple Heart City designation is not just an honor; it's a promise – a promise to remember, appreciate, and support the heroes among us who have displayed remarkable courage and resilience during their service.

George Banda from the Milwaukee-based Military Order of the Purple Heart came to Marshfield to deliver the keynote address during the May 23 ceremony at the American Legion on South Maple Avenue.

"This is a very special moment for the city of Marshfield," Banda told the audience. "The Purple Heart is a medal that is revered by all veterans and civilians alike. It's a medal that nobody wants. You don't go out and try to earn it, believe me, but when you get it it's a very special thing to have.'

The Purple Heart, or Badge of Military Merit, was established by Gen. George Washington following the Revolutionary War. Although never abolished, the award of the badge was not proposed again officially until after World War I, when Gen. Douglas MacArthur proposed it be revived, and in 1931 reopened work on a redesigned medal. Purple Hearts were again being awarded by February of 1932, with the first one going to MacArthur.

"It's an incredible, special medal and if you ever see someone with a Purple Heart, please thank them for their service and their sacrifice because it is such a special award," said Banda, a Milwaukee native who served in Vietnam as an Army combat medic, and who has been awarded both a Purple Heart and a Silver Star medal for his service and bravery.

"One of the other things I need to tell you is that I am so impressed with this post. It is jaw-dropping," Banda added. "When I came in through the door and I looked around, I'm going, 'Oh my God.' And I've been to many, many posts throughout the state of Wisconsin and the country. This is like number one. I mean, this is incredible. And that shows something about the support that you have from the community, from people who want to support and fund things like that, so when you have people that step up and give you the funds to be able to do it, and then have the community support it and get everybody together to build something this beautiful, this is just wonderful."

Banks, meanwhile, received special recognition during the evening's festivities for her work in organizing Marshfield's annual Honor Walk, which remembers the city's veterans with special banners hung from light poles along Central Avenue and Veterans Parkway.

"I'll tell you what, this is not an easy program," said longtime American Legion volunteer and organizer Mike Feirer. "She sure takes a lot of grief for this, but it's a beautiful program. We started with sixty in Marshfield and she's now on four-hundred around the state in the area."

Feirer presented Banks with a medallion that reads "Post 54 Marshfield" on the front and "Kathy Banks, for your dedication to our Veterans" on the back

Armed stalker apprehended after police pursuit

Incident occurred near MHS graduation ceremony

MARSHFIELD - A Marshfield man is facing a handful of charges after police caught him with a loaded gun near a residence he had been warned to stay away from.

Marshfield police officers were dispatched shortly after noon on May 25 to the area of Edison Street and Hinman Avenue, for a report of a man who appeared to be having mental health issues. The man, who appeared to have a firearm on his hip, backed away from officers and started running through back yards. Officers recognized the suspect as the same man who was recently issued a warning stalking letter to stay away from a Marshfield resident's home who lived near that area.

As more Marshfield officers and Wood County Sheriff's Deputies arrived on the scene, the man was seen trying to gain access to his victim's home. Officers shouted commands at the man to get down old Marshfield man who lives outside the on the ground. The man did not comply city limits in Marathon County.

and fled on foot. After a short foot pursuit, the man was taken into custody without incident. A loaded .22 caliber revolver was recovered from the man's waist. He was then transported to the Wood County Jail in Wisconsin Rapids after medical clearance was completed at Marshfield Medical Center.

Charges requested through the Wood County District Attorney's Office include: Stalking with a Dangerous Weapon; Carrying a Concealed Weapon; Carrying a Firearm on School Grounds; Resisting an Officer.

The man was briefly on Madison Elementary School property (sidewalk) and at no time was he on the grounds of nearby Marshfield High School, where graduation ceremonies for the class of 2024 were taking place outdoors at Heiting Community Stadium.

The man was later identified as a 66-year-

MARSHFIELD - The next phase of adding new classroom and athletic space at Columbus Catholic is underway.

Marshfield Columbus Catholic Schools (CCS) on May 23 held a groundbreaking ceremony for a new Educational and Athletic Center at the build site, located in between Columbus Catholic High/Middle School and Our Lady of Peace Intermediate Schools, along Columbus Ave.

"Relief," CCS President David Eaton told Hub City Times following the ceremony. "We first started talking about something like this probably eight years ago or so. Really in the last three we really picked up the pace and really have been working hard to get to the point where we can break ground and know we're going to do this."

City of Marshfield Mayor Lois Testrake and State Representative Donna Rozar were on hand to say a few words. Additionally, CCS Dean Father Robertson gave a special blessing for the groundbreaking and blessed the

"We'd also like to thank all our other donors, our local parishes, and our parish priests, especially our Dean, Fr. Robertson, whose support helped us secure the support and approval of Bishop Emeritus Callahan," said Joe Konieczny. "And lastly, we'd like to thank Marawood Construction, the many subcontractors who have pledged in-kind gifts to this project, and Forward Bank for helping us make this dream a reality."

The Educational and Athletic Center will connect Columbus Catholic High/Middle School and Our Lady of Peace Intermediate Schools and will include: four full practice courts with portable bleachers, four classrooms to accommodate growing enrollment, a fitness center, batting cages, locker rooms, a referee room, concession stand, bathrooms, a stage for events/performances, and storage

Eaton says it is a list of needs and not necessarily wants. "It genuinely is, for a couple of different reasons," Eaton told Hub City Times. "Our enrollment has been growing steadily and we're at the point where, over at St. John's, we are opening a fourth classroom of some of the grades. We try to keep our class sizes down to seventeen or fewer. And really, we're going to run out of space at the pace

we're continuing to grow," Eaton added. "So, those four classrooms that we're adding, maybe not right away are going to be a need, but they're going to need to be there to let us continue to expand enrollment."

A decade or so ago, CCS enrollment was at an all-time low of about 450 students. Current enrollment is now at 650 kids, with some of the largest class sizes seen in years coming up through the ranks.

"We're projecting at least 670, 680, could be 690 or more because that's the kind of pace we've been on in terms of growth," Eaton added. "That's Pre-K through twelve, so it's our whole system. And most of it is growth from the bottom. St. John's, our primary school, pre-school through second grade, it's full. Those are where our largest classes $% \left\{ 1\right\} =\left\{ 1\right$ are. One of our largest classes is about to come over and join us in third grade next year."

Anticipated uses for the fieldhouse include: athletic practices and physical education space for CCS; hosting tournaments; events such as the CCS Alpine Holiday; and hosting parish and Diocese of La Crosse events.

'We really only have one full-sized court, and it's tied up all day and all night," Eaton told us. "This will give us an opportunity to have our eighteen basketball teams, for instance, practiced and sent home by six o'clock."

"Really exciting day," Konieczny added, during his public comments to those gathered for groundbreaking ceremonies. "I've been here for twenty years and we have maximized everything we have as far as resources, to make sure that we continue to produce an unbelievable product. And I heard Mr. Eaton say two words that really bothered me. He said the word 'waiting-list,' and I said that cannot happen. Whoever wants to come to Columbus needs to be at Columbus, because I see what the staff does every day, and I see what the students go on to do."



Marshfield 150 for 150: **Kathy Biederwolf**

NOMINATED BY KATHY CAMPBELL AND THE FAITH LUTHERAN CHURCH ADULT CHOIR

Marshfield's artistic community blossoms beyond other small cities. Many in that community can thank Kathy Biederwolf for helping their own talents blossom.

That's what great teachers do. Kathy's mentors included a world-renown choral music leader at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa. Not long after, she taught for around 15 years at Marshfield High School - showing students how the richness of music can connect with whatever careers they pursue.

She also spent decades in her church and community as a choir conductor, singer and piano/organ accompanist. She has enriched countless cultural and spiritual lives. That's because Kathy Biederwolf never stopped teaching. It shows during rehearsals.

"She has ears like radar," said Thom Gerretsen, a tenor in the Adult Choir at Marshfield's Faith Lutheran Church. "I stand 20 yards away, hidden among other singers while she plays the piano. And she tells how I screw up a note! That's amazing: I'm so thankful."

A native of Red Wing, Minnesota, Kathy is a 1969 graduate of Luther in music and German. She was in the school's Nordic Choir, which entertains audiences worldwide. The group performed in Marshfield Jan. 29, 2024. Kathy and fellow Nordic alum Bonnie Brix joined the students in singing their final song.

Kathy was a singer and accompanist for the late Weston Noble, who led Luther's choir for 57 years. Another Nordic Choir singer - former music instructor and Faith Choir Director Julie Crist - recalls that Kathy was one of Weston's favorite accompanists. "I believe he told me that with a twinkle in his eye," Julie later said.

At Marshfield High, Kathy taught music theory and directed the school's choir and Madrigal Singers. She also taught German to students and has long put that skill to good use for the region's Central Chamber Chorale. "When we perform music in German, she helps guide us to proper pronunciation," said Chorale singer Ann Stevning-Roe, who also chairs the group's board.

Kathy followed Lyle Iverson as the high school's choir director. Another skilled choral leader, Greg Reierson. then took her place to lead Faith Lutheran's choir. Greg called her a "truly valuable resource" in his own teaching years.

She extraordinarily shares her faith, serving the final one-third of Marshfield's first 150 years in numerous leadership and performing roles at Faith Lutheran while

helping worshipers in their spiritual journeys.

Kathy once joined others to fill in as the church's main organist and choral accompanist. After repeat stints as Adult Choir director, she later settled into more permanent roles selecting hymns for Faith's traditional services and as the choir's accompanist.

Julie Crist called Kathy's talent a beautiful gift. "Her

ability to masterfully play any piece of music put in front of her is invaluable," and Faith is blessed immeasurably by her "willingness to use her gift to serve in so many ways." For two months in 2024, Kathy added another role: leading Faith's choir from the piano after the previous director left to have an early-arriving baby.

It wasn't the first time she was thrust into unexpected service. Ann Stevning-Roe was helping a judge at a regional school solo/ensemble competition around 2010 when a young singer's accompanist fell ill and supplied a compact disc that couldn't be heard. "The student and her mother were in a panic," said Ann, who arranged for Kathy to transpose the song so the student could sing it.

The youngster advanced to state competition.

For years, Kathy has given the Central Chamber Chorale her alto singing voice and accompaniments that sometimes needed more than two hands. She has also performed with the Marshfield/Wood County Symphony Orchestra and the community's former Palm Sunday concerts.

Her piano music has enhanced many theatrical productions at UW-Stevens Point at Marshfield and other local stages. It keeps singing actors in tune, accentuates speaking parts and helps scenes flow smoothly.

"The world of theatre here in Marshfield would not be the same without Kathy," said Donna Thompson, who has directed plays and their music for numerous local performances. "She has made my job so much easier. Her ability to play so many styles of music and in any key is so impressive.'

Faith Lutheran choir members called Kathy a faithful, humble servant who shows support for her home-state pro football team, the Minnesota Vikings. "A true musician in every sense of the word," said soprano Ruth Stram.

In the city's next 150 years, Kathy Biederwolf's imprint will live on in others with an impact well-deserving of her place among Marshfield's 150 notables in its initial oneand-a-half centuries.

a small fire on the first floor of the home. Both fires were quickly extinguished.

Crews utilized ventilation fans to clear the smoke and toxic gasses from the house. All hot spots where found and extinguished. Fire investigators were called in to determine origin and cause, which were still undetermined at press time.

under the eaves of the roof, giving an abundance of daylight and the projecting roof keeping out the sun rays. On the right and left sides, 34 large booths with a frontage of 12 feet and a depth of 11 feet were built for mercantile displays. This enabled visitors to look from one end of the building and see the entire length of all the displays with an unobstructed view. This building was constructed under the supervision of F. A. Felhofer, the well-known Marshfield contractor, G. A. Krasin drew the plans; lumber came from the Connor Retail Lumber Co.; glass originated from Krasin Bros.; plumbing

was done by Schreiner & Son; electric wiring and fixtures furnished by Merkel Electric Co.

Minor leads three agencies on high-speed chase





Marshfield police looking for man accused of punching woman he met online







MARSHFIELD – In a game delayed one day by rain, the Columbus Dons saw their baseball season come to an end, with a 2-1 loss to Eleva-Strum in a Div. 4 Regional Semifinal, played May 29 at Marshfield High School's Safford Field.

The day started off great for Columbus. Sophomore pitcher Mac Konieczny struck out the side in the top of the first inning. But in the top of the second inning, Konieczny walked Jake Bjerke, who would soon take second after Mac's pickoff attempt sailed past first baseman Cy Becker. But when Bjerke tried to take third on a bunt by Carter Gunderson, Konieczny atoned for his earlier error, fielded the ball cleanly, then threw it to older brother Emmitt Konieczny out near second base, who relayed the ball to Carter Sommer at third to get the lead runner, as Gunderson reached first on the fielder's choice.

A bit of confusion then followed, and it seemed to rattle the Columbus defense just enough. While the next batter – Calvin Barneson – was at the plate, Gunderson was suddenly awarded second base, and nobody seemed to know why. A few pitches later, Barneson struck out. Or so most thought. Eleva-Strum coaches argued the third strike on Barneson was actually the second, because an earlier pitch by Konieczny was a quietly-called balk which now explained Gunderson's trip to second base. Following the Eleva-Strum appeal, Barneson's strikeout was nullified and he resumed his at-bat. Konieczny walked him on the next pitch. Tyler Webb's subsequent single loaded the bases for the Cardinals with just one out. The next batter, Brady Zimple, sent a sacrifice fly ball out to leftfield, which scored Gunderson from third. Konieczny struck out the next batter to end the inning.

The Dons tied the game in their half of the third inning. Nate Nemitz drew a one-out walk, then went to second on a passed ball by Eleva-Strum pitcher Carter Gunderson. The next batter, Blake Jakobi, singled, then stole second. Mac Konieczny helped his own cause by sending a sacrifice fly to centerfield, scoring Nemitz from third. After Emmitt Konieczny walked, Cy Becker lined out to Gunderson on the mound to end the Columbus threat, with the game now tied at 1 apiece.


It remained that way until the top of the sixth inning. Emmitt Konieczny issued a leadoff walk to Zimple that would come back to haunt the Dons in a big way. While the elder Konieczny was striking out the next batter, Zimple stole second, then advanced to third on a groundball out by Brady Nichols. The next hitter for the Cardinals – Justin Becker – delivered what turned out to be the game-winning hit, an RBI single that scored Zimple, giving the visitors a 2-1 lead.

In the bottom of the sixth and seventh innings, Gunderson struck out four of the seven batters he faced, en route to a complete-game win. No come-from-behind win for Columbus on this day, like they had the week prior, when they scored the game-winning run in the bottom of the seventh inning, in a 6-5 win over Elmwood/ Plum City in a Regional Quarterfinal contest May 23.

Against Eleva-Strum, the Konieczny brothers combined for eleven strikeouts while giving up just three hits. Gunderson, meanwhile, struck out eight Columbus batters in the win for the Cardinals.

The Dons ended their season 16-4. Three of those losses came in their last four games. The Dons were the undefeated champions of the Eastern Cloverbelt Conference, at 10-0.

Eagles punch ticket to state softball tourney

MARSHFIELD – With two outs in the sixth inning of a scoreless game, catcher Dani Blomberg blasted what some historians might consider the biggest hit to date in Auburndale softball history.

With runners at second and third and stepping in to face one of the state's premier softball pitchers – Eleva-Strum's Ruby Bartholomew – Blomberg uncorked one down the right field line for an opposite-field triple that scored Mya Krings from third and Breleigh Grimm from second. The shot to right was the second hit of the game for Blomberg, and just the third of the game for the Eagles, who with the 2-0 win advanced to the WIAA Div. 4 State Semifinals

on Thursday, June 6. Auburndale will play Cuba City at 6:30 p.m. at Goodman Diamond in Madison. Play-by-play coverage of that game will be provided by SportsRadio 92.3 FM – WOSQ. Pre-game programming starts at 6 p.m.

In a Sectional Championship game – played May 30 at Blair-Taylor High School – which was scoreless through five-and-a-half innings, Auburndale came to bat in the bottom of the sixth, with the top of the order due up. It was now or never. Krings led off the inning with just the second Auburndale hit of the game. Morgan Griesbach then used a sacrifice bunt to, not only move Krings into scoring position, but eliminate a potential double play



situation. The strategy paid off in a big way. After Samantha Stanton struck out, Blomberg delivered her magical shot a few moments later. With Blomberg still at third, Taylor Anderson struck out to end the inning. Now there was just a small matter of three outs to record, and the history books would be rewritten.

In the Eleva-Strum seventh inning, Terris Quick drew a leadoff walk, just one of two issued by ace Morgan Griesbach. The next batter, Jaelyn Knutson, lined one right to Auburndale second baseman Breleigh Grimm, who then quickly threw to first base to double off Quick, who was running on the play. Then Griesbach did

what she had been doing all afternoon – strike people out. And with a trip to the state tournament just one out away, Eleva-Strum's next batter – freshman infielder Mariah Steffenson – didn't stand a chance. Griesbach made quick work of Steffenson, recording her ninth strikeout of the game, and sending the Eagles on a trip south to kick off their summer vacation. Griesbach pitched a complete-game, three-hit shutout for the win.

Auburndale is now 21-3 and has not lost a game since April 25. During their postseason run thus far, the Eagles beat Necedah 15-0 in four innings, in a Regional Semifinal May 22 at Auburndale High School. The following evening, Auburndale knocked off Marathon 7-2 at home, to claim the Regional championship.



And while the Chestnut Center features plenty of art, it also has actual artists. Gene Wesley and Kathryn Petke are current artists in residence whose paintings are being featured this month at the Chestnut Center, which gets a small percentage of each painting's proceeds.

Also featured is the center's "Once Loved Art," a growing collection which has been donated to support community art and theatre programs for all ages.

But there are many forms of art, and the Chestnut Center has them all.

"Being an arts center, we don't just focus on art itself," Smazal noted. "We also focus on theatre arts and we focus on music and we're trying to get a variety of the arts here, as much as we possibly can offer. We're somewhat limited with our spacing."

In the spacing it does have – thanks to an education wing which the church added in 1960 – the Chestnut Center offers a lot, from oil-painting, watercolor, and rose mauling classes to Taekwondo and Zumba classes, and more.

"We're really trying to reach out to the community," says Smazal, who teaches toddler music

"I was teaching music in public schools and I was retiring from Spencer, and I thought, 'I want to do something with music.' I did K-12 and I thought, 'I'll try toddlers,' and I just love it. It's been twelve years now," recalled Smazal. "And as you gradually get involved in the place, you understand what they're doing and you get excited about their mission, and I was capable of doing some of those things. It's been a real exciting thing for me because I see this place growing and expanding and people coming here and wanting to be a part of it, and I just want the community to know about us and know that we are vital and we are there for everybody."

Everybody, and just about anything.
"The arts are food for the

soul," said Smazal. "Our community has been real supportive of needs of the community, like a family that needs help or they raise money for so-and-so, and I think we forget that we need support for our own souls. And whether it's coming to a performance or whether it's taking an art class, some people send us real nice heartfelt notes about, 'Boy, this class meant a lot to me,' 'I didn't know I had this much talent,' or 'The teacher was so good about making me feel good, not knowing what I was doing, and I really came away with something really special.' People love taking our clay class and our stained glass classes."

The performance venue regularly features musical and comedy acts, plays by various groups – including the Marshfield Area Actors – and more.

The center will also host "Enchanted Forest," a series of summer theatre camps, June 24-27 and July 22-25, for students in grades 3 through 6.

A summer art camp, "Exploring the Wonders of Nature," is also planned for July 15-18, for students in grades 1 through 8.

"We get involved with Make Music Day," Smazal added. "We were one of the groups that organized that, and this is our fourth year coming up June 21, so we're having entertainment at Wenzel Plaza and Columbia Park."

On June 15, the Chestnut Center will host a Daddy/ Daughter Date Night event. There will also be an open house July 27, during Main Street Marshfield's annual Hub City Days celebration. Other upcoming events include the classical chamber music of South Beach Up North on Saturday, Aug. 3. The Old Time Brass polka band will be featured during the Harvest Moon Family Dance, Saturday, Sept. 14. A Halloween Dance will follow on Friday, Oct. 25, complete with costume judging and DJ Ben Holbeck. And this November, the center will host "An Evening of Jazz," featuring musicians from area high school jazz bands.

"And then afterwards we're going to have a little reception and have

a birthday cake," Smazal added.

That event will mark the 100th anniversary of the one-time First Presbyterian Church holding its first service in that building in December of 1924.

Jamaican Kitchens Catering is headquartered at Chestnut, as is Jenni Jane Photography. And there's space available for rent, like the music therapist who currently rents a room for her practice. A few spaces remain on the lower level.

"It's a quiet area of the building," Smazal says. "You're not getting too much interruption here."

The ballroom is also featured on the lower level of the building, which has featured fundraising events, live music and more.

"What we're looking at for the future - and we've priced this out with some estimates and some different things - is to get a lift to take people into the ballroom," said Smazal. "And then to get you from the street, we would have another lift or possibly a ramp and then a handicapped bathroom. That's what we're hoping to look at in the future, to make the building accessible to our people. The Aster building across the street, you know, we want them to come to our events. They want them to be here for things, and they

can get upstairs currently, but not down."

"We're looking support," Smazal told us. "We've been doing the Art Champions campaign. We would like to reach fifty-thousand to cover our costs. We have to keep this building running. We have lots of rooms that haven't been named yet, so we're hoping we can keep ourselves around for another twenty years. The thing that's holding us back is just the funding that we need to keep from year to year, because we want to be long-range planners. We're

starting an endowment fund and we're hoping that people think of us in their estate planning and think of giving us something to keep us secure so that we're not going year to year hoping, 'Are we going to survive?' We need to have the arts in Marshfield."

The Chestnut Center is

also available to rent for weddings, parties, meetings and more.

You can visit during normal business hours, Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., or by appointment. The center's website is www. chestnutarts.org.
