

The State Historic Preservation Office announced its decision at their Board of Review meeting on Friday, May 24.

The nomination now goes to the National Park Service for a decision to place the park on the National Register of Historic Places.

Last year, the New London Public Museum, Hatten Stadium Foundation, and New London Parks and Recreation Department worked with historic preservation consultant Elizabeth Miller to nominate Hatten

Waupaca computer system hacked

School tight on details

WAUPACA – The Waupaca School Board convened a special meeting on Thursday, May 30 to discuss what the school has referred to as the recent "internet

disruption." On May 13 the school district's computer systems crashed. The WiFi was down, the phones and printers were down, the phone system did not work and students could not log into their Schoology portal. Even the bell system that rings for the end of class periods was dysfunctional.

Board members Steve Klismet, Lori Verhalen, Molly McDonald and Betty Manion were the only ones present. There were a handful of school administrators in attendance.

The first part of the meeting was a closed session for "deliberating or negotiating regarding public business including negotiations and bargaining regarding claims made to the district regarding internet issues." The



closed session lasted a little

over an hour. The second part of the meeting was reconvened into an open session where the board voted unanimously to authorize the district's core team to take action to "complete the transactions related to resolving the May 13, 2024 network disruption, and any actions taken by the Core Team prior to the date of this resolution, which would have been authorized by this resolution

but for the fact that such

actions were taken prior to such date."

The Core Team is composed of school district employees who are handling the computer system malfunction.

Klismet presided over the meeting. When asked by the Waupaca County Post if the school system was hacked and being held for ransom he replied, "At this point we're limited to what we can say."

When asked by the Post if any student's personal data has been compromised,

Klismet replied, "At this point we are limited to what we can say."

When asked by the Post what law enforcement agencies were involved, Klismet replied that the board was not privy to some information.

Suspicious activity

The next day on May 31, Ashlee Trzebiatowski, the school's system analyst, sent an email to the parents of

Drug dealer sent to state prison

Police found \$30,000 of narcotics

STEVENS POINT -Portage County Circuit Court Judge Patrica Baker sentenced Virus Moore, 47, Milwaukee, to prison after he was convicted of one count of possession with in-

tent to deliver cocaine. Moore was sentenced on May 31 to an 18-year prison sentence, consisting of eight years of initial confinement and 10 years of extended supervision.

Charges of possession with intent to deliver narcotics and intent to deliver heroin were dismissed but read into the record for sentencing purposes as part of a plea agreement.

In June 2021, a search warrant executed in Stevens Point turned up a backpack hidden in the basement that contained large amounts of cocaine, heroin and fentanyl.

Based upon the quantities and purities of these controlled substances, investigators determined

that they had been imported from outside for p distribution,. The street value of the drugs were estimated to be approximately \$30,000.

Virus Moore charged in connection to these controlled substances in late 2023 after further

investigation determined his role in obtaining and possessing these controlled substances. Two other codefendants have already been prosecuted and sentenced to prison for their roles in the drug conspiracy.

In her sentencing remarks, Baker indicated her belief that the evidence showed that the defendant was a professional drug trafficker.

She highlighted the harm caused by individuals importing drugs from outside the community and cited examples of individuals with whom she has had contact with in the court system and whose lives have been devastated

"We are writing to notify you of a recent event that impacted our school district's network systems. On May 13, 2024, the district became aware of suspicious activity causing a disruption within our computer network. The district immediately began an investigation with the assistance of thirdparty cyber security and network specialists to determine the nature and scope of the activity, confirm its impact on our systems, and to restore functionality to our network. We also provided notice to federal law enforcement as well as relevant state regulators, as required. Through the investigation, we determined that an unauthorized actor did gain access to our network causing the service disruption. Further, we confirmed that no student or parent information was impacted by this event.

We take the confidentiality, privacy, and security of information in our care seriously. As part of this ongoing commitment, we are reviewing our existing policies and procedures, and implementing additional technical safeguards. Throughout this disruption, our building entrances remained secure and we were able to continue with inperson learning.

"While our technology networks and security systems are up to date, unfortunate events like this happen. And while our desire was to communicate this information to families sooner, protecting the integrity of the investigation limited us in sharing information.

Soft-target schools

Ransomware attacks are one the rise in Wisconsin and across the nation. The school districts of Janesville, Neenah, Middleton, Kenosha, Elmbrook, Adams-Friendship and Tigerton have been hacked.

This was predicted in a 2020 white paper published by the Wisconsin Legislative Reference Bureau, titled, "Ransomware Attacks: Lessons for Wisconsin State and Local Government."

"Public institutions often have computer systems that are easy to attack. Governments and schools with limited budgets tend not to keep up with all of the latest, often safer, technology trends. As a result, these institutions might be running older computers and software that do not have builtin protection for newer and more sophisticated malware threats. Rigorous security processes could mitigate much of the risk of the older systems, but public entities often spend less than the commercial sector on the IT staff that would implement those processes," wrote author Staci Duros.

The largest targeted attack in the upper Midwest was the hacking of the Minneapolis Public School District. Student and school employee information was held for ransom: medical records, truancy, grades, Social Security numbers and private behavioral informa-

tion such as abusive family environments, psychiatric problems, sexual incidents and suicide attempts.

The school district refused to pay \$1 million ransom so the hackers dumped the personal files of 36,000 students online and onto the dark web.

According to a 2023 report by the Associated Press, the district did not inform the parents of their child's private information getting hi-jacked. There is no federal law that requires them

"Despite parents' and teachers' frustration, schools are routinely advised by incident response teams concerned about legal liability issues and ransom negotiations against being more transparent," wrote the AP reporting team.

The Minneapolis school officials referred to their attack on Feb. 17 as a "system incident" and "technical difficulties."

When the Neenah School district was hacked on Jan. 10, 2002, it was not known if the district paid the ran-

Appleton Post-Crescent reporter Duke Behnke looked into it and concluded, "A lot is unknown, at least publicly, about the Jan. 10 ransomware attack that disabled the school district's internet, phones, email and other information technology, resulting in a two-day shutdown of schools."

Behnke noted that the school's communication manager declined to say if anything was paid by the school or its insurance com-



Portage County Board reviews its sexual harassment policies

STEVENS POINT -Portage County Board members received updated workplace harassment policies during their monthly meeting on May 28.

Lawyer Kyle Gulya presented these policies and expectations for the board.

A main focus of Gulya's presentation was how important it is for people in power to set the tone for a healthy workplace culture.

"The culture is what sets your workplace apart", Gulya said. "You are under a

Gulya discussed four core values for a healthy work environment. "The first is that we have people who professionally respect one another. The second is we have regard for basic

The third is that we have people who exercise empathy. The fourth is the pest thing you can do is the right thing. The worst thing you can do is noth-

Gulya also warned the board about people who might be more subject to this type of treatment.

"More than half of women have been targets of harassment in their workplace", Gulva said. "The majority don't tell anyone."

Gulya talked about how action is paramount when there are allegations of misconduct.

"Apathy is such a destructive force", said Gulya. "Put yourself in the shoes of the target of harassment."

He encouraged county supervisors to be part of the solution."



REGION - Portage County Solid Waste reported a significant increase in wrongly recycled items being delivered to their facility in recent weeks.

The county is advising residents and businesses to be more mindful of the materials they're placing into recycling bins, carts and dumpsters.

As a reminder, only the following may be recycled: plastic bottles, jugs and tubs, aluminum and steel cans, flattened cardboard, mixed paper, and glass bottles and jars.

Refrain from bagging recyclables, keep them loose to ensure they'll be

recycled.

Bagged materials pose safety risks to workers and are pulled from the sorting line and placed into the trash.

Recyclables from Adams, Marathon, Portage, Waupaca, Waushara and Wood counties are delivered to the Portage County Solid Waste Facility for processing.

Bid for grandstand approved

Clintonville to fix canopy

CLINTONVILLE The city of Clintonville with use money from its General Fund Emergency Reserves to partially fund the project to fix safety issues with the grandstand canopy at Jirschele Field at W.A. Olen Park.

Approval to move forward with the project came from the Clintonville Common Council when it met May 14.

At the meeting, the council approved the bid of \$66,075 from Benson and Houle of Rosendale to complete the project. The city had budgeted \$30,000 in its Capital Improvement Plan for the project, so the amount over \$30,000 will come from the General Fund Emergency Reserves.

Committee of the Whole

During the May 14 Committee of the Whole meeting, held prior to the council meeting, City Administrator Caz Muske said the city has been working with the Clintonville School District and the Clintonville Athletic Club to deal with the safety concerns regarding the bleachers at Jirschele Field.

Public Works and Parks and Recreation Director Justin Mc Auly also said the original bid the city received from Beson and Houle was for \$74,550. Changes were made to that bid in an effort to get the final cost closer to the city's budget number.

Removed from the bid was pavement patching, and the addition of topsoil and seeding the topsoil.

"That's something we can do in-house and probably save quite a bit," Mc Auly said. "A lot of that stuff we have available."

In an April 29 email to Muske that contained information about the reduction of the bid number, Jesse Houle of Beson and Houle said, "Really just proposing they eliminate those items (that I am assuming they may be able to source less expensively local) and offering a credit of \$5,000 if awarded and we can get moving on this. The credit really comes from B&H wanting to work (with) the City on this and future work and subs willing to hold pricing/offer credits back as well."

When completed, Mc Auly said the facility will give individuals with disabilities the opportunity to watch games at the sta-

"Right now, all we have is two, five-row bleachers, that fits about 78 people," Mc Auly said. "Individuals with disabilities really don't have an appropriate area to sit. It's very poor seating. If you go along the first base line, it's all sloped hill. And down by the infield, it's just the entrance area where

you can sit or pull a wheelchair up. Otherwise, you'd be a long distance away from the field. This will allow us to safely open up the facility for individuals with disabilities and other spectators to sit in the old grandstands."

Muske reiterated to the council that the city had only reserved \$30,000 for

"It is over budget, but given the safety concerns and the appropriate use of our reserves fund to offset the costs of this project to maintain the safety of the facility, so the recommendation is for the variance to come from the general fund reserve," Muske said.

Ald. Stephanie Bonikowske said the Clintonville Legion baseball team is scheduled to host the state tournament in 2025.

"So, it's very important to get it (bleacher project) done for that as well," Bonikowske said.

Ald. Greg Rose, who is also a teacher for the Clintonville School District, said that the school's baseball team and the parents of the players are "not happy" that the grandstand bleachers can not be used at this

"We are looking forward to being able to come to a conclusion for this, and quickly," Rose said.

Since the city received only one bid for the project, Rose asked how bids were requested.

Mc Auly said the bid process was conducted by Kunkel Engineering, which the city hired to engineer the project and do all the construction services.

"This was advertised through their networking," Mc Auly said. "They also communicated with Torbergs (Lumber), here in town, to try to get some local feedback, and it wasn't well-received. We didn't get anybody locally that was interested in the job."

Two bids were originally received, Mc Auly said, but one company backed out because its drill rig would not clear the roofline.

"I know it's not a fun job. It's not a large revenue job for a lot of contractors," Mc Auly said.

Muske added that the city conducted two cycles of bids, with no bids being received in the first round.

Finance

At the May 13 city Finance Committee meeting, Mc Auly said, "I think it's very important that the city remedies this issue as quick as we can, so we can accommodate for all individuals."

The project will entail fixing the safety issues with the canopy above the bleachers, Mc Auly said.

He added that the beams holding up the canopy need to be updated. They are undersized, and not deep enough in the ground.

Muske said the main concern is safety, and once the work is completed regarding this bid, "that safety risk will go away based on our engineer's report."

Clintonville seeks higher water rates

Must be approved by PSC

CLINTONVILLE The city of Clintonville will apply for a simplified rate case with the Public Service Commission (PSC) of Wisconsin.

If approved, it would allow the city's water utility to increase its rates this year.

At its May 14 meeting, the Clintonville Common Council approved spending \$500 from the water utility budget to hire Ehlers, the city's financial advisor, to submit a simplified rate case application with the PSC for the city's

water utility. At the meeting, Brian Roemer, senior municipal advisor for Ehlers, said that as part of the long-range forecasting the city had looked at last year, Ehlers identified a series of simpli-

fied rate case adjustments. "Understanding that you are regulated by the Public Service Commission," Roemer said. "There are only certain windows of opportunities to adjust rates. It's not like the sewer utility where you can adjust rates

based off of your decisions. You have to go to the PSC in order to adjust (water)

He said there are two ways to request a rate adjustment through the PSC - a simplified rate adjustment and a conventional rate adjustment. The conventional adjustment is PSC follows a formula for that type of an adjustment.

He said the simplified rate adjustment is a process in which the PSC sets a rate for all utilities for a year – March 1 through the end of February every year. That rate this year is 4.1%. Last year it was 8%.

"The intent of these is to be inflationary adjustments to offset inflation," Roemer

The city is eligible to increase water rates because it is below the PSC math.

"Being below the PSC math is not an immediate negative financial indicator, however, from the 2023 analysis that we showed, and kind of what I reviewed, the water utility is kind of slightly behind, so we want to kind of build, and hopefully at some point, get to the PSC math at a lower adjustment when we do have to go in for a conventional rate case," Roemer said. "You also only get so many cracks at a simplified adjustment. Meaning that you'll eventually be kicked out and not be eligible for

Applying for a simplified rate case would be a continuation of the 10year rate plan that Ehlers a full rate review and the recently reviewed for the city, he said.

"It would be a 4.1% adjustment this year for the volumetric rate and the fixed rates that are charged to customers," Roemer said.

Clintonville Utilities Manager Dave Tichinel said the \$500 cost to apply for a simplified rate case is a lot less than the cost of conventional rate case.

Besides last year's increase in water rates, the last time the city increased water rates was in 2009, Tichinel said.

We do need to do small increments (increases), Tichinel said.

He added, "If you do it in small increments, where you add a dollar on the bill or whatever more, it's a lot easier to swallow when we do an upgrade to the water facility than it is to do it (increase) all at once. And inflation does play a big part in that."

New London reviews open enrollment

NEW LONDON - The New London School Board approved open enrollment applications that were submitted for the 2024-25 school year.

The approval came at the board's May 13 meeting.

Superintendent Scott Bleck said the district annually recognizes its open enrollment applications.

In January it recognized its open enrollment thresholds, which identified open enrollment in all grade levels and regular education.

"Open enrollment truly is a year-round process," Bleck said. "And when we look at our finalized numbers and what that will look like, we determine that after our third Friday count within the planning for our district."

The numbers are fluid, Bleck said, but added they are important to remem-

When the open enrollment period closed on April 30, Bleck said the district had received 51 applications from residents to attend another school district.

"Of that, only 13 applicants have actually attended our district," Bleck said. "So, we have individuals or families moving into the district, and then staying, perhaps, in the district where they're coming from."

The district also received 15 applications from nonresidents to attend the New London School District n. Of those 15 applicants, six are already going to school in New London.

In the topic summary document available to board members, it was stated, "A generalization from applications that can be made is that there are still a number of students who choose open enrollment as an option but many have never attended the School District of New London."

Bleck said the district will revisit the open enrollment discussion in September, when the official student count is held in the district.

Board Clerk Katie Batten asked if the open enrollment number out of the district is similar to the number last fall.

"It's up a little bit more," Bleck said.

Bleck added that even though the applications have been submitted, students could change their minds by the time school starts in the fall.

Firefighters feed a city

WEYAUWEGA - The the smoke and haze. Streets were barricaded with fire trucks and traffic was backed up for blocks. There was tension in the air. People wanted to get their chicken dinner before

it all sold out. The Weyauwega Fire Department Chicken BBQ was started in 1965 at the American Legion and then later moved to the present location when the fire department building was built in 1984 on Wisconsin Street.

The annual barbecue has a massive following and the department feeds almost the entire city. According to the last census, the population of the city of Weyauwega is 1,857. In less than a half of a day, the fire department sells 1,500 chicken dinners. That's 2,380 pounds of chicken.

Cars were backed up as far as one could see down Wisconsin Street. A tent was set up to sell tickets for the take-out custom-

ers and an assembly line of volunteers loaded dinners to deliver to drivers at the and strolled over to eat in the wide-open bays inside the fire department that was set up with tables.

"If we're going the way we're going now, we'll be sold out by two o' clock," said Brian Williams, the chairmen of the barbecue committee. They started the charcoal at 6:15 a.m. and the first batch was loaded onto the grill racks at 6:40 a.m. The last batch was pulled from the pit at 10:55 a.m.

The barbecue pit is made of cement blocks and is 75feet long, about the length of the department's building. There are a few inches of sand in the bottom with some grates that hold the charcoal. The distance from the chicken to the coals is about 18 inches.

"We go through just under 60 bags of charcoal. It's Grove Charcoal, made in Cedar Grove, Wisconsin. We've been using that for about six years," said Wil-

The chicken is flipped by two firefighters that clamp down a grill rack on top of firefighters worked through pick-up spot. Meanwhile, the chicken and they flip others parked downtown it upside down to heat the other side. Some firefighters wore t-shirts that read: "Flippin' the bird since '65" with a cartoon image of a chicken. Another person uses to a meat thermometer to check the internal temps and hollers when it's ready to be pulled.

By that time the chicken is succulent and almost falling off the bone.

"They have to use two hands with them otherwise they will break apart," said Williams.

The dinners are half of a pit-roasted chicken, a baked potato, coleslaw, a cookie, cheese, a pickle and milk. The chicken is basted with peanut oil and sprinkled with seasoning. The baked potatoes were once baked in the individual kitchens of the firefighters and then rounded up. This was chaos and now the department uses a sweet corn roaster, a cabinet-like oven often seen at festivals that slowly revolves the potatoes around a heat source.

I-S School Board allocates surplus

IOLA- After a mild winter and lower projected costs for operations, the Iola-Scandinavia School District has a \$100,000 budget surplus.

The board voted at its May 13 meeting to use the surplus to upgrade some outdated computers and technology. They also approved a literacy curriculum package that will help the district meet literacy requirements through the state.

District Administrator Chris Nelson said the computer lab at the high school as well as many staff computers were due for replacement before the start of the next school

However due to budget restraints they weren't able to get those machines until now.

Included with the new computers is also an upgrade to Windows 11.

Nelson said when there is a surplus determining where the funds are allocated is a careful process, taking into consideration the districts most pressing needs.

Options for surplus spending can include things like replacing aging vehicles, adopting new materials and textbooks, funding building upgrades and long term capital improvements, Nelson

"We knew early in the year that literacy materials and replacement computers were priority items and we developed a plan for a phased implementation using current year and next year budgeted funds," said Sarah Thiel, the school district business manager. "Using current year funds for these projects helps bring us closer to a balanced budget for the upcoming school year."

The computer replacement and technology updates have a quote coming in at about \$55,448. This quote includes 40 HP computers with Windows 11 installed in each, as well as a five year parts and labor support on each computer, there is also six Acer Chromebook's and a docking station for each.

The technology purchase was approved 6-0.

Nelson said the decision to go with literacy materials package with Core Knowledge Language Arts is due to the new Act 20 in Wisconsin.

"Purchasing this curriculum ensures the district provides quality literacy instruction while also qualifying for special grant funding tied to Act 20 implementation," Nelson said.

According to the Department of Public Institution, Act 20 is aimed at addressing reading proficiency with a state adherence to sciencebased literacy.

The cost of the literacy curriculum is \$65,504, according to the quote given at the May 13 school board meeting.

Recovery continues for restaurants, bars

WEEKLY FISCAL FACTS

Wisconsin's restaurant and bar industry has rebounded since the CO-VID-19 pandemic, with more businesses operating and strong recovery in both employment and sales.

Some pandemic impacts linger, however, as many restaurant and bar owners maintain reduced hours of operation and struggle to attract and retain staff. Workers are earning higher wages and consumers are paying higher prices, but those increases appear to

have slowed. In fall 2021, we assessed the state of recovery for Wisconsin's restaurants and bars, which were among the businesses most severely disrupted by the pandemic. We found the industry rebounding overall, but the number it employed remained down by roughly 9% and job openings were soaring, as employers struggled to secure needed workers.

Now, employment in Wisconsin's restaurants and bars has finally returned to pre-pandemic levels. The most recent estimates show that 203,700 workers were employed in those businesses in February 2024, exceeding February 2020 totals by roughly 0.4%. Job recovery in restaurants and bars still slightly lagged the state's economy overall. However, post-pandemic employment recovery in the restaurant and bar industry has been slightly stronger in Wisconsin than nationally. Despite this recovery, leaders of Wisconsin's restaurant and bar associations say staffing remains a top concern.

Preliminary data on state sales tax collections show that the total state revenue being generated by restaurants and bars in Wisconsin topped \$578 million in 2023, which was 17.3% higher than in 2019. That modestly lagged the pace of inflation (19.2%), however, and growth was stronger in other industries subject to the sales tax.

The number of restau-

rants and bars in Wisconsin has recovered overall, exceeding 2019 levels for the first time in late 2023. Bars were lost at a faster rate than restaurants during the pandemic, however, and it is possible that their numbers remain down.

During the pandemic, wages increased much faster for restaurant workers than for those in all other occupations. Between 2019 and 2022, median annual wages for food preparation and serving occupations in Wisconsin rose 29.8%, which far outpaced wage growth across all jobs (16.8%) and inflation during that period (14.5%). Those increases appear to have slowed considerably, however, as demand for workers, inflation, and supply chain issues have

One key factor slowing wage growth is that the previously intense demand for restaurant workers has cooled. Job openings at restaurants and bars, which skyrocketed in 2021 and remained a major challenge for employers in 2022, decreased markedly in 2023, according to federal data that is only available nationally. Likewise, consumers are well aware that restaurant prices have risen, but national research shows those price increases have slowed in the last year.

When we last analyzed Wisconsin's restaurant and bar industry in September 2021, it was emerging from the pandemic but still experiencing considerable uncertainty. Since then, the industry's recovery has strengthened. While industry leaders can point to numerous challenges facing the state's restaurants and bars today, the overall outlook has taken a turn for the better.

Celebrate Wisconsin's dairy industry

June is Dairy Month in Wisconsin, a time when we may attend a breakfast on a farm or some other event to celebrate this important industry.

Even though the number of Wisconsin dairy farms has fallen dramatically, dairy is still a major industry for the state. According to a recent publication "Wisconsin Farming: Insights from the 2022 Census of Agriculture," by Jeff Hadacheck and Steven Deller, total revenue from milking cows was \$7.35 billion accounting for 44.0% of total farm revenues. That revenue came from 5,676 farms with milk cows, or 5.1% of all farms.

The typical dairy farm had total revenue from sales of almost \$1.3 million which compares to typical Wisconsin farm which had revenue from sales of \$151,287.

I grew up on a dairy farm, where my parents had a 65-cow herd. Back in the 1970s nearly every farmer had at least some dairy cattle and 65 head considered large. Now you can drive 10 miles in almost any direction from our farm before you find a herd, with the average Wisconsin herd

size at 226 cows.

The loss of dairy farms in Wisconsin has been going on for decades. When my great-grandfather was milking cows in 1930, there were 167,000 dairy farms in the state.

When my parents sold their herd in 2000, Wisconsin had dipped under 25,000 herds. In 2017 there were 9,100 herds. The 2022 Census of Agriculture reports the number of dairy herds at 6,216 and the Wisconsin Agricultural Statistics Service says as of March 1, there were 5,617 dairy herds.

The economic developer in me looks at the positive impact dairy still has on the state. The dairy industry creates 157,000 jobs, and every dollar generated produces another \$1.73 in additional revenue for the state.

Today's farmer knows how to maximize milk production - the average cow in Wisconsin produces 8.2 gallons of milk every day. Supply is not the issue - farmers know how to produce milk. Then again, supply is the issue. Demand does not always equal supply, which is why prices swing back and forth.

But Wisconsin's agri-

cultural legacy of family dairy farms is dying. Years of low milk prices take their toll. Farmers cannot take the financial and emotional stress of working long hours every day of the year knowing that you're going back-

All business — and dairy farming is a business — goes through constant change. Markets change. Jobs go away. One need only look at the upheaval in the auto, steel and coal industry. When plants close, communities suffer.

Wisconsin families and our rural communities suffer when dairy farms go out of business. The local feed store, hardware store, banks, grocery stores and schools feel it. The bigger farms can fill the milk production void but cannot replace the local economic impact.

I helped out on my parent's farm the day they sold the cows. We moved cows from the barn into the sale ring. I watched as years of quality genetics were sold at bargain

the familiar hum of the vacuum pump. One last time I watched the milk flow through the glass jar in the milkhouse into the bulk tank.

With only a few cows to milk, the barn was eerily quiet. The milking units were cleaned. The pump was shut down. A silent sadness hung over the valley.

Those days are gone, but the dairy industry remains important to our region and to Wisconsin. The science and research to support additional products and markets for dairy products is essen-

We need to keep our family farms strong to help keep rural Wisconsin relevant and growing.
