Tomahawk pup Arlo named first WPS ‘Ambassadog’

TOMAHAWK – A Tomahawk dog recently took the top spot in a campaign promoting safe digging.

Wisconsin Public Service (WPS) customers and dog lovers alike cast thousands of votes last month for the best canine in the company’s first safe digging photo contest.

Arlo, a 9-month-old Aussiedoodle from Tomahawk, garnered the most votes and was named WPS’s new voice for safety as the company’s first-ever safe digging “Ambassadog.”

The Tomahawk pup, who is named after folk singer Arlo Guthrie, will now spend the next year starring in a social media campaign to remind everyone to call 811 at least three days before digging.

Arlo was featured on digital billboards across northeast and north central Wisconsin on National Safe Digging Day on Sunday, Aug. 11.

A release from WPS said Arlo’s road to the title of top dog began this spring, when his soon-to-be owners were searching for a new dog after their previous one passed away.

“They initially didn’t want a puppy, but couldn’t get enough of Arlo’s unique coat and his personality,”

WPS stated. “He reminded them of the narrator in the ‘The City of New Orleans,’ so his owners named him after Guthrie, who popularized the song.”

WPS noted that Arlo’s favorite activity is digging, especially when searching for toads in the garden at his home.

“His energetic nature also leads him into playing with other dogs or wrestling matches with pine branches,” WPS said. “He’s got a soft side, too – his owners say he loves to snuggle and sleep on top of his family.”

Lincoln County Opioid Task Force seeking community member partners

LINCOLN COUNTY – The Lincoln County Opioid Task Force is looking for two area residents to become members.

A release from the Lincoln County Health Department (LCHD) said the Lincoln County Opioid Task Force was created to gather information and create a proposal to help the Lincoln County Board of Supervisors determine how the county should



spend federal opioid settlement dollars.

“The task force currently has representatives from law enforcement, probation and parole, social services, public health, area schools and healthcare,” the release stated.

The task force is seeking two community members, who have been affected by the opioid epidemic, to join

as partners.

The two community members would “(provide) a voice for the many people impacted by the opioid crisis,” the release said.

Federal funding to support area road, bridge projects

WISCONSIN – Numerous area road and bridge projects will be backed by federal funding.

On Tuesday, Aug. 6, Governor Tony Evers and the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) announced that the next cycle of funding from the 2021 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) will provide more than \$200 million for more than 150 local road and bridge improvement projects in counties throughout the state.

A release from Evers' office said WisDOT will administer the funding to local communities through the Surface Transportation Program (STP).

“WisDOT’s STP allocates federal funds to complete a variety of improvements to federal-aid-eligible roadways in rural or urban areas,” the release stated. “The Local Bridge Improvement Assistance Program distributes federal and state funds to help local governments rehabilitate and replace the most seriously deficient existing federal-aid-eligible local structures on Wisconsin’s local highway

systems.”

Several area projects will be supported by STP.

In Lincoln County, the design and construction of the bridge over the Somo River on County Hwy. T in the Town of Somo and the bridge over Big Hay Meadow Creek on 1st Ave. in the Town of Russell will be backed by the program.

The program will support improvements to the stretch of Willow Rd. in Oneida County from U.S. Hwy. 8 to Indian Village Rd.

STP funding will be allocated to the design and construction of several bridges in Price County, including the bridge over Holmes Creek on Larkin Rd. in the Town of Ogema and the bridge over the North Fork of the Spirit River on County Hwy. D in the Town of Spirit.

Several other projects in Forest, Langlade, Marathon, Oneida, Price and Taylor counties will also receive STP dollars.

“I ran for governor promising to fix the darn roads,” Evers stated in last week’s release. “After improving more than 7,400 miles of roads these past five years, today I’m excited we’re go-

ing to be able to continue building upon this important work with the help of the Biden-Harris Administration’s Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.”

Evers said the “critical investments” will “make a huge difference for communities across our state and go a long way in our efforts to build the 21st-century infrastructure Wisconsinites need and deserve.”

“This is great news for Wisconsin,” the governor stated.

“When we invest in our infrastructure, we’re investing in our Made in Wisconsin economy – from the families who need safe roads and bridges to get to work and school every day to our businesses who rely on our infrastructure to get their products to market,” said U.S. Sen. Tammy Baldwin (D-Wis.). “I was proud to vote for the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to make long overdue investments in the infrastructure families rely on, creating good-paying jobs all over our state as we get to work fixing our roads and bridges for the next generation.”

“Through our efforts to keep our local government partners informed about program opportunities and prepare them to meet their application deadlines, we are able to support local projects in nearly every county in Wisconsin through the Surface Transportation Program,” said WisDOT Secretary Craig Thompson.

LINCOLN COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

As reported by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office Monday, Aug. 5: On 07/30/2024 deputies were sent to an address on STH 86 in the Town of Tomahawk for a reported domestic dispute. Upon deputies' arrival, they made contact with a Tripoli woman, 42, and an Eagle River man, 33. According to the deputies, the two were having a heated verbal argument, and in the process, the woman intentionally backed her car into the man's car. In response to that, the man then smashed the window out of the woman's car. Both the man and woman were arrested for domestic disorderly conduct. They were then transported to the Lincoln County Jail.

On 07/31/24 deputies responded to the area of CTH W and Deer Run Rd. in the Town of Pine River for a reported car vs. deer crash with injuries. Deputies found that the driver of the vehicle involved in the crash had been S/B on CTH W when it struck a deer. Both the driver and passenger suffered minor injuries as a result of the crash.

On 08/1/2024 The Sheriff's Office took a call of a possible funnel cloud north of Walmart. Squads from both LISO and Merrill PD were in the area and reported not seeing anything. No damage was reported with this event. Pictures that were captured by community members and shared with news media on Facebook did show what appeared to be a funnel cloud in the reported area.

On 08/01/2024 deputies were sent to the area of the north curve on CTH X at STH 64 Township of Pine River for a vehicle that had spun out and went in the ditch. It was reported to the Sheriff's Office by the first R/P that the female driver appeared to be under the influence. The second R/P on scene was an off-duty Crandon police officer. It was further reported that the female driver was asking that law enforcement not be called and she was trying to leave the scene. The off-duty officer prevented her from leaving. When the first deputy arrived on scene, he made contact with the driver, an Antigo woman, 49. The deputy noticed signs of impairment. The deputy asked the driver to perform some sobriety tests, to which she refused. It was also learned that per the Langlade County Sheriff's Office the car she was driving had been reported as stolen. The woman was then arrested for her fifth offense of OWI, as well as bail jumping, probation violation and driving a motor vehicle without owner's consent.

Deputies conducted 45 traffic stops and 13 security checks. Deputies responded to six car vs. deer crashes and one car vs. bear. Driving complaints: 13.

The 911 Center took five hang-up calls and seven nuisance calls.

Ask the PASTOR

Readers are invited to submit questions about God, the Bible, and religion. I shall try to answer them for you, using the Bible as my final authority.

We have been looking at Hosea 4:1, the LORD has a controversy with the people, because they no longer knew God, nor cared about truth or mercy. The result was that violence and crime increased. In verses 6 through 9, we are told that this situation arose because the priests were not teaching the people the truth about God from the Word of God, anymore.

The last few weeks we have been looking at the changes in American Christianity, from a God-centered focus to a man-centered focus. The old understanding was that churches existed to bring glory to God by teaching the truth about God and believers living in obedience to God's Word (1 Peter 2:9-12). In the 1800's this emphasis began to be replaced with a man-centered focus, the idea that churches exist to get as many people saved and on their way to Heaven as possible. Initially, the changes were slow, the biggest changes happening after World War 2 and even more in the 1960's and the years that followed. The biggest change concerns the message of salvation.

In Acts 20:20,21, we are given a summary, by the Apostle Paul, of his ministry of starting churches. In verse 20, he says he had publicly taught everything that could spiritually benefit the people he was trying to reach with the Gospel of Christ. In verse 21, he summarizes his message, saying: *Testifying both to the Jews, and also to the Greeks, repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ.* When starting churches, his message had two basic parts: repentance and faith.

Repentance means to change how we think about something, so it changes what we choose to do about it. *Repentance toward God*, for the religious Jew, meant that following religious traditions no longer could satisfy them, they now wanted to know God, Himself, so they might live for Him. *Repentance toward God* for the Greeks who did not believe in the God of the Bible, meant they now wanted to know the God of the Bible and obey Him.

The second part of Paul's message was *faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ.* The word meaning as true so it affects how you look at everything else. If we exercise repentance toward God, it means we acknowledge we were wrong about God and had done wrong to God – we recognize our sin and guilt before God. In looking for mercy, we turn to Christ for forgiveness and change, because Jesus took the punishment for our sin and saves us from our sin, so He might help us change to obey God (Titus 2:14).

Sadly, today, we do not hear much about *repentance*, we just hear believe in Jesus. In presenting the message of Jesus, the focus has become, *find forgiveness in Christ so we may go to Heaven when we die.* But I must ask, is there forgiveness if we do not acknowledge our sin against God? More will be said next week.

I forgot. I don't know just how many times in a day I say that. I get up in the morning, go to the kitchen looking forward to that first cup of the day and WALLA! NO COFFEE! I put the grounds in the pot, set the timer but forgot the water. Or I go downstairs to 'flip the loads' and even though the washer is done, the dryer isn't because I never remembered to turn it on.

I hope it's not about getting old. Mostly I think my brain is so busy with so many different things that I am not fully present in what I am doing at the time. Or I start one thing, get distracted with some other detail and never finish the task I started with.

It *really* irritates me when I have to ask someone their name for the umpteenth time. I'm really glad to see them again, I remember some details about our conversation, but their name escapes me. I feel bad because they are really important, but my inability to remember their name may make them feel like I don't care very much.

No, I didn't 'forget' that this article is supposed to be about God. I'm getting to that. You know, I may forget a name, or someone's birthday, or to get this article in on time, but God doesn't ever forget about us. The Bible tells us that we are very precious to God.

Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies?
Yet not one of them is forgotten in God's sight.
But even the hairs of your head are all numbered.
Do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. Luke 12:6-7

I know sometimes we think that God has forgotten us. Quite frankly, life is not all roses and birthday cake. Sometimes we deal with several difficult situations at once. Fishing Report: Mornings, evening continue to see more action, less traffic

BY GEORGE LANGLEY

NORTHERN WISCONSIN – We had a lot of hot weather at the end of July, meaning water temps went up and fishing slowed, with one surprising exception. Musky! Who'd have thought?

There's still a lot of traffic on most all of the lakes up here right now. Fishing early mornings and late evenings is better for action and peace. No matter where you are, be kind to and mindful of the other boats and PWC out there. Fall and the quiet solitude that anglers crave will be here before we all know it.

Walleye fishing has been decent, despite the heat. Generally, you need to look deep for these fish. Search vertically in 15 to 20-plus feet of water on weed edges. Night is definitely a better bite than day for these fish. Large

leeches on a jig bounced off the bottom are effective at attracting them.

Bass action continues to be great throughout the area. Smallies are feeding on crayfish, so those imitations are providing good action right now, and mornings are good for these guys. For large-mouth, evenings are better and look a little more shallow, and for structure, such as piers or wood. Whopper Ploppers are working great for these guys for the past month or so.

Musky action has been surprisingly good, with both medium bucktails and swim baits getting fish. A lot of these fish are suspended, so the mid- to regular-sized, rubber-like Medusas are working during the daytime. Fish are also doing some night feeding, so the night anglers are producing some decent

fish, too.

We've seen northern action slow with the heat, as we expected to happen with the musky. Look in the weeds and use flashy lures like buzz baits over the top to find these fish.

Panfish action is decent throughout the area, with bluegills producing on a daily basis, and many of these fish are being caught on small 1/32nd oz. jigs tipped with waxies. You will find these fish in the weeds everywhere. Crappie action continues to be pretty good, too, with action reported over deeper brush piles and deeper weeds on most lakes. Mini Mites are working great for these fish. Perch are still in the deeper weeds, hanging out with the walleye. Use a fathead minnow under a slip bobber for these guys.

2024 bonus antlerless deer harvest authorizations available beginning this week

WISCONSIN – Bonus antlerless harvest authorizations for the 2024 gun deer season will be available for purchase this week.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) last week announced that the harvest authorizations, formerly known as tags, can be purchased online through the Go Wild license portal (www.gowild.wi.gov/) and at license sales locations.

The harvest authorizations were available starting on Monday, Aug. 12.

Bonus authorizations are sold at a rate of one per person per day until sold out or until the 2024 deer hunting season ends. Bonus authorizations are \$12.00 each for Wisconsin residents, \$20.00 each for non-residents and \$5.00 each for youth ages 11 and under.

DNR said an online queuing system will be used to manage volume in Go Wild. All users entering the site

between 9:45 a.m. and 10 a.m. will be randomly assigned a number and staged in a virtual queue. Users will be arranged randomly regardless of the actual time they enter the system.

“There is no advantage for customers who enter the site before 9:45 a.m.,” DNR stated. “Users who log on after 10 a.m. will be added to the end of the existing queue in the order of arrival.”

To complete their purchase, DNR noted, hunters will need to know the deer management zone and unit in which they intend to hunt, determine whether they will hunt on public or private land and have a deer hunting license approval.

Bonus sales in the Northern and Central Forest Zones began on Monday, Aug. 12, followed by the Central Farmland Zone on Tuesday, Aug. 13.

Sales for the Southern Farmland Zone opened at 10 a.m. today (Wednesday, Aug. 14), and all zones will be available on Thursday, Aug. 15, beginning at 10 a.m.

“The number of antlerless harvest opportunities will vary by deer management unit in accordance with local deer population levels,” DNR stated. “This allows for greater harvest opportunities where deer are abundant and a more conservative harvest where deer are fewer in number.”

Bonus antlerless harvest authorizations are available for purchase for the 2024 season in all deer management units except Ashland and Iron counties.

A listing of bonus antlerless harvest authorizations available for purchase in each deer management unit can be found on the DNR’s Antlerless Deer Harvest Authorization webpage at www.dnr.wisconsin.gov/permits/bonusavailability.html.

DNR seeking volunteer hunter education instructors

WISCONSIN – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is seeking volunteer hunter education instructors.

DNR said it is looking for instructors to “promote safe, responsible and ethical hunting practices.” Volunteer opportunities are available in all parts of the state.

Since the program’s creation in 1967, more than 20,000 volunteer instructors have trained and certified more than one million hunters across Wisconsin.

“These efforts have helped make hunting much safer, with a 95% decrease in hunting-related incidents since the program’s start,” DNR stated. “In addition to shaping the future of Wisconsin’s hunting tradition, becoming a volunteer instructor is a great way to obtain hands-on teaching experience, work closely with DNR staff and engage with your local community.”

DNR said there are two ways to become a certified volunteer hunter education instructor. Interested volunteers can serve as ap-

prentices under a sponsoring instructor for at least two complete courses or attend a certification training session hosted by a DNR Outdoor Skills Trainer.

Once certified, DNR provides volunteer instructors with all the materials and equipment required to teach a hunter education course. Instructors must teach one class every three years to remain certified, although many teach more, DNR noted.
