Lutefisk returns

Five years later, back by popular demand

IOLA – After an almost five year hiatus, the legendary lutefisk dinner is set to return to the Iola Winter Carnival, which is only one of many activities set for the first weekend in February.

This year marks 63 years the Iola Winter Carnival has been breaking up the winter doldrums with a weekend of events for families, starting Jan. 31 at the Iola Winter Sports Complex (IWSC) and continuing Feb. 1 and 2 with activities happening around the village.

The most notable of the activities is the return of the lutefisk dinner, which the community has been asking for since the last dinner in 2019 after the dinner was shut down due to Covid.

Megan Melum, one of the event organizers, said the dinner is back and will be held at the Our Saviors Lutheran Church in Iola.

Lutefisk is a Norwegian meal that is a gelatinous fish, usually cod, and the fish is brined in lye and steamed. Lutefisk is not the only thing on the menu. There will also be meatballs and gravy, mashed potatoes, corn, lefse, coleslaw, cranberry relish and almost 1,000 Norwegian pastries people will have donated

Instead of family-style serving, the lutefisk dinner will be buffet style and the pastries and coffee will be in the meeting area at the front of the church.

There will be two sittings for the dinner, 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. and for those two sittings there are a limited number of tickets.

Tickets can be purchased at the Iola Village Office, 180 South Main Street. If

there are tickets remaining they will be sold at the door. People are encouraged to get their tickets sooner if possible.

“The event itself, I think, is just so historic and the community just loves it,” Melum said.

The chili walk will be returning this year for the second year in a row, and five local Iola businesses will be participating including Thirsty Perch, Mark McCoy’s Flat Tracker Tap, 10-LA, The Iola Mills and Crystal Café.

Melum said you can start at any of the five chili locations and you will also be able to vote for your favorite chili any of the five locations once your card is filled.

The card’s that are turned in for the chili walk will also be put into a drawing for chamber bucks.

A new addition this year will be a trolley that was donated by Kolbe and Kolbe

in Manawa.

This trolley will take carnival goers to all the Winter Carnival activities.

Carnival Events

The ice sculpting competition will be returning, and Melum said you can still sign up to sculpt a block of ice with a team, the competition will take place at Chet Krause Legacy Park 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The winner of the contest will receive \$200 in chamber bucks as well as a \$200 donation to the team’s charity of choice. Second place will take home \$100 of Chamber bucks and third place will get \$50 in chamber bucks. There will be a warming tent with cookies and hot chocolate for participants as well as those who have come to watch the contest.

Newspaperman retires

Cloud reported and wrote it all

WAUPACA – Robert “Bob” Cloud has retired from the Waupaca County Post as editor. He arrived in Waupaca on July 1, 1998 when newspapers were laid out with wax strips and photos were developed in a dark room.

He was born in Toledo, Ohio and moved around as a child as his father was a political campaign manager. He went to four different high schools in three states: Alaska, Ohio and Indiana. He studied history and philosophy at St. Louis University and he said this course of study helped his critical thinking later as an editor.

After college he worked for VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) in South Bend, Ind. Cloud worked on redistricting the city so the black population could have more voice, along with writing for a community newspaper.

After that stop, he changed gears and got a job as a national sales manager for Exhibitech, a firm that made displays for trade shows and museums. At the time he said he looked like a “ZZ Top groupie.” Cloud got a haircut and traveled the country recruiting dealers and training their sales staff. This meant he had to drive. Cloud was 30 years old and didn’t know how. He never had to learn as

he lived in the city and walked, rode a bike or took a bus.

His first car was a lemon Ford Fairmont. “It broke down so much that my coworkers would look for me on the side of the road,” said Cloud. Later he drove a leased Toyota. He’s driven a Toyota Corolla ever since.

At Exhibitech he worked with Dave Allen, an oil painter and good friend. He left his career to pursue painting fulltime. “Whenever you do something like that, you take a risk. He kind of talked me into it. He knew I wanted to be a journalist. And so I did,” said Cloud.

He bounced around three small papers in to gain experience. “I would learn what I could learn and move on,” he said.

One editor was a mentor that taught him to write tight. Cloud had a penchant for writing long, elaborate, sophisticated sentences. “She broke that habit. I took pride in the fact on how my sentences were. John Milton is known for

Goodwill in Guatemala

Building houses, changing lives

MANAWA – Judy Trull spoke about her trip to Guatemala last November to build homes alongside Lisa and Jason Severson. She described it as life-changing.

Trull made the trip to Guatemala to join a group of ladies to build concrete block houses for those in need on the small country.

“I mean, we’re not an island so we know not everyone lives like us, but we know that at the 10,000-foot level not at the ‘boots on the ground’ level,” Trull said. “So when I say its life changing, I mean your changing their life but at the same time you’re helping them. You’re working with other people that are amazing, and they’re changing your life, too.”

Lisa has been going to Guatemala for many years on trips to visit children’s home but connected with

an organization called From Houses to Homes and started to build homes while they were in the country.

Trull worked with Lisa at the Busy Bean in 2018 when Lisa mentioned possibly taking a trip to Guatemala to build homes.

Trull decided to get her first passport and finally take the trip this past November.

Trull said she was taken back when her crew first

came to the land that the homes were being built on.

“I looked at [Lisa] and she said, ‘It’s ok, it’s a lot to take in,’” Trull said. “To see how kids are living, it isn’t that they’re not loved, it isn’t they’re not taken care of, it’s just not in the same sense that we have here in the states.”

Lisa and Trull took the opportunity to name one of the many stray dogs that they came across while building a home, the name

they chose being Chiquita Banana.

Trull emphasized her life changing experience not only with the sites that she saw, but with the people she was able to meet.

Both ladies said language was a barrier; however, Lisa said they prefer to be spoken to in English so the Guatemalan’s can also continue to learn the language.

be in the warming tent from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Along with the children's ice fishing contest, there will be a demonstration by the local fire department and carnival goers will be able to learn how to climb out of ice if you have fallen through, along with tips to stay safe on the ice.

Melum said she is hoping to have one demonstration at 11 a.m. and hopefully a second later in the afternoon.

The children's ice fishing contest and ice demonstration will be at Lake Iola.

Friday and Sunday there will be a variety of activities happening at the (IWSC), E398 County Road MM.

The ski jumping contest is still in question, as the IWSC can make snow, but without enough snow cover they will not be able to make enough to get the ski jumps up and running.

Outside of the questionable state of the ski jumps, Melum said, there is a fat tire bike race Friday that can run with or without snow, then a candlelight snowshoe hike Saturday night, something that can still be done with or without snow.

The craft show will be re-

turning as well to the Iola Historical Society Machine Shed at 222 Depot Street. Currently there are 28 vendors and the sale will last 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The biggest thing to return to the Iola Winter Carnival is the Queen of Snow contest and four senior girls are in the running to for that honor. They had to submit an application and are being required to do three social media videos as well as choose one Saturday to sell raffle tickets.

The winner will be crowned Feb. 1 at Chet Krause Legacy Park.

There are also raffle tickets that will be up for sale, \$5 per ticket or three tickets for \$10.

The raffle tickets will be drawn Sunday at the IWSC at 3 p.m. and you do not need to be present to win.

writing the longest sentence ever and I wanted to beat that. I stopped writing that way and learned to write short sentences and make my language flow more naturally like someone was speaking. It made sense," said Cloud.

He became editor at the Berrien County Record in Michigan. He worked long hours and when they closed out a paper on Tuesday night; he and his colleagues would celebrate at a local pub.

Move to Waupaca

There was a lot of camaraderie but the paper was financially shaky. After Cloud got screwed out of a big bonus after a 75-hour work week during Christmas, he noticed an advertisement in Editor & Publisher magazine for an editor position in Waupaca.

He got the job and his salary doubled. Cloud arrived in Waupaca when the Waupaca County Post was owned by Scott Turner. "He drove me around Waupaca and I saw the King veteran's home, the hospital, the high school, one of the parks. I stayed at a hotel and walked up and down the street and thought this was a nice downtown," recalled Cloud.

There were three changes of ownership during his editorship. Turner sold the newspaper to Journal Communications in 2008

and later they sold it to the current owner, Multi-Media Channels (MMC).

"There was a lot of consolidation. When I first moved here, besides Waupaca, Weyauwega-Fremont had its own paper, Iola-Scandinavia, Manawa, Clintonville, New London had their own papers," said Cloud.

He's seen the technological changes in publishing. At a neighborhood newspaper in his early days, he described a long strip of paper with holes in it, like a punch card contraption, that was used in the printing process. Before digital photography, black-and-white photos were done in the dark room and color photos were processed at Walgreens.

The Internet changed how news was delivered. "When we first went on online with Journal [Communications], we were told IT would post all this stuff. They did not train us on it. We would send them the copy and nothing would get done. We had a picture of a guy ice fishing holding up a fish. That picture remained online on the homepage for over a year. Imagine what that fish smelled like after so long. Later when MMC took over, they trained us and the website really took off," said Cloud.

Covering the community

Cloud liked to cover the

crime beat. He covered embezzlement at the veteran's home and in the Park and Recreation Department. "One of the most interesting murders when I first moved here was an old man fixing a lock on his door. His neighbor comes over and says he's doing it all wrong and he kills him and drags the body into the garage. The son shows up looking for his father and the guy who killed him said, 'Oh, I think he's in the garage.' He gets arrested. When he gets busted, he thinks he's in trouble for not separating his recyclables and trash. He's sent to an insane asylum. He really was insane. That was the first time I understood the plea of insanity. Sometimes it's real, they really are insane," said Cloud.

He also covered the Pick N' Save robbery. "It was very well organized. Two kids—late teens or early twenties—they came in there with guns and threatened the clerks. It was late. They had somebody listening to the police scanner at the Waupaca Hotel. You had another person throwing a rock at the window of First National Bank to get the alarm to go off to distract the police," said Cloud.

Cloud covered local politics: the good the bad and the ugly. He said the Town of Dayton was very contentious for a while and the meetings were extremely stressful. He covered the

controversy surrounding removing the Little Hope dam and many other civic boards that did not get along.

"At one point, the Weyauwega-Fremont school board was totally divided. The school board members were suing each other. It divided the community. I covered a school board meeting. They fought about everything. Every single thing was a fight. They went into a closed session and came out still fighting. Things are much better now," said Cloud.

"I think Waupaca has had well functioning government. I think Mayor Brian Smith—there is a reason why he gets reelected—he makes things happen. He's a good mayor. And look at how much has happened in Waupaca that is positive—redeveloping downtown and a vibrant community. Its part of the reason that I moved here," said Cloud.

He has high regards for the Waupaca arts community. Cloud was a longtime friend of Jack Rhodes. They both are cinema aficionados.

Cloud retired for health reasons and will move to Michigan to be closer to family. At press time of this issue, the Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA) sent a notice that Cloud won a first-place award in the 2024 WNA Foundation Better Newspaper Contest.

Test kits instead of soda

Vending machines for public safety

WAUPACA – The Waupaca County Department of Public Health (DPH) has put out two new free community resources in Waupaca County. Public Health Vending Machines (PHVM) offer free access to items that will help promote health, safety, and well-being in the community. Items available in the PHVM includes: nasal Naloxone (brand name NARCAN®), Fentanyl test strips, gun locks, first aid kits, COVID-19 at-home test kits, tick kits, and condoms. One PHVM is located in the city of Waupaca on the first floor

of the Waupaca County Courthouse at 811 Harding St. and a second is located in Clintonville in the entryway of the Compassionate Connections Center at 143 S. Main St. Jed Wohlt, Health Officer for Waupaca County DPH, said “In 2022 we surveyed the community as part of our Community Health Assessment (CHA) and in 2023 we released the latest Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). Based on the responses from our community, DPH identified three priority areas to focus on for the next three years – mental health, substance use, and access to care. The PHVM is an evidence-based solution that helps us to address all three

of the priority areas highlighted by our community members.” Many individuals do not seek assistance or services for mental health or substance use concerns. By providing low-barrier anonymous access, the PHVM offers health and safety items for all people living in or visiting Waupaca County. Instructions to access the machine are available via QR code on each of the PHVMs or via the Waupaca County DPH website. DPH was awarded \$50,000 in grant funds from the Wisconsin Department of Health Services to pay for both of the PHVMs. The grant money comes from the state’s \$400 million opioid settlement.

Recent drug busts

Cops find more meth

WAUPACA—Local law enforcement kicked off 2025 with a series of drug busts. These are their stories.

Tracks in the snow

On the morning of Thursday, Jan. 2, Waupaca County Deputy Santiago got a call to go to a residence on Draeger Road in Waupaca. No one seemed to be on the premises. Deputy Makuksi was with him. Santiago observed fresh tire tracks and footprints in the snow-covered driveway. The owner, Jeremy Verhagen, is on active supervision for possession of methamphetamine and paraphernalia. A few days before, the Winnebago County Sheriff's Office asked Waupaca deputies to check this address for Kristopher Kugler, a wanted man that cut off his GPS ankle monitor. The deputies conducted a non-intrusive search and did not enter any buildings, structures or vehicles. They found three different sets of fresh footprints in the snow.

At around 5:30, Santiago responded again to the Draeger address to see if there was any activity. He observed a burgundy Dodge Caravan that Kugler was reported to be driving. Santiago flooded the area with his squad spotlight. A truck from the backside of a garage took off and later turned off its lights and engine. Jeremy Verhagen walked down the driveway to Santiago, yelling at him about being on his property. Santiago said he was looking for Kugler. Verhagen said Kugler wasn't there. Santiago confirmed the make and model of the minivan as what Kugel was driving.

Santiago fired up his PA speaker and announced himself as a law enforcement officer and advised Kugler he had an arrest warrant. Verhagen and Santiago walked to the minivan. Santiago confirmed the license plate number was Kugler's vehicle.

Verhagen continued to yell at him and picked up a two-by-six three-foot board and propped it against the minivan. He continued yelling. Verhagen became more agitated and grabbed the board. Bracing for an attack, Santiago kicked the board with his boot and the board fell away. Verhagen dropped his cell phone and complained the screen cracked.

Santiago put Verhagen in wrist restraints and placed him in the back of the squad car. In the minivan, Santiago found a backpack containing men's toiletries, along with a baggie of methamphetamine and a residue-caked glass pipe.

Later, Santiago and Makuksi entered the residence and outbuildings to look for Kugler. Deputy Deuman and Detective Sergeant Claussen arrived and launched a drone with thermal imaging. They found a heat signature that looked human.

Detective Sergeant Pederson, Makuksi and Santiago drew their sidearms and approached a Chevy pickup with a male

crouched inside. He came out with his hands up. His name was Brian John Ked-dell. He was put in wrist restraints and placed in the back of a squad car. Ked-dell said that he was the driver of the minivan for that day and the backpack belonged to Kugler.

Deputies continued to search with the drone but only found bedded whitetail deer. Ked-dell was booked with possession of methamphetamine as a party to a crime and possession of drug paraphernalia as a party to a crime.

Back from Burger King

On Tuesday, January 7, 2025, Waupaca County Detective Butterbrodt and Detective Much observed a black vehicle on Fulton Street with a cracked windshield and the male driver was not wearing his seatbelt. They pulled the vehicle over on U.S. Highway 10 and made contact with the driver, Jason S. Killian of Almond.

When the driver was asked for proof of insurance, one officer noticed some THC shake (debris from a marijuana bud). Killian said it was not his vehicle and became nervous. A deputy arrived with Cuda, the K9 police dog, and Cuda marked a positive presence of drugs. Killian was asked to step out of the vehicle.

Much searched the vehicle and found a bag of food from Burger King and two chocolate milk shakes. He also found a black magnetic box loaded with gem bags containing methamphetamine. Butterbrodt placed Killian under arrest. Killian was also carrying \$990 in cash in his wallet. Killian was booked on possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver (3-10 grams).

Showered, not clean

On Friday, Jan. 3, Narcotics Officer Grant was on duty in plain clothes and he learned that Patrick J. Carroll of Waupaca was at his mother's apartment in Waupaca. Carroll had an active Department of Corrections warrant, and Grant had information Carroll was under the influence of an illicit substance.

Grant visited the mother's apartment with Officer Jensen and she let them enter. When Carroll came out the shower, he was advised he was under arrest for the warrant. Grant gathered clothes from a laundry basket for him to put on. Carroll said he wanted to get some clothes from the bathroom. Grant said he'd get them for him. Carroll's demeanor changed and said he didn't need those clothes. They handcuffed Carroll and Grant picked up the bathroom clothes and found a bulbous meth pipe crusted with residue. On the way to jail, Grant grabbed a Ski Doo jacket for Carroll from the living room. In one pocket he found a plastic baggie with methamphetamine and a butane lighter in another pocket. Planning for safe biking, hiking

STEVENS POINT—Portage County is hosting two public workshops to gather input on the update of the 2014 Countywide Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan, as part of the Safe Street & Roads For All Grant Project.

With 7,382 total crashes reported from 2017-2021 resulting in 31 fatalities and 1,872 injuries (261 suspected serious injuries), the County and collaborating municipalities of Park Ridge, Whiting, Plover and Stevens Point have committed to eliminate roadway deaths and serious injuries by 2045 through creation of a Safe Streets & Roads for All (SS4A) Safety Action Plan, and an update of the Portage County County-

wide Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan.

“We’ve heard your initial feedback about how to improve safety for all roadway users,” Portage County Planning & Zoning Planner Kristen Johnson said. “Now we need to dig deeper on how we can improve bicycle and walking conditions in Portage County.”

The workshops will include a brief presentation followed by a series of activities that will solicit public feedback on the existing conditions for bicycles and pedestrians in the County and collect ideas for future infrastructure and programming improvements.

Workshop 1: Wednesday, January 15 from 6 to 8pm at MidState Technical College, 1001 Centerpoint Drive, Stevens Point, WI


Editor writes book about Lambeau

Testin on voter ID resolution

STEVENS POINT – After the Wisconsin State Senate passed a resolution that aims to amend the state constitution to require that voters show a valid form of identification when casting a ballot in any election, Sen. Patrick Testin (R-Stevens Point) released the following statement:

“While we already have voter ID laws in the books, this resolution enshrines the popular voting requirement in our state constitution, which ensures that the security measure can be enforced well into the future. Wisconsinites have a right to clean, fair elections and to know that their votes count.

“There really is no logical

reason to oppose this legislation. Nearly 80 percent of Americans support voter ID, and since our state’s voter ID laws were enacted several years ago, turnout at the polls has actually increased. The statewide raw number of voters in the 2024 presidential election was the largest in Wisconsin’s history. In that same election, Milwaukee recorded the highest voter turnout percentage of the 50 largest cities in the country. To claim that voter ID requirements suppress votes is disingenuous and utter nonsense.

“That is because photo identification cards are free and easy to obtain. Plus, you need an ID for just about every aspect of your

life, including driving a car, purchasing medication, renting or buying a home, getting a hunting or fishing license, opening a bank account and adopting a pet from the Humane Society.

In fact, some grocery stores even require an ID to buy non-alcoholic mixers. Does it really make sense to have more safeguards for cocktail syrup than we do for ballots?”

The resolution is now headed to the state Assembly for approval. If passed by that chamber, the question will go before voters in a statewide referendum where they will have the final say.



Oshkosh Street improvement approved

Street widened in some areas

NEW LONDON – Oshkosh Street in New London will be widened in some areas when it is reconstructed this year. The New London Common Council approved the reconstruction plans for Oshkosh Street when it met Dec. 17. The approval comes after a public informational meeting on Nov. 25, and two New London

Public Works Committee meetings – Dec. 2 and Dec. 9 – to discuss the proposed plans for the project.

During the public comments portion of those meetings, residents expressed concerns about the traffic on Oshkosh Street, speeding on the street, and the proposed to plan to widen the street in some areas. Some residents do not want the street widened.

Reconstruction plans

Robert Garske, director

of Public Works for the city of New London, presented the proposed plan at the public informational meeting, as well as the Dec. 2 Public Works Committee meeting. Starting at Pershing Road there is no scheduled change to the width of Oshkosh Street all the way to Jennings Streets.

Every intersection that is part of the project will have 15-foot radiuses for the corners.

From Jennings Street to Warren Street, Oshkosh Street will be narrowed down to a width of 32 feet. The street will be 32 feet wide from Jennings Street to Pine Street.

At Pine Street, Oshkosh Street will increase from 32 feet wide to 36 feet wide. The street will be 36 feet wide from Pine Street to Washington Street.

"At Washington (Street), this is where the most change takes place," Garske said. "The existing roadway on the north side of the Washington Street intersection is 32-foot, but it is severely offset to the west."

Some widening is

planned for the west side of Oshkosh Street to make it line up with the offset.

"Severe offsets are not typical," Garske said. "When they do redesigns, they stay away from offset intersections, and that is why we changed this to a line in the road right-of-way, with the alignments of the rest of south Oshkosh (Street)."

North of the Beacon Street intersection, Oshkosh Street will be widened from 30 feet to 32 feet through the Cook Street intersection to Spring Street. There will be 13.5 feet of right-of-way on each side of the street.

At the Wolf River Avenue intersection Oshkosh Street is planned to be widened to 40 feet to allow for turning lanes. This will mean the elimination of three or four parking spots.

Committee comments

Ald. Robert Besaw said he didn't feel that the city received enough comments from residents who live along Oshkosh Street.

"There's been no accidents on that street, that I recall, so I don't really see the need for widening the street," Besaw said. "I understand what Robert wants to do, aligning the street up, but there's been no accidents on that street."

Garske said if you look at the accident log for Oshkosh Street, there have been a lot of accidents.

"I've driven down that street a lot of times, and I don't see a problem when you get to Washington

Street, keeping on going straight, as far as the street lined up," Besaw said. "I don't see where it makes it anymore dangerous or any safer by widening it."

Bernie Ritchie Jr. agreed with Besaw.

"The street works. If it ain't broke, why fix it?" Ritchie Jr. said.

Ritchie Jr. said the city should replace the utilities under Oshkosh Street, add new curb and gutter, and repave the street without altering it.

Garske said that once the

Lake to be dredged


WEYAUWEGA – If you see a man with a pick-up truck and a very large auger on Lake Weyauwega this winter, he isn't ice fishing. He's taking samples from the lakebed. The Weyauwega Lake Restoration group recently got the green light from the Department of Natural Resources to dredge a section of the lake. Taking core samples is part of the process. Badger Laboratories will drill to a depth of five feet and take three samples.

The dredging will remove three feet of sediment over 21 acres. The group hopes to sell the sediment as fertilizer to

raise funds for their efforts. The dredging will take place on the far end of the lake at the mouth of the Waupaca River and Whiskey Creek. It will not disturb the nesting of the black terns as they tend gather further upriver. Currently the area to be dredged is choked with weeds and barely navigable.

"It will change the entire character of the lake. It won't solve all the problems of the lake but it's a positive step," said Bob Van Epps. He noted the water temperature will be much cooler after the dredging.

The group has worked on this project for years and was set back even further because of Covid.

More traffic at Bear Lake

MANAWA – With the loss of the Manawa Mill Pond, ice fishing enthusiasts have moved to Bear Lake which is causing some traffic concerns with North Water Drive residents as a "No Parking" sign was taken down. Jackie Beyer, the clerk for the Town of Little Wolf, said the sign was taken down because it was attached to a telephone pole which made the sign unenforceable.

The traffic increased over

the last couple of months with thick ice for the first time in two years as well as the mill pond being drained.

Beyer said safety is the number one priority of the Town of Little Wolf board and at the Jan. 7 meeting it was announced that the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will allow the township to gravel the south shoulder of North Water Drive to allow for safer parking.

The extra gravel will be large enough that cars will be completely off the road and allow for safer passage

Beyer said the Waupaca County Highway Department let them know the DNR will allow extra gravel; however, the gravel cannot be put down until the permit is obtained and in hand, which Beyer hopes will happen in the next one to two weeks.

Beyer said driveways are private property and asks that people not use them as a turn around on the road, as there are blind corners and it could lead to accidents.

"Kindness and a smile can go a long way in translating what you're trying to get across to somebody," Trull said. "And humor, I mean I didn't understand hardly a word those ladies were saying when we were making tortillas, but my God, we were all cracking up laughing, it was so funny."

In order for families to qualify for a home they must prove that the land that the home will be built on belongs to the family.

It is about \$3,000 to build a home, with a lot of materials being donated. Along with the home they also get a stove to use that is placed in the front of the house. The roof they added to the homes was flat and metal and the home itself

had a couple windows as well. The home doesn't have running water; however, they have a rain barrel set up with a gravity-fed system to get the water into the home. As far as furniture goes, they get a bunk bed, a recent donation, while the parents will often bring a hammock or straw bed that they had been using.

Jason said the home is built out of concrete blocks; every six rows the blocks are turned in order to make a channel in the building, of which they use to pour concrete down in order to further stabilize the structure. The structure is 16 feet by 20 feet and is one room with a concrete floor.

The family gets to pick the color of their home, and they also have a locking door on the home,

something not a lot of families have in Guatemala.

Trull also joined Lisa and Jason along with their crew to a few excursions, including visiting a coffee farm and a school where they were able to see more into the culture of the country.




