

Windmills have more history than you know

Did you know that our area was once considered the Great Plains in the 1700s, which was considered unfit for farming? During this time it was called the "Great American Desert." Droughts would follow rainy spells; the sun and wind would dry up surface moisture. Looking out at my sandy acreage and weeds, I would agree with that assessment.

Native Americans had not used windmills from what we currently know. The settler's European styles of windmills were impractical on the plains as they were large, expensive, and required constant maintenance as their cloth sails had to be furled by hand daily. Let alone finding good timber to hold up to our wind speeds. That Oklahoma song just started in my head which aptly applies lately this spring in WI.

In 1854, Daniel Halladay developed the American-type windmill. It was smaller, less expensive, shipped nearly anywhere, and built easily. Remember the Sears catalog? Its sails were held into the wind by a weight built of easily replaceable cheaper wood like pine. Oh yeah, have lots of those to go along with all the sand here on the homestead.

These new windmills were ideal for settlers on the plains. They could pump water from great depths at a steady rate. They could shift into the prevailing winds functioning well in fast and slow winds. And to top it off, they required little maintenance, so they were called self-governing windmills. Windmills were often among a homesteader's most prized possessions. The water pumped by windmills was used to cook, bathe, drink, water crops and animals, wash clothes, and more. These mills were simple, wellconstructed, and dependable. Did you know country home front porches faced windmills for prevailing cooling breezes? Often the weather could be predicted days to hours before by watching which way the wind blew the windmill tail.

Over time, windmills became visual icons in the Great Plains. Tall windmills were often the most obvious signs of civilization. Many people growing up on the plains had fond memories of windmills from cool drinks after working in the field to learning how to swim in livestock tanks.

By the 1880s, vaneless windmills were growing in popularity. These windmills had hinged sections that could pivot in and out of the wind individually. This allowed them to regulate the speed of the wind. Then came the self-oilers replacing the steel models in the early 1900s. After WWII, the windmill began to fade from history.

You can still find a few of these standing in Waushara County off in a forgotten area of an abandoned farm covered in vines. They seem to be begging to be released to find the wind again. I have heard the sweet comforting sound of a windmill humming away pumping water for cattle. It is a rather comforting sound of order and peacefulness. I have heard the screeching moans of abandoned massive set windmills on old grazing lands in Texas. I sort of felt their



rusty mechanical moans myself for a far simpler, less complicated timeframe in history.

Maybe you have a windmill on your property. What kind is it and as an antique, do you know its history? If it is suffocating in vegetation, why not let it at least hold its formal glory against a summer sky and defiance in a winter storm? If it is in pieces rusting in the back acreage, why not let some parts go for garden decor to remind someone of our historical past?

If you have a windmill, why not send in your pictures to the Argus. Perhaps we can showcase a piece of Waushara history we drive by daily and yet seem have forgotten about. Could be very interesting sharing our past together!

Make a Father's Day meal Dad can savor

Families celebrate Dad in unique ways on Father's Day. Gifts are customary, but so is a delicious meal Dad will love.

Many dads will appreciate a meal that goes above and beyond the ordinary, preferably something that is hearty and delicious. These "Pecan-Stuffed Pork Chops" from "Jon Bonnell's Texas Favorites" (Gibbs Smith) are a great dish to serve family style when everyone gathers around the table for Father's Day.

Pecan-Stuffed Pork Chops

Serves 7-8

- 1 large rack of pork chops, bones in
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 yellow onion, chopped 2 ribs celery, chopped
- 5 cloves garlic, minced
- 11/2 cups chicken stock
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt 1/4 teaspoon cayenne
- pepper
- 2 cups panko bread crumbs 2 cups

- 2 cups roasted pecans, chopped
 - More kosher salt and pepper, to taste

Clean the rack of pork well and cut in between the bones to get thick individual pork chops. Cut a large slit down the back side of each chop and insert the tip of a knife 2 to 3 inches inside the chop to create a pocket for the stuffing. Do not poke completely through the pork or the stuffing will not stay in.

In a large saucepan, melt the butter and sauté the onion, celery and

garlic until the onion has slightly softened. Add the chicken stock, salt and cavenne and bring to a light simmer. Pour the contents into a mixing bowl and add the panko bread crumbs and pecans. Mix together and let cool to room temperature. Stuff as much of the mixture into each pork chop as will fit (overstuffing is okay, too). Sprinkle both sides of each chop with salt and pepper to taste, then roast in a preheated 400 F oven for 12 minutes. Turn the chops over once and roast an additional 15 minutes. Check for doneness with a meat thermometer. Cook to medium, or 135 to 140 F.






