As a former FFA member myself, I can personally attest to what FFA does for a student and how it benefits them. FFA is described as a dynamic youth organization that prepares members for personal growth, premier leadership, and career success. FFA teaches time management, responsibility, employability skills (Soft skills), life and content knowledge skills, integrity, public speaking skills, civic responsibilities, problem-solving abilities, and meeting etiquette. 6. What would you like your community to know about FFA?

When I started here in 2013, this newspaper did a piece on me because I was the first female agriculture teacher to be hired

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in our county. I grew up in a town where FFA is known everywhere for multiple reasons, particularly its successes. Many questions were posed to me about the future of our Drew Central program. Many expected me to replicate the program that I was a part of growing up. As I told them then, and is the same now, we are creating a legacy of our own. I sat down with my students during that first year and asked them what they wanted their program to be, after all this is their time to learn. They wanted a heavy emphasis on experiences and community. Over the past several years, we have been able to travel to multiple cities, states, and this summer a different country. I've had students meet influential leaders from all around the state, country, and world. They have helped at community banquets, made donations to several charities and organizations, and love more than anything sharing their love of agriculture and FFA with younger generations. The very much look forward to Arkansas Leadership Conference every summer, working at the Ag in Action Center at the Arkansas State Fair, and assisting as servers during annual events like the Annual Farm Bureau meeting and the All Tomato Luncheon. 
promoting them into the FFA program.


