Multiple Drew Central FFA members exhibited at the Drew County Fair, Southeast Arkansas District Fair, and Arkansas State Fair this past fall. Sophomore Colton Reed exhibits registered Katahdin breeding stock. He raises Katahdin stock with his grandfather Herschell Loveless. They own Diamond L Farm in Wilmar. Colton has been exhibiting hair sheep since 2013. Annually, at the Arkansas State Fair in Little Rock, Colton exhibits his sheep by their breed, then against other hair breed varieties, and finally against all registered breed types. Arkansas State Fair offers two shows annually. The open show is for any breeder across the United States of any age. It is not uncommon for Colton to compete against seasoned exhibitors from multiple states.

He is a member of the Arkansas Junior Sheep Council. In addition, he was inducted into the highly sought after Purple Circle Club organized by Arkansas Farm Bureau. Colton has been an inducted member of Purple Circle for two years. Purple Circle was organically for market shows only but due to changes in agriculture over the years, his projects now qualify to be eligible.

In 1978 Paul Harvey gave a speech to the FFA national convention. His words ring true today. Here is the full text of his speech: And on the 8th day, God looked down on his planned paradise and said, "I need a caretaker" - So God made a Farmer. God said, "I need somebody willing to get up before dawn, milk cows, work all day in the fields, milk cows again, eat supper, then go to town and stay past midnight at a meeting of the school board" - So God made a Farmer. "I need somebody with arms strong enough to rustle a calf and yet gentle enough to deliver his own grandchild; somebody to call hogs, tame cantankerous machinery, come home hungry, have to wait lunch until his wife's done feeding visiting ladies, then tell the ladies to be sure and come back real soon -- and mean it" - So God made a Farmer. God said, "I need somebody willing to sit up all night with a newborn colt, and watch it die, then dry his eyes and say, 'Maybe next year'. I need somebody who can shape an ax handle from a persimmon sprout, shoe a horse with a hunk of car tire, who can make harness out of haywire, feed sacks and shoe scraps; who, planting time and harvest season, will finish his forty-hour week by Tuesday noon, and then pain'n from tractor back, put in another seventy-two hours" - So God made a Farmer. God had to have somebody willing to ride the ruts at double speed to get the hay in ahead of the rain clouds, and yet stop in mid-field and race to help when he sees the first smoke from a neighbor's place - So God made a Farmer. God said, "I need somebody strong enough to clear trees and heave bails, yet gentle enough to tame lambs and wean pigs and tend the pinkcombed pullets, who will stop his mower for an hour to splint the broken leg of a meadow lark." It had to be somebody who'd plow deep and straight and not cut corners; somebody to seed, weed, feed, breed and rake and disc and plow and plant and tie the fleece and strain the milk and replenish the self-feeder and finish a hard week's work with a five-mile drive to church; somebody who would bale a family together with the soft strong bonds of sharing, who would laugh, and then sigh, and then reply, with smiling eyes, when his son says that he wants to spend his life "doing what dad does" - So God made a Farmer.



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
