Falls Township bidding two traffic improvement projects

By summer, two Falls Township intersections will be upgraded with an improved traffic signal and an improved pedestrian walkway.

During a recent Falls Supervisors meeting, the board authorized advertisement for bids to undertake a pedestrian crosswalk enhancement project at New Falls Road and Vermillion Drive; and a traffic signal improvement project at Trenton Road and North Olds Boulevard.

Remington & Vernick Engineers Project Manager Derrick Kennedy said construction would begin on the pedestrian crosswalk on approximately May 5 and continue for about three months. The anticipated timeline for the traffic signal upgrade at Trenton Road and North Olds Boulevard is expected to begin on or about April 21 and continue for approximately five months, according to Kennedy.

In terms of the pedestrian crosswalk at New Falls Road and Vermillion Drive, the project entails adding a push button-activated pedestrian warning system using rectangular rapid flashing beacons. Existing pavement markings and signage will also be improved in association with the pedestrian signal installation.

"I'm excited to see this project. It's been a long time coming," Supervisor Jeff Boraski said, adding that the board began considering the project at the start of his first term on the board, which began nearly 12 years ago and will conclude at year's end. "It's a good way to end my 12-year career."

Supervisor Vice Chairperson

Erin Mullen, who ran Monday's meeting, thanked Boraski for his persistence.

The other project includes a full traffic signal replacement and modernization at the intersection of Trenton Road and North Olds Boulevard, including associated roadway improvements and ADA ramps. The project will be funded by a Green Light Go grant, with a 20 percent township match.

"I look forward to seeing it getting done," Supervisor Brian Galloway said, noting concerns with children crossing the roadway before and after school. "It really needs this."

Falls Supervisors seek recycling grant

If you could spend \$6,300, but know that you would recoup another \$50,000 or more why wouldn't you do it?

During a recent meeting, the Falls Township Supervisors approved a grant writing proposal that's expected to substantially pay the Township much more than its initial investment. The forward-thinking board approved a proposal from F.X. Browne, Inc./Bogia Engineering, Inc. for completion of the Township's annual Act 101 recycling grant application for 2024.

Falls receives more than \$50,000 each year from the grant. The 2022 grant yielded \$108,141.54.

Grant amounts are based on total tonnage for residential

and commercial properties. F.X. Browne, Inc., as part of its proposal, will obtain valid documentation needed for the application.

The company has submitted the township's grant applications for more than 20 years.

Residents and businesses are encouraged to recycle as much material as possible. Every little bit helps increase the amount of potential grant funds.

Adventures in spring gardening

After a chilly winter, March has graced us with some warmer days. As a gardener, the warmer weather serves as a siren call to head back into the yard and begin preparing for the upcoming spring and summer. There are a few considerations you might want to make before diving right in, as March and early April can be a great time to take a pause for some solid planning.

Although it's tempting to start your spring clean-up as soon as the first warm day occurs, it can often be helpful to delay some of the cleaning until a few weeks after the last frost. This way, you can be fairly certain that most pollinators have safely emerged from their winter habitats among your leaves and stems. We gain great value from having our native

pollinators present. They are essential to the reproduction of most flowering plants and they significantly impact the yield of our garden, especially those of us trying to grow vegetables. Beyond the specific benefits they bring to our own gardens, they contribute to a balanced ecosystem- keep nuisance pests in check and feed our native

While you're waiting for your spring clean-up window,

some things to consider for your vegetable gardens are some good companion plants. If you're trying to grow tomatoes, peppers, beans, herbs or carrots, companion plants can be a great way to enhance that crop. There are several resources available to guide you through the plant-pairing process. Some plants simply grow well together, but the addition of, say, nasturtium to

tomato plants not only adds visual appeal, but also has an added benefit of pest control. This early spring window is a great opportunity to literally map out your planting blueprint so you can hit the soil running. A good pencil sketch can help keep track of your planting or there are some go-to apps for those who want to go more "high-tech."

As we experienced last summer, water can be unpredictable. We can find ourselves vacillating between excess water management and only weeks later, battling drought. As there's really no predicting Mother Nature, one thing we can try to be more cognizant of is using plants and trees that are more acclimated to our climate. Our native trees, shrubs and perennials tend to be less fussy and more able to handle longer periods of dry

weather. If you're planning some new trees for shade, privacy or overall ecological benefit, consider planting a native species. Many of our local nurseries in Bucks offer native tree options. It's also important to consider the soil and sun conditions. Is the area where you're planting often wet? Is it full sun or partial shade? Planting the right plant or tree in the right space can make a huge difference to the plant's longevity and the overall return you get on your investment.

Lastly, many folks are avid bird fans with a growing number of our Townships and Borough in Bucks becoming designated Bird Towns. The type of bird you're trying to attract may factor into your plant and tree selection. You also might want to consider birdhouses, and early spring is a great time to do so. It's

always best to do a bit of research beforehand. Some birdhouses might be attractive to people, but are they functional and attractive to birds? Using an educational resource like your local extension website or a wildlife organization can give you research-backed information. If you're doing any research on trees, plants, or attracting wildlife, using a .edu or .org website is your best strategy. Happy spring gardening, Bucks County!

in Bucks County are working full-time—sometimes juggling multiple jobs—yet still struggling to afford the basics," said Marissa Christie. President and CEO at United Way of Bucks County. BC Grand Families Support Group: Now in three BC locations

The BC Grand Families Support Group has become an invaluable resource for grandparents and other relatives who find themselves raising children. Founded in 2019 by New Britain resident Beth Jester, this support group provides a welcoming environment where caregivers can connect, share experiences, and gain access to essential resources that help them navigate their unique challenges.

For the first five years, this support group met at the Lenape Valley Presbyterian Church in New Britain, its Central Bucks County location, where Beth is a member.

As demand grew, the support group expanded last April, launching a Lower Bucks County chapter in Levittown at the Acts of Grace Church, led by Lisa Barnelli. By September of last year, a third chapter was established in Upper Bucks County at Calvary Souderton Church, facilitated by Carolyn Matthews. These expansions were made possible through funding from the Bucks County Opioid Settlement Funds, distributed by the Bucks County Drug and Alcohol Commission.

According to Beth, the number of grand-parents raising grandchildren in Bucks County is staggering. As of the most recent census, approximately 12,000 grandparents in Bucks County are raising their grandchildren, with around 90,000 across Pennsylvania. Many of these situations arise due to parental struggles, including addiction, incarceration, or other life-altering cir-

cumstances. Understanding the immense challenges these families face, Beth saw the urgent need for a support group that could provide guidance and camaraderie for those in similar situations.

"It was 100 percent clear to me that there was a huge need for this support group, and that there were people out there that had no knowledge of the things that I had learned along the way, and I wanted to share them," Beth explains. "Selfishly, I also wanted to be among my peers. It's a lonely place to be when you first take on your grandkids."

Beth Jester and her husband John have lived in Central Bucks County for nearly four decades, raising their own children before stepping in to raise their two grand-children. Their journey began when their

grandchildren, then just a few month's old and two-and-a-half years old, came into their care. As Beth searched for a local support group to help navigate this uncharted territory, she was met with a void; no such group existed in the county.

Determined to fill this gap, Beth co-founded the BC Grand Families Support Group. The group quickly took off, offering a much-needed space for grandparents and other relatives to share their experiences and gain access to vital resources.

"When I first started raising my grandchildren, I had to quit my job and go back to diaper changing, feeding, bathing, and all the things that a new parent does," Beth recalls. "You don't have baby stuff in your house anymore, and suddenly you're buying a crib, a high chair, baby food. It wasn't an average situation for someone my age."

The BC Grand Families Support Group provides a supportive community where members can share their experiences and receive guidance from peers who have faced similar challenges. Meetings include discussions led by experts on a range of relevant topics, such as trauma therapy and raising children in the digital age. The group also assists members in navigating available programs such as Medicaid and the Family Service Association, ensuring that families are aware of and able to access the necessary resources available to them.

Understanding the challenges of attending meetings, the group also provides free babysitting, offered by the nonprofit organization Along the Way, allowing caregivers to focus on the sessions without concern for childcare. Additionally, a complimentary dinner

is provided, easing the burden for attendees who often have limited time to prepare meals before heading to the meetings.

One of the most valuable aspects of the BC Grand Families Support Group is the sense of community it fosters. Many grandparents and other caregivers find themselves isolated, as their peers are often in different life stages. Raising children later in life presents unique physical, emotional, and financial challenges. The group provides a network of understanding individuals who can offer practical advice, emotional support, and friendship.

"Your peers are not doing what you're doing, and it's a lonely place because all of your time is taken up with the physical and mental caretaking of children," Beth shares. "I know what it's like to be up at night, worrying about how to navigate school systems, extra-curricular activities, and healthcare. That's why this group is so important."

Additionally, the children in these families often experience trauma, having been uprooted from their previous living situations. The support group helps caregivers learn how to best address these challenges, ensuring a smoother transition for both the children and their guardians. By sharing experiences, members gain insight into what has worked for others in similar situations, offering them reassurance and guidance.



As demand continues to grow, Beth Jester and her team remain committed to expanding their reach and services. The group welcomes anyone raising the children of a loved one, including aunts, uncles, great-grandparents, and even close family friends who have stepped into parental roles.

All three support groups meet the same two Mondays a month from 6 to 7:30 pm. Meetings are held September through November and then again from March through May, so its next meeting will take place March 3. Registration is

required by noon on the day of each meeting to ensure adequate preparation for babysitting and meals. There is no cost to attend these support groups.

The benefits of gardening conventions and garden clubs

Garden clubs offer much more than monthly meetings; they create a space for education, camaraderie, and community service. As Karen Wychock, president of the Trevose Horticulture Society (THS), emphasizes, "Gardening is not just about tending to your backyard. It involves everyone; all cultures, all countries. No matter where you're from, there's a shared love for watching things grow."

This year's 95th Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania (GCFP) Convention, hosted by District XI, exemplifies the depth of engagement garden clubs provide. Convention participants will include 11 districts across the state, including 11 GCFP garden clubs in Bucks and Montgomery counties. Karen, chairperson of this year's convention, describes how planning for this event has been a large undertaken, but well worth it, beginning three years ago.

Themed "A Gardening Revolution," this convention will take place from April 6-8 at the Alloy King of Prussia DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel, adjacent to Valley Forge National Park. Each year, a different district leads this event, rotating responsibility across the state. This year's convention will feature approximately 16 speakers and welcome around 300 garden club members affiliated with the GCFP.

A highlight of the convention is the opportunity for members to participate in workshops and hear from guest speakers, many of whom are from the local area. Gloria Denoon from Newtown will conduct an origami paper flowers workshop, guiding participants through creating delicate

floral designs. Carrie Barron of Montgomery County will lead a session on pressing flowers in circular frames, connecting attendees with botanical preservation techniques.

Sunday evening's featured speaker, Renee Tucci, a Bucks County Community College floral design educator, will discuss how traditions transform into trends in floral design. As part of her presentation, she will create six floral designs that will be raffled off at the convention. With over 20 years of experience, Renee brings insight into both the artistry and history of floral arrangement.

Additionally, David Heller, owner of Flowers by David in Langhorne, will demonstrate floral design using positive and negative space techniques, incorporating both botanical and non-botanical elements.

Beyond floral design, the convention integrates historical education. Attendees can take trolley tours of Valley Forge National Park, and Carol Spacht of Montgomery County will appear as Martha Washington during the Monday luncheon, sharing insights into colonial-era gardening and history.

One of the most significant benefits of a gardening convention is the chance to connect with others across the state. "We rarely see people from the western side of Pennsylvania," Karen notes, "so it's always valuable to share ideas, listen to expert speakers, and come together in camaraderie." These conventions promote lifelong learning. "Anytime you attend a workshop or lecture, you gain knowledge that enriches your gardening journey," explains Karen.

Garden clubs, in general, provide year-round opportunities for education and commu-

nity engagement. The Trevose Horticultural Society, which meets in Bensalem, has about 65 members throughout Bucks County and beyond. Many of these members will attend the convention. "We've seen an increase in membership in the last couple of years," Karen shares. "Our meetings are open to the public, and anyone interested can join us."

One of the club's key contributions is community service. Many clubs, including THS, host free events such as flower shows and plant sales. In addition, with spring upon us, THS has begun distributing free seeds to its members thanks to a donation from Burpee Seeds in Doylestown. Additionally, garden clubs across the state will receive free seeds at the convention to encourage local gardening initiatives.

"Garden clubs aren't just about personal gardening; they're about community impact," Karen explains. "Whether you're growing on a windowsill or tending to two acres of land, there's a place for you."

For those interested in learning more, the Trevose Horticultural Society meets on the third Tuesday of each month at the Bensalem Senior Center, and welcomes visitors to attend meetings. More information can be found at www. trevosegardeners.org or on Facebook.







Bucks County Community College hosts free Criminal Expungement Clinic

In an effort to help people overcome past mistakes that may block future success, Bucks County Community College is hosting a free Criminal Expungement Clinic from 11 am to 2 pm on Saturday, April 26 at the Epstein Campus at Lower Bucks County in Bristol.

Paralegal students, under the supervision of attorneys from Legal Aid of Southeast Pennsylvania, will help people determine if they are eligible to have certain prior arrests or convictions expunged or sealed from their record.

Greg Luce, Dean of the School of Business, Innovation, and Legal Studies, said it's the second year the college has hosted the free Criminal Expungement Clinic. After last

year's success at the Newtown Campus, the event is being offered at the College's Bristol location this year.

"The Expungement Clinic is a powerful example of experiential learning," noted Luce. "Our paralegal students are gaining invaluable practical experience while providing a potentially life-changing service to our community members. It's a win-win for both our students and the residents of Bucks County."

The clinic is for individuals who:

have arrests without convictions: or

have misdemeanor convictions, without new convictions, over 10 years old; or

are over 70 years old, and

their conviction is at least 10 vears old: or

passed away at least 3 years ago, and a posthumous expungement is sought.

Some convictions cannot be expunged, but may be sealed so that they are not of public record. Individuals must have paid all due fines and completed any probation to qualify for expungement. The clinic may need to refer some individuals to other legal organizations due to the location of their criminal records, such as Philadelphia or outside of Pennsylvania.

All information shared with attorneys and paralegals is confidential. Paralegals may not practice law or otherwise provide legal services directly to the public except as permitted

The Epstein Campus at Lower Bucks is located at 1304 Veterans Highway in Bristol, where there is ample free parking. Advance registration is preferred. The registration deadline is April 4. Falls to restore, improve drainage for hockey rink

The hockey rink at Falls Township Community Park will receive a facelift as part of a restoration project aimed at improving drainage.

The rink, which was renovated in 2022 to include a new dasher board, resurfaced rink, and restored fencing, has had issues with rainwater collecting on its surface following storms.

Township Engineer Joseph Jones of Jones Engineering Associates said the upcoming improvements will address drainage issues. As part of his engineering services proposal, which the board approved 4-0, the firm will undertake surveying and preliminary analysis, engineering design, oversee bid administration, and provide inspection and construction oversight, including attendance at pre-construction meetings

and construction progress meetings.

Construction is expected to cost \$120,000 and will include repaving the rink after milling the upper surface and preparing crack seal and filler to provide a surface that drains rainfall.

In other business, the Supervisors adopted an ordinance amendment that closes parks an hour earlier. Under the change, Falls Township parks will be open from sunrise to sunset daily. The time change is aimed at curbing vandalism issues and ensuring public safety.

The sunset closure would be effective every day except for "unusual and unforeseen emergencies and approved special events," according to the ordinance.
