Walking for Warmth: Doylestown's "Coldest Night of the Year" Raises Awareness and Over \$40K for Those in Need

Although spring is finally here, it wasn't long ago that the frigid weather was upon us and, therefore, the "Coldest Night of the Year" (CNOY), an annual winter walk in Doylestown, was held at the end of February. This family-friendly event brought together the community to raise funds and awareness for people facing homelessness, hunger, and hardship.

CNOY, hosted by the Bucks County Opportunity Council, Bucks County Housing Group, Family Service Association of Bucks County, and YWCA Bucks County, offers participants the option of a 2K or 5K walk through town.

Originally launched in Canada in 2011, the CNOY event expanded to the United States, and three years ago, the Doylestown community joined the movement. Kelly Pasquarella, Director of Resource Development at YWCA Bucks County, recalls the early days when she got a call from a CNOY representative. "When they called and asked us to participate, we immediately reached out to our partners, and they were ecstatic to collaborate."

Despite starting late in its inaugural year, the event raised an impressive \$22,000. By year two, the event surpassed its \$25,000 goal, raising \$28,000. This year, the community came together stronger than ever, exceeding \$40,000. "The overall goal of this event is to raise awareness and get more people involved in helping those who are unhoused. It doesn't just have to be monetary; just volunteering your time to help makes a huge impact," Pasquarella emphasized.

The four nonprofits share proceeds from this event and collaborate at the Serving Bucks Together (SBT) center in Warminster, where they provide walk-in assistance. If one organization cannot meet a client's needs, they connect them with a partner nonprofit, ensuring access to essential services, especially for those in need of

housing or food.

With 254 registered participants and many walk-in attendees, this year's event ultimately consisted of over 300 participants, the largest turnout yet. Before the walk began, the crowd held a solemn moment of silence for those lost to homelessness in 2024. "It was somber, which was what we as the planning committee were going for; we wanted everybody to feel the impact of what we were doing," said Pasquarella.

The walk kicked off at the

Bucks County Justice Center with an electrifying performance from Drummers With Attitude (DWA), a group of student drummers from Bristol Township School District. Their beats set the tone for the walk as confetti filled the air.

Several elected officials and nonprofit representatives gave speeches welcoming the widespread community support for tackling homelessness and hunger in Bucks County.

The medal and certificate awarded by Chapter President Steven Ware and First Vice President David Tweed were for Mark's research, scripted drama and documentary film promoting the historical story of the Doan Gang and other little-known stories from the revolutionary war period. 

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Bucks County Opportunity Council celebrates arrival of new food truck

The Bucks County Opportunity Council recently unveiled the arrival of a new, refrigerated truck designed to increase the distribution efforts of their Food Program. "This truck came about as a partnership with the County of Bucks, utilizing grant funds from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) designated for COVID relief efforts to help alleviate food-insecurity in the County. After two years of delays, the need still exists and this new truck has arrived to help and expand and support the Retail Rescue food operations," said Elizabeth Zbinden, Food Program Manager. Commissioners Diane Ellis-Marseglia and Bob Harvie, along with key Bucks County and BCOC staff attended to celebrate this important occasion.

Retail Rescue refers to the practice of recovering and redistributing surplus food that would otherwise be wasted from grocery stores and other retailers. The program is always looking to add more locations. This food is then distributed throughout the county to BCOC's network of pantry partners, ensuring the food arrives while still fresh and shelf viable, available to residents in need daily. Heather Foor, Director of Client Services said, "We are expecting to be able to serve 20% more families with this additional truck."

The truck will also be utilized to support the HELP Center and aid in the safe and efficient distribution of food products. The HELP Center is not only a food distribution site for food pantries but also designed as a center where individuals and families who are food insecure can come and

"shop" for desired food items which includes both shelf-stable and perishable foods. The need to transport food to the most vulnerable populations is a critical operational goal of the HELP

Rescue Coordinator.

The truck is a 2024 Mack 24-foot refrigerated box truck. It can hold up to ten pallets of product or up to 15,000 pounds of food. In addition to the grant from the County of Bucks, St. Mary's Medical center provided funding to wrap the truck and to purchase a pallet jack for the truck.

BCOC is the lead anti-poverty, non-profit organization in Bucks County, dedicated to ending poverty by connecting people with the resources they need to thrive. BCOC has five major program areas: Housing, Food, Weatherization, Volunteer Income Tax Preparation (VITA) and the Economic Self-Sufficiency (ES) Program. Housing includes street outreach, rental and move in aid, and utility shut-off prevention. Food services supply food directly to families through a network of 75 food pantries and distribution sites. Weatherization services help families in reducing their energy costs. VITA provides free income tax preparation assistance. The ES Program assists individuals and families to leave poverty permanently through case management, education, and employment.

Adventures in spring gardening

After a chilly winter, March has graced us with some warmer days. As a gardener, the

warmer weather serves as a siren call to head back into the yard and begin preparing for the upcoming spring and summer. There are a few considerations you might want to make before diving right in, as March and early April can be a great time to take a pause for some solid planning.

Although it's tempting to start your spring clean-up as soon as the first warm day occurs, it can often be helpful to delay some of the cleaning

until a few weeks after the last frost. This way, you can be fairly certain that most pollinators have safely emerged from their winter habitats among your leaves and stems. We gain great value from having our native pollinators present. They are essential to the reproduction of most flowering plants and they significantly impact the yield of our garden, especially those of us trying to grow vegetables. Beyond the specific benefits they bring to our own gardens, they contribute to a balanced ecosystem- keep nuisance pests in check and feed our native birds.

While you're waiting for your spring clean-up window, some things to consider for



vour vegetable gardens are some good companion plants. If you're trying to grow tomatoes, peppers, beans, herbs or carrots, companion plants can be a great way to enhance that crop. There are several resources available to guide you through the plant-pairing process. Some plants simply grow well together, but the addition of, say, nasturtium to tomato plants not only adds visual appeal, but also has an added benefit of pest control. This early spring window is a great opportunity to literally map out your planting blueprint so you can hit the soil running. A good pencil sketch can help keep track of your planting or there are some go-to apps for those who want to go more "high-tech."

As we experienced last summer, water can be unpredictable. We can find ourselves vacillating between excess water management and only weeks later, battling drought. As there's really no predicting Mother Nature, one thing we can try to be more cognizant of is using plants and trees that are more acclimated to our climate. Our native trees. shrubs and perennials tend to be less fussy and more able to handle longer periods of dry weather. If you're planning some new trees for shade,

privacy or overall ecological benefit, consider planting a native species. Many of our local nurseries in Bucks offer native tree options. It's also important to consider the soil and sun conditions. Is the area where you're planting often wet? Is it full sun or partial shade? Planting the right plant or tree in the right space can make a huge difference to the plant's longevity and the overall return you get on your investment.

Lastly, many folks are avid bird fans with a growing number of our Townships and Borough in Bucks becoming designated Bird Towns. The type of bird you're trying to attract may factor into your plant and tree selection. You also might want to consider birdhouses, and early spring is a great time to do so. It's always best to do a bit of research beforehand. Some birdhouses might be attractive to people, but are they functional and attractive to birds? Using an educational resource like your local extension website or a wildlife organization can give you research-backed information. If you're doing any research on trees, plants, or attracting wildlife, using a .edu or .org website is your best strategy. Happy spring gardening, Bucks County!



April is almost here with warmer temperatures bringing all our springtime pests. We have control programs for all of them. Flea, Tick, and

Mosquito Suppression: Tick suppression starts now. We make monthly visits to treat the property. Applications are done by fogging the perimeter of the property, as well as spraying nesting areas. Plant material around the house (patio, deck, pool, swing set wood lines if applicable) will also be treated. Adult ticks are present in fall, winter, and early spring and are active any day with temperatures above freezing. Eggs hatch in the spring. Larvae are present during late summer and nymphs during late spring and throughout the summer. Our recent warm temperatures will have them active. Treat now and enjoy being outside in your yard.

Turf: Our seven-step program keeps lawns beautiful and weed-free. When was the last time you had your soil tested? Bucks County soil tends to be poor, if not treated. Testing allows us to know what is happening underground. Deficien-



Tailor Made Film & Video Transfers

People have been filming events and excerpts from daily life for about 100 years. In 1923, 16mm film arrived on the market and was the first film format that was intended to be used by an amateur. Regular 8mm film became available in 1932, followed in 1965 by Eastman Kodak when they came out with Super 8mm film.

Then in the late 1970s, Betamax and VHS camcorders were introduced which gradually replaced the movie film market with video, a much cheaper way to capture the family memories. Fewer and fewer people still have the capability to view VCR tapes and the videotapes themselves are quickly deteriorating. With videotapes holding precious memories, it's definitely time to transfer them to a digital format such as DVD and .MP4

files.

Using all professional equipment, if your videotape doesn't play well in one deck they try it in several decks until they can capture the best picture. They add a professional menu to the beginning and "intelligent" chapter points which make navigating through your DVD a breeze. Clean edits at

the beginning and end of your program, eliminating annoying "snow," add to the professional transfer.

All transfers to DVD include .mp4 files, which you can put on a flash drive and watch and share on your devices (smart TV, computers). You can fit your entire videotape library on a flash drive in your pocket!

In an effort to help people overcome past mistakes that may block future success, Bucks County Community College is hosting a free Criminal Expungement Clinic from 11 am to 2 pm on Saturday, April 26 at the Epstein Campus at Lower Bucks County in Bristol.

Paralegal students, under the supervision of attorneys from Legal Aid of Southeast Pennsylvania, will help people determine if they are eligible to have certain prior arrests or convictions expunged or sealed from their record.

Greg Luce, Dean of the School of Business, Innovation, and Legal Studies, said it's the second year the college has hosted the free Criminal Expungement Clinic. After last year's success at the Newtown Campus, the event is being offered at the College's Bristol location this year.

"The Expungement Clinic is a powerful example of experiential learning," noted Luce. "Our paralegal students are gaining invaluable practical experience while providing a potentially life-changing service to our community members. tions; or have misdemeanor convictions, without new convictions, over 10 years old; or

are over 70 years old, and their conviction is at least 10 years old; or passed away at least 3 years ago, and a posthumous expungement is sought.

Some convictions cannot be expunged, but may be sealed so that they are not of public record. Individuals must have paid all due fines and completed any probation to qualify for expungement. The clinic may need to refer some individuals to other legal organizations due to the location of

The Bucks County Intermediate Unit (Bucks IU) is taking this opportunity to recognize the invaluable contributions of social workers in supporting Bucks IU students and their families.

"Our Bucks IU social workers step up when students and families need support the most, often in ways that are not seen by others," said Dr. Mark Hoffman, Bucks IU Executive Director. According to Amy Snyder-Dietz, Bucks IU's Lead School Social Worker and IDEA Interagency Coordinator, the organization employs fourteen school social workers. Some work directly with students at Bucks IU learning centers, while others serve students in classrooms across Bucks County.

The role of a school social worker varies based on their assignment, explained veteran **Bucks IU Social Worker Chris** Killcoyne, who has supported special needs students and



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their families for 27 years. Killcoyne provides individual and group counseling, crisis intervention, and referrals for students in multiple Bucks County school districts. She also helps families access community resources, including behavioral health services and in-home care. Additionally, she assists families with medical, child welfare, and socioeconomic issues and guides students 18 and older in securing job-related community resources.

Bucks IU school social workers collaborate with other agency staff to achieve the best outcomes for students, said

Marci Cianni, a school social worker based at Bucks IU at Samuel Everitt in Levittown.

Cianni, who has been with Bucks IU for 21 years, supports students in the Bucks IU's **Emotional Support and Inspire** Partial Hospitalization programs, as well as those in Bucks IU's Brain Injury classroom.She finds great fulfillment in seeing her students "succeed and thrive" in school.

Throughout March, there have been several opportunities to honor Bucks IU school social workers, including National School Social Work Week at the beginning of the month

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and World Social Work Day on March 19.

"Their dedication to promoting the academic, social, and emotional well-being of students is truly worth celebrating," said Dr. Lenny Greaney, Assistant to the Bucks IU Executive Director. "School social workers have a unique ability to support our staff in understanding the social-emotional development of our learners, strengthening a positive school climate. Bucks IU school social workers are essential in creating the robust programs we provide throughout Bucks County."

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
