A Community Stronghold: The vital contributions of VFW Post 6393

Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 6393 in Lower Makefield, stands as a shining example of service and community engagement. With approximately 225 members, this post dates back to 1946, founded by World War II veterans. Under the leadership of Commander Kirk Saboda, now in his third year, Post 6393 has earned the prestigious All-American Status twice. More importantly, it has become a vital part of the local community, serving veterans and fostering connections with residents of all ages.

Saboda has prioritized attracting younger veterans, including those in the Global

War on Terrorism (GWOT). Initiatives like yoga classes and a run/walk 5K club cater to this demographic. The post's remodeled space, with an industrial motif and gaming systems, reflects a modern aesthetic designed to appeal to younger members and their families. "Today's veterans want spaces where their spouses feel welcome too," Saboda said, who strives to ensure that this post provides a welcoming environment where both male and female veterans can feel at home.

As winter chills Lower Bucks County, Post 6393 gears up to serve. One significant effort is its involvement in the Code Blue initiative through AHTN (Advocates for the Homeless

and Those in Need), which provides aid to the homeless during dangerously cold weather. "Whether they are veterans or not, we help ensure no one is left in the cold," Saboda shared. Members assist by donating coats, driving buses, and collaborating with local churches that manage the program

Local Girl Scout advocates for the welfare and humane population control of community cats

Yardley's Olivia Hutchison, a Girl Scout from Troop 21327 and a senior at Pennsbury High School, is making a significant impact on her community through her Gold Project. Partnering with the nonprofit organization Stray Cat Project, Olivia is advocating for the health and welfare of community cats. Her initiative focuses on the importance of Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR), the spay and neutering of cats, as well as fostering kittens born to community cats, addressing the overpopulation of community cats, and promoting humane solutions.

Olivia explained that "community cat" is an all-encompassing term to include all unowned outdoor cats, regardless of whether they are stray or feral (unsocialized to humans). She strives to correct the misconception that all outdoor cats are feral. In fact, the term applies to the cat's disposition/temperament, and not where it lives (indoors or outdoors).

From a young age, Olivia developed a deep affection for cats, having grown up with six feline companions over the years. Her empathy for community cats in need inspired her to take action. "Whenever I saw a cat outside in the cold with no food and no shelter, it hit me hard," she shared. Recognizing the challenges faced by community cats, she decided to dedicate her Gold Project to creating awareness and encouraging solutions.

According to Olivia, the statistics are alarming: about 80% of kittens born outdoors do

not survive past their first year. This sad reality emphasizes the importance of Olivia's work. By educating the community on TNR, a humane approach to controlling the community cat population, she aims to prevent unnecessary suffering and improve the lives of both cats and people.

Olivia's partnership with the Stray Cat Project, founded by Mariann Matarese, has been instrumental in advancing her goals. The organization provides local resources, including TNR services and fostering support. "When my family worked with the Stray Cat Project to TNR a feral cat in our area, I realized how impactful their work was and knew I wanted to collaborate with them," Olivia explained.

She described how the benefits of TNR are far-reaching.
Neutered cats are less likely to exhibit problematic behaviors such as aggression or territorial fighting, reducing disruptions in neighborhoods. Additionally, continued on pg. 27

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Adopt a South African Preschool

Adopt a South African Preschool celebrates 5th birthday!

This Valentine's Day marks the fifth birthday of Adopt a South African Preschool (ASAP), a Yardley-based nonprofit which makes early childhood education accessible in disadvantaged South African communities. Founded in 2020. ASAP has established eight educational toy library training hubs in areas still impacted by the legacy of apartheid.

These libraries provide vital resources to informal daycares, helping them evolve into proper preschools. Each

library supports 30 facilities with games, puzzles, musical instruments, puppets, books, Legos, phonics programs, and sports equipment. Daycare owners receive weekly curriculum-based training and visits to their settings by preschool coaches from ASAP's nonprofit partner.

The initiative addresses a critical need: 80% of South African fourth-graders struggle with reading comprehension, and 40% cannot read at all. Research shows that early

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childhood development and first-grade performance are crucial predictors of future success. ASAP's innovative and scalable model is addressing this crisis by giving children the foundation needed to thrive.

Donors have enabled ASAP to have remarkable impact in just five years: eight toy libraries in three provinces now serve 223 preschools, empowering 1,162 women to become educators, and enabling 10,790 children to learn through play.

As ASAP celebrates this mile-

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Explore 'The Revolutionary World of a Free Black Man'

The Lower Makefield Historical Society welcomes historian Larry Kidder for a revealing look at Jacob Francis, a free Black man who fought for American independence as well as equal rights for all.

At a time when American colonists struggled against long odds to gain their freedom from Great Britain, Jacob Francis, a free Black man, fought not only for American independence, but also for equal rights for all people in our newly formed nation. A native of nearby Amwell, N.J., the patriot joined Gen. George Washington's Continental Army in October 1775—despite Washington's efforts to prevent Black men from enlisting—and fought heroically in the Battle of Trenton.

Author and historian Larry

Kidder will detail Francis' long, meaningful life in a special Black History Month presentation hosted by the Lower Makefield Historical Society on Sunday, February 16. This free event, open to the public, will be held from 2-4 p.m., at the Lower Makefield Township Community Center, 1550 Oxford Valley Road, in Yardley.

Jacob Francis lived long enough to see an American flag with 25 stars. After the war, he purchased an enslaved woman named Mary, emancipated her, and married her in the home

of her former master. They presided over a well-respected Flemington, N.J. family, raising nine children, including Abner Hunt Francis, who spent his adult life working for the cause of abolition and equal rights for all people.

Larry Kidder is the author of "The Revolutionary World of a Free Black Man: Jacob Francis 1754–1836". He taught history for 40 years and is past president of historical societies in Ewing and Hopewell Townships in New Jersey. Kidder has been a volunteer historian, interpreter, and draft-

horse teamster at the Howell Living History Farm and is also a consultant and battlefield tour guide for the Princeton Battlefield Society. The author of five books focusing on the American Revolution, Kidder serves as an interpreter for full-day bus tours of the "Ten Crucial Days" event. 

SCORE mentors help Yardley "Mompreneur" scale infant sleep subscription business

Expectant parents are often told to enjoy their sleep before the baby arrives. For Yardley resident, Ann Marks, sleep deprivation wasn't part of her recipe for parenthood.

"It was born out of a need of my own," Marks said of her subscription-based and one-onone consultation business, Full Feedings. "A lot of people want sleep, need sleep. This is possible naturally when you meet

your baby's needs."

She began offering one-onone consultations in 2019 and launched her online programs in March 2020 with the goal of helping parents "enjoy parenthood more fully." She has since amassed thousands of subscribers seeking insight on infant and toddler sleep programs.

The former model and actress developed her research-

continued from pg. 10 based sleep training method when her now 9-year-old daughter was born. Once she saw success with her daughter, and later, with her 6-yearold twin boys, she began sharing her insight with other families.

Her doula convinced Marks that she was onto something life-changing for sleepy parents of young children.

"Every parent has the same issues," Marks said, adding that the guides she began developing as part of Full Feedings all followed the same routine based on the child's age. "I think what I do is common sense. I explain it in a very digestible sleepdeprivation format."

The subscription has drawn a global audience with customers throughout the U.S., as well as Asia, Australia and throughout Europe. Marks hopes to have her program translated into Spanish and eventually envisions Full Feedings being a component of the Family and Medical Leave

In fall 2023, Marks and her team of three began developing an all-encompassing "virtual village" of affordable and effective professional support for children and parents from birth to age 3 for feeding, sleep, mental health and community/ connection.

Not sure where to begin, Marks sought help from SCORE **Bucks County mentors Leah** Cianfrani and Steve Wolfson. "I've never run a business. I don't have a business degree. I was just going from month to month. I wasn't paying attention to spending," Marks said. "Getting all of that in order is ultimately where SCORE

knocked it out of the park." Her mentors helped her create a business plan, set strategic goals, and served as a sounding board for ideas and act as unofficial "co-founders" in alleviating some of the pressure of entrepreneurial life.

"To just be able to have

people that show up consistently and have great ideas and help me see things that I can't see has been invaluable," she said.

Marks' mentors are proud of her success now—a 7 percent growth in subscription revenue—and future plans, which include a training program for birth workers.

"In addition to revitalizing her core business, Ann is exploring diverse growth avenues," Cianfrani said.

"With SCORE's mentorship, she's set to achieve her growth goals and build a legacy that empowers families."

Offering services for seniors since 1973

Support, respect, and advocacy are the foundation of the Bucks County Area Agency on Aging and the services it provides. The Agency's services support older adults aged 60+ and their families, enable residents to remain in their homes as long as possible, keep them connected to the community, and protect them from abuse and exploitation.

The Agency's offerings include: information and referral to answer questions about available senior services and resources; health and wellness programs supporting older adults in making lifestyle changes to improve health, cope with chronic illness and recognize health and safety risks in and outside the home; the annual Senior Games event; nutrition services, including home delivered meals, congregate meals, and education; personalized counseling on Medicare insurance options and other issues (PA MEDI), and financial assis-

tance to pay Medicare and prescription drug insurance premiums; assistance with concerns about quality of services at adult day centers, assisted living and nursing care facilities (Ombudsman); subsidy for transportation by Bucks County Transport;

employment referral; legal counseling; socialization and recreational activities available through its senior center partnerships; caregivers financial support; and Long-Term Care services.

Long-Term Care services include: determining a person's eligibility for adult day care, in-home care or nursing facility services; assisting in the development of care plans; coordinating in-home care services; and arranging for financial assistance for eligible consumers in need of adult day care, personal care tasks, adaptive equipment, or home modifications.

Through its Protective Services unit, the Agency investigates confidential reports of need for all adult victims of abuse, neglect, exploitation, and abandonment. Reports of abuse are accepted 24-hours-per-day every day at 1-800-243-3767.

The post also provides year-round advocacy and assistance. Its Thursday "office hours" program exemplifies its dedication to veterans' welfare. A state VFW representative is available weekly at the post to assist veterans with filing claims for VA healthcare benefits, including disability claims for conditions like Agent Orange exposure. "This service helps about five to six veterans weekly," Saboda noted. Post volunteers oversee the pre-screening process ensuring efficiency, preventing veterans from needing multiple visits to gather necessary documentation.

All of these services are free—a sharp contrast to predatory services that exploit veterans by charging exorbitant fees. "We navigate the bureaucracy so veterans can focus on healing and

rebuilding," Saboda said.

The post's home repair initiative, spearheaded by a retired member with a background in handyman services, has become a lifeline for older veterans. "From fixing uneven flooring to replacing broken toilets, these repairs restore dignity and safety to veterans' homes," Saboda shared. Since its inception, the program has completed approximately 60 home repairs, saving veterans an estimated \$15,000 in labor costs. For those unable to afford materials, the post steps in to cover expenses, ensuring no veteran goes without essential repairs.

In another effort to make the post itself more inclusive, members recently remodeled the bathrooms to accommodate wheelchairbound veterans. This project underscores the post's commitment to creating a welcoming environment for all.

Post 6393's relationship with local scouting organizations is a cornerstone of its community involvement. The post sponsors both a Cub Scout Pack (Pack 30) and a Venture Crew (Crew 6393), offering its facility for meetings and activities. "We're not just sponsors; we're their legal representatives, like a church or school might be," Saboda explained.

One of the most cherished annual events is the Cub Scoutfocused Veterans Night in November. Scouts, along with their parents, gather to learn about the military, flag folding, and civic responsibilities. "It's a collaborative event that instills patriotism in young minds," Saboda said. Older scouts from the Venture Crew take leadership roles during the event, guiding younger participants in activities and ceremonies.

Scouts volunteer to help out

at the post's fundraisers like its Classic Car Show in July. With over 120 vehicles, live music, food trucks, and community booths, the event draws crowds from across the region. The post also organizes a Wrangler Fest in late September or early October, featuring Jeep Wranglers, silent auctions, and unique sponsor activities. Both events raise funds exclusively for veterans' needs, from covering heating bills to emergency plumbing repairs.

The post's poppy campaign, held around Easter, Memorial Day, and Veterans Day, raises funds for its relief fund. These proceeds are reserved for critical needs, such as heating assistance and home repairs. "The relief fund ensures we can act quickly to support veterans in crisis," Saboda emphasized.

Looking ahead, Post 6393 aims to maximize its three-acre property with additional outdoor events and festivals. "We want to create more opportunities for veterans to connect with the community," Saboda said.

VFW Post 6393 continues to evolve while staying true to its core mission: supporting veterans and fostering community. With initiatives spanning youth engagement, veteran advocacy, and public service, the post is a model of what a modern VFW chapter can achieve. As Saboda reflected, "This is a place for veterans to feel at home and know they are valued."

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Local nonprofit strives to "Pay It Forward" to people in need

When the pandemic hit in 2020, many people and families throughout Bucks and Montgomery counties experienced extraordinary and unexpected hardships that affected all aspects of daily life.

During that time, Munz Construction, a well-known family-owned business in Holland, decided to extend a helping hand to anyone that needed assistance and eventually established a program called, "Pay It Forward People." Its mission is to connect those in need with those in a position to pay it forward. This community-based, neighbors helping neighbors program has grown significantly since the early days of the pandemic. Pay It Forward People recently received its

nonprofit 501 (c) (3) tax-exempt status to continue with its charitable work.

"During the pandemic we happened to know a lot of people in the community from doing construction," recalled Kelsey Munz, whose father, Chris Munz, owns the business. "It came to our attention that a lot of people in our area were struggling to get food, diapers, formula and that sort of thing. Many people were not getting their unemployment checks. which put them in a difficult position especially with young children."

Kelsey, the Director of Pay It Forward and Director of community outreach for Munz Construction, noted that it became more apparent that there were a lot of people living paycheck to paycheck in the community making it difficult for them to buy necessities especially during the pandemic's peak.

"My dad actually put it out there first through Munz Construction. He said if anyone needs food, or formula or diapers or anything else to please reach out with no questions asked. A lot of people reached out for help. But, many people also reached out to help us with this initiative. People wanted to jump on board and find these people in need and pay it forward to them. We were absolutely astonished with how the community ran with this initiative. The community took it by storm and ran with it," she noted.

In the early stages of the pandemic, volunteers delivered food, meals and other supplies. As the pandemic shutdown continued, Pay It Forward People opened a food pantry at

donated office space at Munz Construction. In addition to food and essential household supplies, the program helped out with other projects such as: conducting a crayon drive at a Morrisville elementary school; removing fallen trees and installing a new roof for a person in the community having difficulties; donating baby supplies to a foster mom for a newborn placed in her care; and raising funds to replace the gravel from a washed out driveway for an elderly woman.

"We've done everything from food delivery to emergency tree removal to roof repairs, in order to help out families. Basically, we try to provide resources to a population that otherwise wouldn't be able to get help. We foster a network of connections, but we also provide services. It's a combination of both connecting people but also giving them the resources directly," Kelsey said.

Pay It Forward People has plans for continued growth now that several years have passed since the pandemic. In addition to Kelsey, its volunteer board members include: Greg Millevoi of Millevoi Auto Brothers, Ian Mullins, Miriam Miller, Amy Wisner, and Becca Morton (all residents of Bucks County), as well as many other volunteers in the community. The board and its volunteers have worked on raising awareness of its mission by partnering with local groups at their events such as Octoberfest 4 Vets and Pawzibilities Animal Rescue. They have connected with other communitybased organizations such as Doylestown Neighbors United,

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Animal Lifeline and the Bucks
County Opportunity Council.
Kelsey noted they also can
provide information on many
other resources ranging from
senior services to mental health
support to transportation
options to food pantries.

"We have definitely connected with a lot more organizations. What we hope is

that we can get a bigger team together so that we can help out more people. We hope to continue to grow and pay it forward."

Advocates for Homeless & Those in Need: Providing temporary shelter and hunger relief

As winter brings the harsh reality of freezing temperatures, this season causes significant challenges for our homeless community. Fortunately, the Advocates for Homeless & Those in Need (AHTN) provides essential services, including temporary shelter, hunger relief, and emergency assistance, to support the most vulnerable members of the Lower Bucks County community.

Since 2009, AHTN's Code Blue mission has provided lifesaving shelter and support during the coldest months of the year. Code Blue operates from December 1 to March 31 when temperatures drop to 26 degrees Fahrenheit or below, including wind chill, provided they can secure 18 volunteers per night. Therefore, AHTN is continually searching for new volunteers.

AHTN transforms houses of worship into temporary shelters, offering warmth and safety to the homeless. Four houses of worship in Lower Bucks County

host Code Blue shelters on a rotating basis: Shir Ami Synagogue in Newtown (December), Woodside Church in Yardley (January), Calvary Baptist Church in Bristol (February), and Morrisville Presbyterian Church in Morrisville (March). Each site can accommodate up to 58 guests. This season, the shelters have already seen up to 42 guests in a single night and have been open for 27 nights, as of January 12, since the start of December.

Volunteer bus drivers pick up those who are homeless and waiting at bus stops in four designated locations (see website for bus stop addresses) and take them to a Code Blue Shelter. After spending the night at the shelter, they are transported by bus to these same bus stops or to Reach out Foundation in Penndel, a drop in center open during weekdays for homeless guests.

"We are continually looking for volunteers to ensure we can keep Code Blue running," said Karen Mineo, Executive Director of AHTN. "Volunteers fill critical roles, including drivers and attendants for our 15-passenger buses, intake staff, meal servers, and overnight monitors." Training is provided for all positions, and no prior experience is necessary.

With 275 registered volunteers, approximately 65 -70 are regular participants who have consistently supported AHTN's initiatives over the years. Their dedication comes from a shared passion for helping the unsheltered and providing basic human necessities.

"Our volunteers are amazing," Mineo emphasized. "They are passionate, humble, and grateful for the opportunity to give back. Many say the experience of helping our guests leaves them feeling thankful for what they have and inspired to continue supporting our mission."

Volunteers can choose flexible schedules through the organization's online portal, whether it's a one-time shift or ongoing involvement. Some also assist with laundry, bedding, and the logistical transitions between shelters.

In addition to Code Blue,
AHTN runs the Wheels to Meals
mission, which operates yearround to provide hot meals to
homeless individuals and those
in need. Before the pandemic,
community members gathered
at houses of worship for sitdown meals. During COVID-19,
the program pivoted to delivering to-go meals. Although

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leaders. Over the course of each session, students learn leadership skills, teamwork, confidence and more as they work with peers from other schools and other religious, ethnic, and socioeconomic backgrounds.

Participants put their newly acquired skills to use working collaboratively on a service project of their choice, with proceeds donated toward Pearl S. Buck International's mission and work. Many of our Global Leadership graduates go on to become Pearl S. Buck International volunteers, lead independent fundraisers for Pearl S. Buck International's humanitarian, cross-cultural, and educational work, and put their skills to use in college and toward future careers.

The application fee includes instruction by a PA state-certified teacher, supplies, daytime snacks for students, and a graduation event. continued from pg. 22 dine-in meals have resumed in about 20 houses of worship, others continue to provide to-go options delivered to bus stops.

Each evening, AHTN's buses transport guests to participating houses of worship, where they are greeted with a nutritious meal and a sense of community. During Code Blue months, meals are provided exclusively at the shelter locations, encouraging guests to stay overnight for warmth and safety.

Beyond shelter and meals, AHTN's "Those in Need" mission addresses a wide range of emergencies. From funding motel stays for individuals facing extreme circumstances to providing gas assistance for those living in their vehicles, the program helps bridge gaps for people in distress. Additional services include aiding with car repairs, securing IDs, and offering mailing addresses for individuals applying for benefits like disability or social

Mineo explained that there has been an increase in homelessness and food insecurity across Bucks County, emphasizing the urgent need for donations and volunteer support. "We're running through hand and foot warmers faster than ever," she said. "We also need thermal clothing, hoodies, sweatpants, and other essentials to help our guests stay warm."

AHTN's Amazon wish list, available on its Facebook page, makes it easy for community members to contribute needed items. Monetary donations are also critical for sustaining the organization's wide range of programs.

For those looking to make a difference, volunteering with AHTN offers a meaningful way to give back. Volunteers must be at least 18 years old and

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Bucks County Opportunity Council offers free income tax assistance for Bucks County families

The Bucks County Opportunity Council (BCOC) offers free income tax preparation assistance for low-income residents through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA). IRS-certified volunteers prepare taxes for qualified residents through April 15, in five locations throughout the county: two in Bristol, Warminster, Quakertown, and Newtown. Individuals and families with a combined income of \$64,000 or less may be eligible for the program.

BCOC volunteers make this program possible, dedicating nights and weekends to training and tax preparation. They attend training on various federal, state, and local tax laws, as well as tax credits

aimed at low- and moderate-income families, such as the Earned Income Tax Credit and the Child Tax Credit, before taking an IRS-certification exam each year. Tax volunteers have prepared more than 18,000 returns for Bucks County families in the past 20 years, resulting in more than \$34 million in refunds, tax credits, and saved preparation fees that stay in the local economy.

Additional volunteers help with scheduling and other administrative support. VITA is sponsored by the IRS and supported locally by Bucks County Foundation and First National Bank & Trust Co. of Newtown.

Appointments are required and are currently available to schedule. To request an

BCOC is the lead anti-poverty, non-profit organization in Bucks County, dedicated to ending poverty by connecting people with the resources they need to thrive.

BCOC has five major program areas: Housing, Food, Weatherization, Volunteer Income Tax Preparation (VITA) and the Economic Self-Sufficiency (ES) Program. Housing includes street outreach, rental and move in aid, and utility shutoff prevention. Food services

supply food directly to families through a network of 74 food pantries and distribution sites. Weatherization services help families in reducing their energy costs. VITA provides free income tax preparation assistance. The ES Program assists individuals and families to leave poverty permanently through case management, education, and employment.

For 60 years, the Opportunity Council has served low-income families in Bucks County by helping them to stabilize when in crisis, garner resources to achieve a livable wage, gain additional education and training, and work towards economic self-sufficiency.



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DMVA assists veterans with more than \$1 billion in claims for 2024

Stresses importance of having military paperwork in order

For the second year in a row, the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA) helped veterans secure more than \$1 billion in compensation and pension benefits earned through their service. Benefits have expanded in recent years, including the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act, making it even more important for veterans to connect with DMVA and receive the benefits they have earned while in uniform.

"With the passing of the PACT law two years ago, reaching and signing up eligible veterans for their benefits has been a top priority," said Keith Graham, executive director of Veterans Programs. "We are grateful to our community partners who have helped us to reach this milestone and assure that veterans and their families are appropriately compensated."

The PACT, which expands VA health care and benefits for veterans exposed to burn pits, Agent Orange, and other toxic

continued from pg. 24 substances is a prime example of a recently passed law that changed eligibility for thousands of veterans in Pennsyl-

Graham said that DMVA could not have assisted so many veterans if their military paperwork was not in order.

"Veterans having their military paperwork readily available makes the claims process so much quicker and easier," said Graham. "If for some reason a veteran cannot find their paperwork, they can reach out to our office for assistance in locating their military documents, especially the DD-214 discharge form."

The DD-214, which is used to verify military service, is an important first step for securing benefits. Having this paperwork is essential when a veteran or their advocate wants to start a

benefits review.

The easiest way to manage military documents is to make sure they are filed in a safe place immediately upon leaving the military. Veterans often find that filing their documents for free at their county courthouse of record is an easy way to secure them until needed. which can often be decades into the future. Anyone needing assistance locating their military documentation can count on assistance from the DMVA by calling toll-free 800-547-2838 or e-mailing: RA-REQ@pa.gov.

"Starting off the new year is also a good time for veterans to apply for federal health care and state benefits by visiting their local county director of veterans affairs or area veteran service officer," said Graham. "This free assistance is a great way to look at what benefits you may be eligible for and to get help applying for those ben-

efits, even if you have applied and been denied in the past."

Graham noted that there are always new laws or changes to current laws that impact veterans' benefits. One such new law is Act 27 which exempts 100 percent of a disabled veteran's benefit payment from being counted as income when determining eligibility for any programs or needs-based benefit provided by Pennsylvania. This includes DMVA's Veterans Temporary Assistance, Military Family Relief Assistance and Real Estate Tax Exemption programs.

For assistance applying for these programs and others offered through DMVA, a complete list of accredited county directors of veterans affairs and their contact information can be found here County Directors. Contact information for accredited veteran service officers can be found here: Veteran Service

Officers.

In addition to connecting with a county director or a veteran service officer, DMVA recommends that every one of Pennsylvania's nearly 700,000 veterans - the fifth largest veteran population in the nation - should sign up for the DMVA Veterans Registry, a free tool that electronically delivers information about the many state benefits, programs and services available to veterans. Veterans, family members and people who work with veterans can sign up by computer or mobile device at www.register. dmva.pa.gov.

spaying and neutering house cats, especially those that occasionally venture outdoors, helps prevent unwanted litters and protects them from potential harm.

Olivia advised against trapping feral cats yourself, and instead suggested contacting an organization like the Stray Cat Project, that has the resources to trap them. She also stressed the importance of returning feral cats to the location where they were trapped so they are more likely to survive in this familiar environment.

For kittens born to feral mothers, fostering is a critical step toward adoption. "Both of my cats were foster kittens from feral cats," Olivia shared. Foster homes provide a nurturing environment, helping kittens become socialized and ready for permanent homes. Olivia described the life-saving potential of fostering: "Even if you don't want a long-term pet, fostering gives kittens a chance to grow up healthy and loved."

Olivia's project focuses on raising awareness. At last year's Yardley Harvest Day, she manned an information booth, along with

Mariann Matarese, that featured brochures she had created. These materials educated the public on TNR, fostering, and the importance of spaying and neutering both community and house cats. Her attendance at Harvest Day enabled her to connect with community members, answer questions, and inspire action.

To further promote fostering, Olivia is creating videos featuring foster parents with their cats describing their experiences. These videos will be shared on Stray Cat Project's social media platforms to encourage more people to get involved.

Olivia admitted how balancing her project with the demands of senior year, with college applications, schoolwork, and extracurricular activities, has been challenging. However, Olivia's passion keeps her motivated. Her end goal is to complete her Gold Project by early this year, leaving behind lasting resources, such as brochures and online content, to ensure that the community continues to benefit from her efforts.

Training her team of fosters to expand their knowledge and advocate for TNR and spay and neuter and working closely with the Stray Cat Project have also been vital components of her journey. By teaching others, Olivia ensures that her project's impact extends beyond her immediate involvement.

Olivia's work is a reminder that everyone can contribute to solving the issue of community cat overpopulation. From fostering kittens to volunteering with local organizations, small actions can make a big difference. She hopes that her project inspires others to take proactive steps, such as calling the Stray Cat Project for TNR services or providing temporary care for kittens.

"It's disheartening that so many kittens born outdoors don't make it past their first year," Olivia said. "But by spaying, neutering, and fostering, we can minimize this issue and give these animals a chance at a better life."

As Olivia prepares for college with aspirations to study law, she reflects on the impact of her Gold Project. Her dedication to community cats demonstrates how one person's compassion and commitment can create meaningful change. Through her efforts, she has not only improved the lives of countless cats but also empowered her community to take action.

Developmental Trauma Remediated by Neurofeedback

Developmental trauma has long been recognized as a condition that affects many individuals. It stems from early childhood experiences of abuse, neglect or abandonment.

Those affected by this type of trauma, generally from a primary caregiver, experience symptoms that indicate varying degrees of emotional dysregulation. These symptoms can include fear, rage, social isolation, anxiety, self-destructive behaviors, and more because of traumatic experiences. This condition is also referred to as a type of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

Many therapists have attempted to address and remediate individuals affected by this disorder with varying degrees of success. Research in the areas of the brain affected by traumatic experiences has uncovered a mind-brain connection between the trauma experiences and the response to trauma. Psychotherapy alone

has been hampered in successfully remediating the condition.

Recent research in brain functions has provided evidence of involvement of deep brain areas that process and respond to the trauma experiences. These deep brain areas are separate and independent of the psychotherapy model of intervention, indicating that they are generally inaccessible to that modality.

Current research is focusing on the deep brain structures most affected by the trauma.

These areas of the brain are not easily accessible by talk therapy because they are non-verbal in nature. For example, the right amygdala (right temporal area) is one area of the brain affected by emotional experience. It is non-verbal and cannot tell time (a function of the left frontal area). Other areas of the brain, particularly in the brain stem, are similarly affected and responsive. Being nonverbal, they are apart from the language of talk therapy. So therefore, any therapy addressing

emotional content must do so nonverbally in the emotional, nonverbal processing centers.

Neurofeedback offers a promising solution for developmental trauma by targeting the brain's deep, non-verbal areas that talk therapy cannot reach. Integrating these methods is a more comprehensive and effective treatment for lasting recovery.

Three areas of research are simultaneously being pursued by the DRI: engineering a site within the body to house transplanted islets and beneficial components, sustaining the survival of the insulin-producing cells, and creating a supply of islets to treat the millions living with diabetes.

body's immune system attacks and destroys the insulin- producing cells in the pancreas.

Insulin is a hormone that enables people to get energy from food and is essential to survival.

T1D is a 24 hour a day, seven day a week job.

People with T1D must check their blood sugar throughout the day and administer insulin via multiple daily injections or through an insulin pump.

Insulin dosing must be calculated throughout the day and balanced with food intake, exercise, stress, and the natural hormonal fluctuations of a growing body.

It is often a "guessing game" and carries the constant threat of devastating complications from Hyperglycemia or Hypoglycemia.

There is nothing you can do

to prevent T1D and—at present—there is no cure.

T1D strikes both children and adults at any age.

Seek medical care if you or your child are experiencing any combination of the following symptoms: excessive thirst, frequent urination, excessive hunger, weight loss, headaches, blurry vision, and fatigue.

If a diagnosis is delayed, untreated T1D can be life-threatening.


