New Rotary Club forming in Yardley

Seeks members interested in "Service Above Self"

Rotary clubs have provided American small towns, suburban communities, and big cities with community service for more than a century and have a significant history of impactful community-based projects internationally.

Rotary is now offering an opportunity for Yardley residents, professionals, and business owners to join this exceptional volunteer service organization that abides by the Rotarian motto of "Service Above Self" and its mission of "Doing Good in the World."

"We do community reviews, and we found that Yardley is a highly populated area with a lot of small businesses. That's who we tend to have as members," explained Katie Farrell, District Governor for Rotary District 7430 that serves Bucks, Montgomery, Lehigh, Northampton and Berks counties in south-



eastern Pennsylvania. Katie oversees 42 clubs and 1,700 members in those counties. According to Rotary International, there are more 45,000 clubs and 1.2 million members worldwide.

"Our members are small business owners and people that are really engaged in the community and have a real stake in their community. They not only work there and live there, but they do good things in their community and want to improve their community. That's what rotary is all about," said Katie.

Rotary is not new to the Yardley area. Katie noted that the Morrisville-Yardley Rotary Club was chartered in 1928 through 2024. The club dissolved after membership declined mostly from "aging out" but this brought new opportunity to re-energize a Yardley-based club and recruit a new generation of members.

Katie met with several business association groups about forming another club and the Rotary District 7430 recently hosted two socials in mid-February and early March at the Vault Brewing Company in Yardley Borough, for anyone interested in learning more about Rotary. "We advertised in local free press, websites, and meet-up social media sites, encouraging anyone interested in getting involved in an impactful community service organization in your local

community to come and join us. We invite people to learn about Rotary, what it is, and how you can participate in your own backyard."

At the recent events, attendees learned more about Rotary, including the organization's seven areas of focus: Peace Building and Conflict Resolution; Disease Prevention and Treatment; Water, Sanitation and Hygiene; Maternal and Child Health; Basic Education and Literacy; Community and Economic Development; and Protecting the Environment.

"We do projects that are related to these seven areas. We can fuel your passion with like-minded people," noted

Yardley Farmers' Market continues to "grow" all year round

The Yardley Farmers' Market was the brainchild of Susan Schneck and Tammy Marshall, two Yardley Borough residents and friends who wanted to establish a farmers market in town. "At the time, we were both working full time, and didn't have the time to travel to the other farmers markets in the county," explained Susan. "Our initial goal was to bring locally sourced food to this area."

As a result, Susan and Tammy co-founded the Yardley Farmers' Market in 2015. Now operating year-round, the market continues to thrive.

Susan, a Penn State Master Gardener at the time, and Tammy, an avid gardener, shared a passion for fresh, local produce and saw the market as an opportunity to connect neighbors with regional farmers. "We were never looking to create the largest farmers market; we just wanted to form a farmers market that brought our residents together in our hometown," Susan explains.

The market started small, with vendors participating for free in its first year, but it quickly grew into a recognized part of the Yardley community. "The first year, we just went around talking to farmers and vendors and didn't even charge them anything for setting up at our market," Susan recalls. Some of those vendors are still part of the market today.

Today, the market operates as a Pennsylvania non-profit LLC and continues to receive strong support from the borough. "Yardley Borough has always been very supportive of the market. They've allowed us

to use the park, which is very generous," says Susan. The summer market runs outdoors in Buttonwood Park, while the indoor winter market, which is currently being held at the Lower Makefield Township Community Center, ensures that residents have access to fresh, local goods throughout the year.

The Yardley Farmers' Market has steadily expanded, now featuring 18 to 20 vendors offering a diverse selection of goods. While food remains the market's primary focus, a limited number of functional crafts, such as pottery, and specialty vendors also participate. Some long-standing vendors have been with the market since its inception, while new pop-up vendors frequently join to introduce fresh offerings to the community.

"One of the many reasons people come to the farmers market is the quality of the food," explains Susan. "When you buy lettuce at the grocery store, you're lucky if it lasts a week. When you buy lettuce at the farmers market, it will last in your fridge for up to two weeks because it's freshpicked."

Many Yardley residents prefer shopping at the farmers market because of the unparalleled freshness of the food. Unlike grocery store produce, which may have been transported and stored for days before reaching shelves, farmers market produce is often picked just a day before sale, ensuring superior taste and longevity.

Another key draw is the ability to interact directly with

April is almost here with warmer temperatures bringing all our springtime pests. We have control programs for all of them.

Flea, Tick, and Mosquito Suppression: Tick suppression starts now. We make monthly visits to treat the property. Applications are done by fogging the perimeter of the property, as well as spraying nesting areas. Plant material around the house (patio, deck, pool, swing set wood lines if applicable) will also be treated. Adult ticks are present in fall, winter, and early spring and are active any day with temperatures above freezing. Eggs hatch in the spring. Larvae are present during late summer and nymphs during late spring and throughout the summer. Our recent warm temperatures

will have them active. Treat now and enjoy being outside in your yard.

Turf: Our seven-step program keeps lawns beautiful and weed-free. When was the last time you had your soil tested? Bucks County soil tends to be poor, if not treated. Testing allows us to know what is happening underground. Deficiencies in the soil affect proper turf growth and color. Micro-nutrients allow your turf to absorb all the needed components of the fertilizer. Proper pH levels are essential in helping your fertilizer work efficiently. Grass plants thrive within a very small pH range. Recent tests for new clients have mostly had low pH levels. Explore 'Baseball and the Civil War and the Doubleday Myth'

Baseball is a game steeped in its own mythology, and perhaps none of its stories have been as distorted by time and legend as those of its origins. Adventures in spring gardening

After a chilly winter, March has graced us with some warmer days. As a gardener, the

warmer weather serves as a siren call to head back into the yard and begin preparing for the upcoming spring and summer. There are a few considerations you might want to make before diving right in, as March and early April can be a great time to take a pause for some solid planning.

Although it's tempting to start your spring clean-up as soon as the first warm day occurs, it can often be helpful to delay some of the cleaning until a few weeks after the last frost. This way, you can be fairly certain that most pollinators have safely emerged from their winter habitats among your leaves and stems. We gain great value from having our native pollinators present. They are essential to the reproduction of most flowering plants and they significantly impact the yield of our garden, especially those of us trying to grow vegetables. Beyond the specific benefits they bring to our own gardens, they contribute to a balanced ecosystem- keep nuisance pests in check and feed our native birds.

While you're waiting for your spring clean-up window, some things to consider for your vegetable gardens are some good companion plants. If you're trying to grow tomatoes, peppers, beans, herbs or carrots, companion plants can be a great way to enhance that crop. There are several resources available to guide you through the plant-pairing process. Some plants simply grow well together, but the addition of, say, nasturtium to tomato plants not only adds visual appeal, but also has an

added benefit of pest control. This early spring window is a great opportunity to literally map out your planting blueprint so you can hit the soil running. A good pencil sketch can help keep track of your planting or there are some go-to apps for those who want to go more "high-tech."

As we experienced last summer, water can be unpredictable. We can find ourselves vacillating between excess water management and only weeks later, battling drought. As there's really no predicting Mother Nature, one thing we can try to be more cognizant of is using plants and trees that are more acclimated to our climate. Our native trees. shrubs and perennials tend to be less fussy and more able to handle longer periods of dry weather. If you're planning some new trees for shade, privacy or overall ecological benefit, consider planting a

native species. Many of our local nurseries in Bucks offer native tree options. It's also important to consider the soil and sun conditions. Is the area where you're planting often wet? Is it full sun or partial shade? Planting the right plant or tree in the right space can make a huge difference to the plant's longevity and the overall return you get on your investment.

Lastly, many folks are avid bird fans with a growing number of our Townships and Borough in Bucks becoming designated Bird Towns. The type of bird you're trying to attract may factor into your plant and tree selection. You also might want to consider birdhouses, and early spring is a great time to do so. It's always best to do a bit of research beforehand. Some birdhouses might be attractive to people, but are they functional and attractive to birds? Using an educational resource like your local extension website or a wildlife organization can give you research-backed information. If you're doing any research on trees, plants, or attracting wildlife, using a .edu or .org website is your best strategy. Happy spring gardening, Bucks County!

Bucks IU celebrates school social workers during National Social **Work Month**

March is National Social Work Month, a time to highlight the commitment of these professionals working to create a stable and supportive learning environment. The Bucks **County Intermediate Unit** (Bucks IU) is taking this opportunity to recognize the invaluable contributions of social workers in supporting Bucks IU students and their families.

School social workers assist students facing social, emotional, and academic challenges, according to the National Association of Social Workers. They connect students with resources both within schools and throughout local communities, helping to remove barriers to academic success.

According to Amy Snyder-Dietz, Bucks IU's Lead School Social Worker and IDEA Interagency Coordinator, the organization employs fourteen school social workers.

The role of a school social worker varies based on their assignment, explained veteran **Bucks IU Social Worker Chris** Killcoyne, who has supported special needs students and their families for 27 years.

Killcoyne provides individual and group counseling, crisis intervention, and referrals for students in multiple Bucks County school districts. She also helps families access community resources, including behavioral health services and in-home care. Additionally, she assists families with medical, child welfare, and socioeconomic issues and guides students 18 and older in securing job-related community resources.

Bucks IU school social workers collaborate with other


Next, take a walk around the outside of your house and look at the overall condition of your siding and gutters. Are there any missing pieces of siding,

indicate water spilling over the gutters? This could be the result of a blockage in the gutters. Now is the time to evaluate your home exterior so that





Patricia L. Mervine, long-time Bucks County volunteer, honored with Bucks County Women's

Patricia L. Mervine, a longtime Bucks County resident who has touched countless lives through her involvement in local charitable organizations-including the Langhorne Council for the Arts and the African American Museum of Bucks County-was named the recip-

ient of the 2025 Bucks County Women's History Month award. She was honored at a March 20 reception in Doylestown.

In 1987, Congress passed legislation designating the month of March as Women's History Month. In Bucks County, sponsoring organizations including the Bucks County Commissioners Advisory Council for Women have celebrated the accomplishments of women and awarded the annual Bucks County Women's History Award since 1981 to a woman who has shown herself to be a role model with outstanding leadership in a volunteer capacity. Women representing about a dozen Bucks County organizations serve on the nominating committee. Pat Mervine was nominated jointly by the Lower Bucks and Doylestown branches of the

History Month Award

American Association of University Women (AAUW).

For 20 years. Pat Mervine has been the president and driving force for Langhorne Council for the Arts, enriching the Langhorne/Middletown community through experiences with the visual and performing arts and providing scholarships to more than 70 area students. In this role, Mervine initiated Women's History poster and essay contests in Neshaminy schools, arranged for a presentation on forgotten heroes of the suffragist movement, ran a film series for the community, and did the historical research for a two-story mural that honors women from Langhorne who shattered glass ceilings.

Mervine is also the Capital Campaign Chair and historian for the African American Museum of Bucks County (AAMBC), working toward the goal of raising \$2 million to make the museum a first-class place of learning and community-building. Although the AAMBC has been a mobile

museum for ten years, Boone Farm will soon become the permanent home of the museum. She researched and authored a book about the 21 owners of Boone Farm from 1716–1967, "Boone Farm: Its People and Place in Middletown History". Mervine and a co-author also recently published "Slavery, Friends, and Freedom in Bucks County". The book traces the African American journey in Bucks from the late 1600s through post-Civil War through the stories of 50 people who escaped slavery, found refuge here, and assisted freedom seekers. Particularly inspiring are the stories of enslaved and Quaker women whose courage and determination set an example for us all. All the proceeds from book sales go directly to support the AAMBC.

In addition to her volunteer work, Mervine enjoyed a 30-year career as a speech/language pathologist and assistive technology consultant for the Bucks County Intermediate Unit #22. She created continued on pg. 32



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The benefits of gardening conventions and garden clubs

Garden clubs offer much more than monthly meetings; they create a space for education, camaraderie, and community service. As Karen Wychock, president of the Trevose Horticulture Society (THS), emphasizes, "Gardening is not just about tending to your backyard. It involves everyone; all cultures, all countries. No matter where you're from, there's a shared love for watching things grow."

This year's 95th Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania (GCFP) Convention, hosted by District XI, exemplifies the depth of engagement garden clubs provide. Convention participants will include 11 districts across the state, including 11 GCFP garden clubs in Bucks and Montgomery counties. Karen, chairperson of this year's convention, describes how planning for this event has been a large undertaken, but well worth it, beginning three years ago.

Themed "A Gardening Revolution," this convention will take place from April 6-8 at the Alloy King of Prussia DoubleTree by Hilton Hotel, adjacent to Valley Forge National Park. Each year, a different district leads this event, rotating responsibility across the state. This year's convention will feature approximately 16 speakers and welcome around 300 garden club members affiliated with the GCFP.

A highlight of the convention is the opportunity for members to participate in workshops and hear from guest speakers, many of whom are from the local area. Gloria Denoon from Newtown will conduct an origami paper flowers workshop, guiding participants through creating delicate floral designs. Carrie Barron of Montgomery County will lead

a session on pressing flowers in circular frames, connecting attendees with botanical preservation techniques.

Sunday evening's featured speaker, Renee Tucci, a Bucks

County Community College floral design educator, will discuss how traditions transform into trends in floral design. As part of her presentation, she will create six floral designs that will be raffled off at the convention. With over 20 years of experience, Renee brings insight into both the artistry and history of floral arrangement.

Additionally, David Heller, owner of Flowers by David in Langhorne, will demonstrate floral design using positive and negative space techniques, incorporating both botanical and non-botanical elements.

Beyond floral design, the convention integrates historical education. Attendees can take trolley tours of Valley Forge National Park, and Carol Spacht of Montgomery County will appear as Martha Washington during the Monday luncheon, sharing insights into colonial-era gardening and history.

"We rarely see people from the western side of Pennsylvania," Karen notes, "so it's always valuable to share ideas, listen to expert speakers, and come together in camaraderie." These conventions promote lifelong learning. "Anytime you attend a workshop or lecture, you gain knowledge that enriches your gardening journey," explains Karen.

Garden clubs, in general, provide year-round opportunities for education and community engagement. The Trevose Horticultural Society, which meets in Bensalem, has about 65 members throughout Bucks County and beyond. Many of these members will attend the convention. "We've seen an increase in membership in the last couple of years," Karen shares. "Our meetings are open to the public, and anyone interested can join us."

One of the club's key contri-


Some convictions cannot be expunged, but may be sealed

The clinic may need to refer some individuals to other legal organizations due to the location of their criminal records, such as Philadelphia or outside of Pennsylvania.

Prep: 30 minutes | Cook: 18 minutes | Serves: 10
2 garlic cloves, minced
% cup unsalted butter (1 ½ sticks)
% cup drained capers

- ¼cup fresh lemon juice
- 3 tablespoons finely chopped fresh parsley, divided
- 3 ¹/₂ cups panko breadcrumbs

- **1.** Preheat the oven to 175°; line 1 rimmed baking pan with parchment paper and 1 rimmed baking pan with paper towels.
- 2. In a medium saucepot, heat garlic, butter, ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper over medium heat until butter melts; stir in capers, lemon juice and 1 tablespoon parsley. Remove from heat; cover to keep warm. Makes about 1 ¼ cups.
- **3.** In a wide, shallow dish, whisk breadcrumbs and remaining 2 tablespoons parsley. In a separate shallow dish, whisk eggs; place flour in a third shallow dish. Holding tail end of shrimp, dredge in flour, shaking off excess, then dip in egg, then in breadcrumbs to coat; place on parchment-lined pan. Repeat with scallops and calamari.
- 4. In a large skillet, heat ¼ cup oil over medium heat. In batches, add seafood; cook shrimp 4 minutes, scallops 3 minutes and calamari 2 minutes or until golden brown and internal temperature reaches 145°, turning once and adding remaining 3/4 cup oil to skillet as needed. Transfer seafood to a paper towel-lined pan and sprinkle with salt to taste, if desired; keep warm in the oven while cooking remaining seafood. Makes about 10 cups.
- Serve seafood with warm butter mixture and lemon wedges, if desired.





Juniper Village's intergenerational art program: **Bridging generations through creativity**

Research consistently highlights the positive impact of artistic engagement on older adults' well-being. At Juniper Village at Bucks County, this research is being put into action through an innovative intergenerational art program, bringing together high school seniors and senior residents to promote creativity, connection, and wellness.

A testament to this initiative is the "Seniors on Seniors Art Show," held on February 21, which showcased an impressive display of artistic works, including poetry, photography, traditional paintings, sculptures, and mixed media. This collaboration between Juniper Village and Bensalem High School's AP seniors created a unique opportunity for both generations to express themselves artistically and build meaningful relationships.

Kenny Faunce, Catalyst Director at Juniper Village, played a pivotal role in organizing the event. "We wanted to do an intergenerational art show, and when we reached out to Bensa-

lem High School, we discovered they typically do a larger district show but not a smaller, focused show for seniors. So, we thought it would be a great idea to have my residents here and their seniors there come together," he explained.

Approximately 15 residents and 30 students participated, each bringing their unique perspectives and creative expressions. The event was designed to be fully integrated, ensuring that student and resident artwork was displayed together rather than being separated. "Students and residents exhibited their pieces side by side. This allowed them to engage with each other, discuss their work, and share insights on their artistic journeys," Faunce noted.

The impact of the event extended beyond the participants. The public was invited, drawing in families, school board members, and other students to witness the bonding of generations through art. The success of this inaugural event has sparked discussions about making it an annual tradition.

Childhood autism remediating by neurofeedback

Bobby, not his real name, an 8-year-old boy from Levittown was diagnosed with autism. He was experiencing significant levels of difficulty in several functional areas. His parents became aware of neurofeedback and wanted to provide support to help him begin functioning more normally. He began receiving treatment and his behaviors began to improve. After several months of neurofeedback, he was able to sit calmly for a Quantitative Electroencephalogram (QEEG). The results showed areas of dysregulation which guided training for remediation. Over 11 months of training, Bobby's behavior continued to improve. The following are parental reports initially and after 11 months of treatment using the Autism Treatment Evaluation Checklist (ATEC) that measures levels of autism in four functional areas. Parental responses indicated the degree of disability in the four areas, with higher scores signifying greater disability. Results are:

Speech/Language: Score initially was in the 50–59th percentile. For example, Bobby did not know more than 10 words; he did not have meaningful speech nor asked meaningful questions. After 11 months of training, the score was in the 0-9 percentile.

Sociability: Score initially was in the 90–99th percentile. For example, Bobby seemed to be in a shell, failed to greet parents, and lacked friends/companionship. After 11-month training, the score was in

the 60–69 percentile

Sensory/Cognitive: Score initially was in the 60–69th percentile. For example, he was unable to understand explanations, play with toys appropriately, be aware of danger, and not be spacey. After 11 months, his score was in the 20–29 percentile.

Health/Physical Behavioral: Score initially was in the 80-89th percentile. For example, he had obsessive speech, rigid routines, demanded sameness, and had repetitive movements. After 11 months, his score was in the 50–59 percentile.

Bobby has made progress and will continue to make progress as the treatment continues. His parents are happy to see their child making positive personal and social progress. Bobby's future appears brighter with more improvements anticipated ashis treatment continues.

continued from pg. 40 For students, the event was a chance to engage with seniors on a deeper level, gaining wisdom and insight not only about art but also about life experiences. One resident, a poet who was once hesitant to share her work, found the confidence to do so in this supportive environment. "She told the students that when she was younger, she was closed off about her poetry, but now, later in life, she no longer cares what others think and just wants to share her passion," Faunce recounted. "She's a beautiful writer, and it was amazing to see her sharing her poems with the younger generation."

Juniper Village's commitment to the arts extends beyond this event. February's theme focused on artistic expression,

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offering various workshops such as flower arrangement classes led by a resident who works at a local flower shop, in addition to crocheting and ornament-making taught by a resident artisan. Another resident, passionate about painting and adult coloring, hosts weekly sessions aimed at relaxation and stress relief. "Art allows seniors to share their creative side and express themselves. As you get older, verbalizing emotions can become more difficult, and art provides a powerful outlet," Faunce emphasized.

The intergenerational partnership with Bensalem School District is already evolving. Recently, students created over 400 Valentine's Day cards with messages like "You Matter," which were delivered to Juniper *continued on pg. 49*




