

Makefield Women's Association awards \$24,000 to local non-profit organizations

The April meeting of the Makefield Women's Association (MWA) is the organization's most exciting gathering of the year. Each year, through a nominating and voting process, MWA members select a group of local nonprofits as annual beneficiaries. The MWA hosts fundraising events and collects donations for the year and each April, the proceeds are distributed to the beneficiaries to support their continued service to the community. This year, they awarded \$24,000 to these local organizations.

The 2025 recipients are A Woman's Place; Family Service ង្គ Association, Bucks County Homeless Shelter; Bucks County Housing Group: Penndel Community Food Pantry and Yardley-Makefield Fire Company.

In addition, Pennsbury students Gauri Barot and Rosemarie Reeves received scholarships.

A Woman's Place is Bucks County's only domestic violence shelter. "Some of the things that we offer is shelter, so people can stay there and they are provided with clothing, food, toiletries and anything else that's needed," said Laura Malick-Glaudel, who represented A Woman's Place at the meeting. "We help them find new housing and we have many clients who need other services such as counseling for adults and children, legal services, and we provide education and outreach programs. "We absolutely could not serve the community without the community, and we're so grateful for groups like this one who chose us from all of the other really worthy causes, and we really appreciate this."

Family Service Association (FSA), Bucks County Homeless Shelter is based in Levittown and provides homeless families with critical services. In addition to the homeless

shelter, the FSA has an office in Langhorne which provides outpatient mental health and substance abuse services, as well as outpatient counseling. There is also a food pantry, a pet pantry, and a diaper pantry. "We are one of the only 24/7 emergency homeless shelters in the county and we've been able to restructure so we are now able to have up to 90 people at a time," said Anne Marie Richards, the community relations and development manager for the FSA. "The sad part of that is that about half of those people are children. "The fact that we have groups like the Makefield Women's Association who are willing to step in and support us really makes a difference."

Bucks County Housing Group: Penndel Community Food Pantry serves our most vulnerable population. "We want to thank the association for this generous donation," said Steven Keller, who represented

Developer plans contractors' garages for local trade businesses

Recognizing a need for garages for plumbers and other trade businesses to stow their tools, a developer is planning to construct three contractors' garages in Falls Township.

The Falls Supervisors granted preliminary and final land development approval to Lower Bucks Homebuilders, LLC during a recent meeting. Plans call for the consolidation of 10 parcels

into a 50.874-square-foot site. Located on Fallsington-Tullytown Road, with secondary frontage on Bristol Pike, the site would house a 5,250-squarefoot garage, as well as two garages that would be 4,725 square feet each.

Attorney Mike Meginniss said his client noticed a "need" for local small business owners and startups to have spaces avail-

able throughout Falls to house their equipment and tools. The site would feature a one- way point of circulation and no access to large trucks.

"It's generally going to be used by a box truck or a van," Meginniss said, noting that business owners may visit the site once a day.

Supervisors approves relocation of Bus **Charter and Tour Company to Falls**

With an eye on bringing tourism revenue to Bucks County, the Falls Supervisors on Monday greenlighted plans to relocate a touring company from Hamilton, NJ to Falls Township.

Following a conditional use hearing, the Supervisors voted in favor of permitting third-generation family business Starr Tours to move its corporate headquarters to a five-acre site located at 394 Lincoln Highway, the site of a former car dealership.

Starr Tours owners Peter and Sandy Borowsky, of Lower Makefield, told the Supervisors that their children have all gone through Pennsbury schools

and they're looking forward to bringing their business closer to home.

Sandy's grandfather began the business, which primarily focuses on motor coaches, in 1947.

"Our tours go all over the country," Peter said, noting that the tour side is 50 percent of their business. Starr Tours also rents buses to groups, takes students on field trips and picks up school groups flying in for a visit to the East Coast.

Visit Bucks County President/ CEO Paul Bencivengo wrote in support of Starr Tours ahead of Monday's meeting. In his letter, Bencivengo said Bucks County

welcomes 8.2 million visitors each year, which generates \$1.2 billion in economic impact and supports the county's hospitality workforce of 28,675 employees.

"Continued economic development of Bucks County's business community is real and important," Bencivengo wrote.

Starr Tours employs 100 full and part-time employ-

ees, including office staff, tour directors, and maintenance staff. The site will not operate like a transit facility, the couple emphasized.

"You have a vehicle coming and going sort of throughout the day," he said. "All the jobs and tours are all happening at different times."

Some tour attendees may choose the Falls site as a pickup location, while others may opt to join the tour from elsewhere, including Mercer County, Philadelphia, and other stops in

Bucks County, Peter said. Sandy estimates that on any given day Starr Tours would have at most, 15 vehicles parked there by folks taking a tour.

As part of the site redevelopment, Starr Tours plans to add wash bays totaling slightly less than 5,000 square feet, in addition to the existing maintenance bays.

The couple's attorney, Ed Murphy, told the board that site improvements planned would address concerns that people have about lighting, as well as

entry and exit of the property. Upgrades will ensure that the site is "harmonious with all the other buildings in the area," Murphy said.

Supervisor Chairman Jeff Dence spoke enthusiastically about Starr Tours relocating to Falls, calling it "a great opportunity."

"It's a really great business," Dence said. "It's going to be a good fit here in Falls Township."

Tailor Made Film & Video Transfers

People have been filming events and excerpts from daily life for about 100 years. In 1923, 16mm film arrived on the market and was the first film format that was intended to be used by an amateur. Regular 8mm film became available in 1932, followed in 1965 by Eastman Kodak when they came out with Super 8mm film.

Then in the late 1970s, Betamax and VHS camcorders were introduced which gradually replaced the movie film market with video, a much cheaper way to capture the family memories. Fewer and fewer people still have the capability to view VCR tapes and the videotapes themselves are quickly deteriorating. With videotapes holding precious memories, it's definitely time to transfer them to a digital format such as DVD and .MP4

Using all professional equipment, if your videotape doesn't play well in one deck they try it in several decks until they can capture the best picture. They add a professional menu to the beginning and "intelligent" chapter points which make navigating through your DVD a breeze. Clean edits at the beginning and end of your program, eliminating annoying "snow," add to the professional transfer.

The DVD case insert includes your custom title on the front and full color thumbnail photos of the video contents on the back, so you can immediately get an idea of what's on your

All transfers to DVD include .mp4 files, which you can put on a flash drive and watch and share on your devices (smart TV, computers). You can fit your entire videotape library on a flash drive in your pocket!

the organization. "Without organizations like this one, without private donations, we would never be able to do what we do. "It's a very humbling experience to be working here and I'm very happy and grateful to be serving the community.

He added, "We have two food pantries in Bucks County; one is in Penndel and one in Doylestown. We serve about 300 families, which translates into about 1,000 people. We also have low income housing all over Bucks County."

The Yardley-Makefield Fire Company is the sole provider of fire protection for the

Falls approves data centers at Keystone Trade Center

Higher-paying jobs will be coming to Falls as part of plans for NorthPoint Development to construct data centers at the Keystone Trade Center.

The Falls Board of Supervisors unanimously approved two preliminary and final land development plans for the developer of the former U.S. Steel property during a recent meeting. The board had previously approved land development for the parcels. However, at the time, NorthPoint was planning to construct a 1 million-square-foot distribution center for its sixth building, located at 1 Ben Fairless Drive: and more than 3 million square feet of warehousing at 700 S. Port Road for phase two of the multi-tiered project.

Under the revised land development plans, building six of the NorthPoint project will be modified to become a data center, along with an accessory structure and slight modification to access driveways.

The four different distribution centers that had been eyed for the 247-acre parcel have shifted to 10 different structures ranging

from 112,000 square feet to 217,000 square feet, totaling more than 2 million square feet of a "digital infrastructure campus," according to NorthPoint attorney Mike Meginniss. Buildings will be one or two stories tall, he said. The revamped plans mean less truck traffic and fewer employees onsite, NorthPoint Vice President of Development Jeremy Michael told the board. The employment opportunities will require more of a technical background, possibly related to maintenance and would amount to higher-paying positions as compared to warehouse jobs, he said.

Warehousing and distribution have both been successful at the Keystone Trade Center, Meginniss said, adding that "this is in the spirit of diversification of this site."

Residents inquired if the data center would pose energy issues for Falls businesses or residents. Michael said NorthPoint is "working very closely with PECO" through the design review process, adding that this is one of the few locations where "surplus" power is available.

"This is a really great location in terms of the infrastructure that's already in place to support it," he said, adding that the power needed for the sixth building is "fed from different circuitry and a different voltage."

While Michael said North-Point is under a non-disclosure agreement and could not say how many megawatts of data would be incorporated at the sites, he acknowledged "it's a significant amount."

Construction of a data center in Falls Township was "awesome," Supervisor Brian Galloway said.

In all, NorthPoint intends to build 20 or more state-of-theart industrial warehouse buildings, distribution centers and data centers totaling 10 million square feet, with the potential of 15 million square feet.

Officials have said that once complete, the redevelopment will create as many as 14,000 new jobs.

The developer will invest \$1.5 billion in the transformation of the site. In all, North-Point will spend an estimated \$40 million to \$45 million to remediate the site.

Pennsbury senior wins BCCC short fiction contest

Olivia Beno, a senior at Pennsbury High School in Fairless Hills, has won first place in the annual Short Fiction Contest for High School Students, officials at Bucks County Community College announced. Beno was awarded first place for her story "The Lake."

Sarah Lueck, a junior at Central Bucks High School West in Doylestown, won second place for "In the Bleak Midwin-

Sophia Ogden, a junior at Pennridge High School in Perkasie, took third place for "On the Corner of Turpin and Thistledown."

Dr. Cecile Kandl Anderson of the College's School of Language and Literature, which runs the contest, made the

final selections. The winners will receive certificates and awards of \$200, \$100, and \$50, respectively.

Anderson noted that Beno's story "The Lake" was" ...rich in sensory detail, creating a sense of immediacy as the reader follows along with the narrator's journey."

"Childhood fears juxtapose disappointment as the narrator worries about disappointing someone they love," Anderson wrote of the first-prize entry. "In this compelling narrative we are treated to a series of events that lead to a memorable conclusion. Indeed, the reader witnesses an emotional journey that is as compelling as it is profound."

Lueck's story "In the Bleak Midwinter" follows a protagonist caught in a blizzard, who struggles with a lack of selfworth even as he tries to save his life. "His salvation, and his ability to connect with others, comes from an unexpected source," Anderson noted. "Well-crafted details create an

experience wherein the reader feels like they, too, are trapped in the snow. Rich imagery and memorable characterization demonstrate the author's ability to spin a tale that is certainly worthy of recognition."

Ogden's story "On the Corner of Turpin and Thistledown" is about a magical building that a woman returns to throughout her life. "We see how beautifully elevated language,

which recalls Austen, addresses the reader rather formally." Anderson noted. "The author demonstrates a deft ability to move the character throughout her life, from young womanhood, to newlywed, to mother, to widow. Additionally, the story brilliantly considers how a neighborhood evolves over a generation—or more."

Bucks County Community College's School of Language and Literature runs two short fiction contests each spring: one for high school students, and one for Bucks County residents 18 and older. 


