The Wrightstown Farmers Market returns for its 19th season on Saturday, May 3 from 9 am to 12 pm at the Middletown Grange, 576 Penns Park Rd. in Newtown. Opening Day festivities include a free nasturtium plant giveaway and

monster bubbles for the kids!

The market runs every Saturday, rain or shine, through November 22 (closed August 16 for the Middletown Grange Fair). Enjoy free parking, ready-to-eat food, and shaded picnic tables. Please note: Only service dogs are permitted.

Founded in 2006 by the Bucks County Foodshed Alliance, this producer-only market now features over 35 vendors connecting shoppers directly with local growers and makers. It's more than a market—it's a community hub supporting local agriculture.

Hummingbirds are here!

Spring is upon us and that means the return of the hummingbirds; one of nature's jewels! The Ruby Throated Hummingbird generally spends the winter in Central America. Mexico and Florida. They migrate to Canada and other parts of Eastern North America for the summer to breed.

Hummingbirds can fly up to 60 miles an hour, but typically about 30-45 mph. Did you know they are the only birds that can fly backwards and upside down? They lay the smallest bird egg in



You can provide sugar water in a nectar feeder by combining four parts water to one part white sugar. They eat insects and insect eggs on the ground and in trees. Their choice of preferred flowers are salvia, trumpet creeper, bee balm, thistle petunia and jewelweed. Wild Birds Unlimited is

Turf Care: We are currently applying our second round of crabgrass control. This is crucial for pre/post emergent suppression. This round includes broadleaf weed control, micronutrients as well as a balanced slow-release fertilizer.

Flea, Tick and Mosquito Suppression: Warmer temperatures are coming, bringing out all our springtime pests. We have begun our applications to suppress flea, ticks, and mosquitos, which is made by fogging the perimeter of the property as well as spraying nesting areas. Plant material around the house (patio, deck, pool, swing set wood lines if applicable) will also be treated.

Adult ticks are present now, laving eggs, and active any day when temperatures are above freezing. Eggs hatch in the spring. Larvae are present during late summer and nymphs during late spring and throughout the summer. Ticks "hang out" on the ends of branches and tall grass leaves. Any animal or human brushing up against the plant runs the risk of picking up a tick hitchhiker.


Being "bugged" by mosquitos? Adult female mosquitoes lay eggs in anything holding water. Eggs survive drying out up to eight months. Mosquitoes only need a small amount of water to lay eggs. Any container storing water makes a great "nursery". Eggs hatch after water (from rain or a sprinkler) covers the eggs. Larvae can be seen in the water. They

are very active and are often called "wigglers". They become pupae, which live in the water. An adult mosquito emerges from the pupae and flies away. The entire egg to adult cycle takes 7-10 days!

"These funds have made a significant difference in my journey, covering the high costs of materials, books, and

printing. The award allowed continued from pg. 4 me to focus on my studies and creative projects."

> The Jane Parr Scholarships, named in honor of a beloved former MWGC member, have been a crucial part of the club's mission to support aspiring horticulturists and environmental scientists. "Jane was an incredibly passionate and knowledgeable gardener," Singh noted. "She inspired so many of us, and we are proud to continue her legacy through these scholarships." Her husband gave this club a generous monetary gift in perpetuity to provide scholarships in Jane Parr's name for the young people in this area.

Beyond scholarships, MWGC has expanded its community outreach through its Chandler Hall Garden Therapy Program. Cindy Singh, who co-chairs the program, shared how it began. "I was volunteering at Chandler Hall as a hospice volunteer, and I mentioned my love for gardening to the activities director. That conversation sparked the idea of bringing garden therapy to the residents."

Now in its second year, the program has flourished, providing meaningful engagement for Chandler Hall residents. "Last year, we ran a ten-week pilot program, and it was a huge

success," Singh said. "Residents loved it. Many of them used to garden, but can no longer do so on their own. Bringing gardening back into their lives has been incredibly fulfilling."

Singh described the variety of activities they offer. "We work with sensory elements, using fragrant plants like lavender and marigolds. We've made dried flower arrangements, planted seeds in milk jugs, and even created bird feeders using peanut butter and pine cones." Rami Cobb, co-chair of the program, highlighted the

therapeutic benefits of these

activities. "There's a wealth of medical literature that supports the connection between nature and well-being. Engaging with plants stimulates the senses, improves mental and physical health, and fosters social interaction," she explained. "When residents see the plants on the table, their eyes light up. It's truly heartwarming to witness."

The program operates weekly from April through June, with volunteers working one-on-one with residents. "We have about 17 volunteers from MWGC," Singh noted. "Chan-

Fostering Hope Lower Bucks: Bringing comfort and dignity to foster youth

As National Foster Care Month approaches this May, the dedicated volunteers of Fostering Hope Lower Bucks, headquartered in Newtown, are working tirelessly to support children and families impacted by the foster care system. With a mission to provide essential resources and restore dignity to children in foster care, Fostering Hope has expanded to 11 chapters, with Lower Bucks being the 9th, established in 2023.

Jenae Travia, Chapter Coordinator, explains, "Our main goal is to serve any of the youth whether they are experiencing foster care or kinship placement. We also help children being reunited with their biological families, children aging out of the system—anyone who has been touched by foster care—to relieve the burden of being able to get what they need and to give children the dignity they deserve."

Fostering Hope Lower Bucks was born from a simple act of generosity. Administrator Sarah Burstein recalls, "Jenae and I go way back. One day, I had a basement full of little kids' clothes and baby gear that I wanted to donate. Jenae helped me clean it out, and we stumbled upon the Upper Bucks Chapter of Fostering Hope. They mentioned how families and caseworkers in Lower Bucks needed more accessible support. And just like that, our chapter was born."

The organization is entirely volunteer-run and donationled, making the community's

support critical in sustaining its mission.

Fostering Hope Lower Bucks operates through four primary initiatives:

1. Foster-Share Closet - Located in the Newtown Depot Shopping Center, the Foster-Share Closet provides children in foster care with clothing, toiletries, baby gear, school supplies, and more. "Caseworkers, foster parents, or the youth themselves can come in and shop by appointment," explains Travia. "We want to ensure they have access to essential items in a welcoming space."

2. Dignity Duffles - Far too often, children in foster care are handed a trash bag to carry their belongings when moving between homes. Fostering Hope seeks to change that by providing duffle bags instead. "These kids deserve dignity," Travia states. "Instead of carrying their possessions in a trash bag, they have something

sturdy and reliable."

3. Bags of Hope - Each child entering foster care receives a string bag filled with full-size toiletries, personal hygiene products, and comforting items. "Imagine being removed from your home with no time to grab essentials," says Anne MunozFurlong, Volunteer Consultant. "We take for granted things like shampoo, toothbrushes, and deodorant, but these kids need them."

4. Fostering Phones - The newest initiative. Fostering Phones, provides teens

Council Rock 4th grade boys travel team makes history with ICBA championship victory

In a landmark moment for the Council Rock Basketball Association (CRBA), the 4th grade boys travel team clinched the ICBA (Inter-County Basketball Association) championship, making them the first 4th grade boys travel team in this association since 2011 to earn this distinction. The team delivered an impressive 35-21 win over Warminster last month at Holland Middle School.

The season was nothing short of dominant. Council Rock wrapped up with a 13-1 record, outscoring their opponents 456 to 252 over the course of the season. Assistant Coach Dan Joworisak, who guided the team alongside Head Coach Jim Greenberg, couldn't be prouder of the group.

"We knew early on that we were pretty good, and they just kept working during the season and getting better," said Joworisak. "When they won, all the boys went crazy. Since they are so young, they had never won a championship before. It's something they'll remember for the rest of their lives."

The team is made up of ten fourth graders, most from Northampton Township with two from Newtown. Six of the boys had already been playing together on last year's thirdgrade travel team, while a few new faces joined for this cham pionship run. The team practiced twice a week, mostly at Holland Middle School, where they developed both skills and chemistry.

The ICBA league features competition from across Bucks and Montgomery Counties. Council Rock's only loss of the season came early on, and

they bounced back with strong performances the rest of the way. Their championship opponent, Warminster, came into the final with a strong 10-2 record—but both of those losses were to Council Rock.

"The championship game was packed," recalled Joworisak. "We had a DJ playing for all friends and family of the team members. It was a fun environment. At halftime we were only up one or two points, but by the end of the third quarter, we really pulled away. The kids executed the game plan perfectly."

On top of their ICBA success, the team also competed in the highly competitive Renegades Basketball League, where they reached another championship game-this time against a fifth-

grade AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) team from Plymouth Whitemarsh. Despite being younger, the Council Rock boys finished with an 8-2 regular-season record and earned second place overall.

Coach Joworisak emphasized the character of the team as a key to their success: "This was a special group. They were very motivated, very humble. The

parents were so supportive and encouraging. It's the best experience I've ever had in youth sports."

"All ten kids came to every practice, knew what to do, worked well together, and cheered each other on," said Joworisak. "They genuinely liked each other, and that made a difference."



Eating and Living Partnership) opened in 2020 as a collaboration between United Way of Bucks County, Bucks County Opportunity Council, and St. Mary Medical Center, with generous support from Penn Community Bank.

Since then, it has become a lifeline for thousands of Bucks County residents and over 120 community partners – including schools, faith-based groups, and nonprofits – by providing essential items like hygiene products, home goods, clothing, and food.





High School ADHD Controlled by Neurofeedback

Nicky, a high school student from Ivyland, was struggling with ADHD throughout his school career. He was taking stimulant medication. the effect of which he did not like. Even with the medication, he reported often feeling moody, having poor sleep onset. Waking up feeling depressed, having poor organizational skills, experiencing memory problems, forgetting to do his homework, and where he put his homework.

Other issues being reported included being easily distracted, forgetful, not completing tasks, and having difficulty learning. He also wanted "a more efficient brain," to focus better and be better organized. Being in high school, he also wanted to have better social skills. He felt very discouraged about making any progress in his life because

of the struggles he was going through.

As part of his intake, Nicky took a continuous performance test which identified auditory and visual attention and impulsivity. These results were consistent with what he was reporting about his attention and impulsivity issues.

After his first neurofeedback session Nicky reported that he slept better, felt less hyper, and had better concentration. He indicated he had a feeling of well-being. He also reported feeling like he was moving in slow motion.

Nicky continues with neurofeedback and counseling at our office. He is smiling more and is earning better grades at school, which is very encouraging to him. He is excited about completing high school and thinking positively about college and a future career.

As Nicky continues with neurofeedback and counseling, he is experiencing more consistent progress. He is also extremely happy to be off the medication.

Neurofeedback is a form of biofeedback that tells the body what it is doing so it can change. It is noninvasive and


