Council Rock 4th grade boys travel team makes history with ICBA championship victory

In a landmark moment for the Council Rock Basketball Association (CRBA), the 4th grade boys travel team clinched the ICBA (Inter-County Basketball Association) championship, making them the first 4th grade boys travel team in this association since 2011 to earn this distinction. The team delivered an impressive 35-21 win over Warminster last month at Holland Middle School.

The season was nothing short of dominant. Council Rock wrapped up with a 13-1 record. outscoring their opponents 456 to 252 over the course of the season. Assistant Coach Dan Joworisak, who guided the team alongside Head Coach Jim Greenberg, couldn't be prouder of the group.

"We knew early on that we were pretty good, and they just kept working during the season and getting better," said Joworisak. "When they won, all the boys went crazy. Since they are so young, they had never won a championship before. It's something they'll remember for the rest of their lives."

The team is made up of ten fourth graders, most from Northampton Township with two from Newtown. Six of the boys had already been playing together on last year's thirdgrade travel team, while a few new faces joined for this championship run. The team practiced twice a week, mostly at Holland Middle School, where they developed both skills and chemistry.

The ICBA league features competition from across Bucks and Montgomery Counties. Council Rock's only loss of the season came early on, and they bounced back with strong per-



formances the rest of the way. Their championship opponent, Warminster, came into the final with a strong 10-2 record—but both of those losses were to Council Rock.

"The championship game was packed," recalled Joworisak. "We had a DJ playing for all friends and family of the team members. It was a fun environment. At halftime we were only up one or two points, but by the end of the third quarter, we really pulled away. The kids executed the game plan perfectly."

On top of their ICBA success, the team also competed in the highly competitive Renegades Basketball League, where they reached another championship game—this time against a fifthgrade AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) team from Plymouth Whitemarsh. Despite being younger, the Council Rock boys finished with an 8-2 regular-season record and earned second place overall.

Coach Joworisak emphasized the character of the team as a key to their success: "This was a special group. They were very motivated, very humble. The parents were so supportive and encouraging. It's the best experience I've ever had in youth

"All ten kids came to every practice, knew what to do, worked well together, and cheered each other on," said Joworisak. "They genuinely liked each other, and that made a difference."

Because of their standout season, Council Rock received an invitation to the Pennsylvania State Tournament, a prestigious honor, but the team opted not to attend due to conflicts with spring baseball and other sports commitments.

Still, the boys have plenty to be proud of. Championship sweatshirts, individual trophies, and a big end-of-season party capped off their incredible run.

Looking ahead, Joworisak and Greenberg are hoping to continue coaching the team as they move up to fifth grade. With their strong foundation and team-first mentality, the future looks bright for this remarkable group of young

"This league championship wasn't just about winning." said Joworisak. "It was about growth, teamwork, and creating memories. That's what youth sports are all about."

What is the "millage rate"?

Questions on the millage rate and how it is used in the calculation of property taxes are among the most common calls that I receive. I'm going to do my best to explain how property taxes are determined.

Property taxes are calculated from the assessed property value of your parcel which can be found at www.buckscountyboa.org. The millage rate is the amount per \$1,000 used to calculate taxes on a property.

Millage rates are most often found in personal property taxes, where the expressed millage rate is multiplied by the total taxable value of the property to arrive at the amount of property taxes due. Millage

rates are used by Bucks County, Council Rock School District. and Northampton Township to calculate property taxes within their boundaries.

Current Millage Rates:

Northampton Township 2025 millage rate: 32.50

Bucks County 2025 millage rate: 27.45

Council Rock School District 2025/2026 millage rate: TBA June 30.2025


Turf Care: We are currently applying our second round of crabgrass control. This is crucial for pre/post emergent suppression. This round includes broadleaf weed control, micronus as well as a balanced

trients as well as a balanced slow-release fertilizer.

Flea, Tick and Mosquito Suppression: Warmer temperatures are coming, bringing out all our springtime pests. We have begun our applications to suppress flea, ticks, and mosquitos, which is made by fogging the perimeter of the property as well as spraying nesting areas. Plant material around the house (patio, deck, pool, swing set wood lines if applicable) will also be treated.

Adult ticks are present now,

laying eggs, and active any day when temperatures are above freezing. Eggs hatch in the spring. Larvae are present during late summer and nymphs during late spring



and throughout the summer. Ticks "hang out" on the ends of branches and tall grass leaves. Any animal or human brushing up against the plant runs the risk of picking up

a tick hitchhiker.

Being "bugged" by mosquitos? Adult female mosquitoes lay eggs in anything holding water. Eggs survive drying out up to eight months. Mosquitoes only need a small amount of water to lav eggs. Any container storing water makes a great "nursery". Eggs hatch after water (from rain or a sprinkler) covers the eggs. Larvae can be seen in the water. They are very active and are often called "wigglers". They become pupae, which live in the water. An adult mosquito emerges from the pupae and flies away. The entire egg to adult cycle takes 7-10 days!




able to secure our new space. We are confident that this new location will give us the opportunity to further our mission of providing services to meet the needs of those experiencing food insecurity in our community."

Hummingbirds are here! Spring is upon us and that means the return of the hummingbirds; one of nature's jewels! The Ruby Throated Hummingbird generally spends the winter in Central America, Mexico and Florida. They migrate to Canada and other parts of Eastern North America for the summer to breed.

Hummingbirds can fly up to 60 miles an hour, but typically about 30-45 mph. Did you know they are the only birds that can fly backwards and upside down? They lay the smallest bird egg in the world in a golf ball size nest, usually producing two broods a year.

Hummingbirds eat about every 10 minutes. They drink nectar from plants and sugar

water from feeders, lapping up the nectar with their long tongues. You can provide sugar water in a nectar feeder by combining four parts water to one part white sugar. They eat insects and insect eggs on the ground and in trees.

Their choice of preferred flowers are salvia, trumpet creeper, bee balm, thistle petunia and jewelweed.





Very early in my career as a dentist. I came across this saying: "Beware of bargains in parachutes, brain surgery and dentistry". 
