The Martha Washington Garden Club (MWGC) recently marked its 90th anniversary with a gala held on March 26 at

the Newtown American Legion Hall. One of the many highlights of the day was when Martha Washington (portrayed by Alisa Dupuy) along with her husband. George Washington, presented a special program that delighted the audience with stories about their lives.

The gala was a beautiful blend of tradition, creativity, and community spirit, celebrat-

ing the club's rich history while reinforcing its commitment to education, horticulture, and civic engagement.

MWGC President Anne Edwards warmly welcomed the more than 100 members and guests in attendance, expressing her gratitude for the overwhelming participation of club members and the stunning display of 30 raffle baskets.

The gala's theme, "Black and White," was interpreted uniquely at each of the 15 tables, where garden club members created elaborate tablescapes. They were permitted to include one accent color to these floral displays, resulting in a dazzling variety of artistic expressions.

Arlene Gordon, MWGC Acting Vice President and Program Chairperson, shared her excitement about this tradition: "Since I started coming to the Martha Washington Garden Club, this gala has really become one of my favorite events, and one of my favorite parts (of this gala) is the table decorations; it gives everyone the opportunity to use their imagination. We all follow the same theme, yet each table is so different, showcasing the creativity of our members."

MWGC member, Jeremy Parry, was instrumental in planning and organizing the gala, which also provided an opportunity to reflect on the club's

evolution over the decades. Gordon highlighted the contrast between the club's early years and today's more relaxed atmosphere. "It used to be much more formal. Life in general was more formal back then. Members would wear hats

> and gloves, and meetings included coffee and tea service presented on silver trays," she recounted. "To become a member, you had to be nominated and have two letters of recommendation. But while some things have changed, our love for gardening. houseplants, and the outdoors has remained strong."

Long-time members were recognized for their

dedication, with bouquets of flowers presented to those who had been part of the club ranging from 26 years all the way up to 52 years. Scrapbooks and memorabilia showcased the club's history, allowing attendees to reminisce about past events and initiatives.

Ruth Logan, a long-time MWGC member, reflected on the club's transformation. "It started with just eight women near Doylestown who displayed what they grew, so the club's emphasis was initially on horticulture. Over the years, we've grown significantly, now with nearly 90 members throughout Bucks County. She noted that for a long time, their meetings took place in Yardley before recently moving to the Newtown American Legion Hall where they continue to be

Regina McHugh, a 26-year member, reminisced about the elegant silver tea set that could be over a century old, which has become a cherished piece of MWGC's history. The tea set remains a symbol of the club's longstanding traditions.

"It's incredible to think that the same teapot and serving pieces that our founding members used are still part of our events today," Edwards remarked. "Every time we bring it out, it feels

Turf Care: We are currently applying our second round of crabgrass control. This is crucial for pre/post emergent suppression. This round includes broadleaf weed control, micronutrients as well as a balanced slow-release fertilizer.

Flea, Tick and Mosquito Suppression: Warmer temperatures are coming, bringing out all our springtime pests. We have begun our applications to suppress flea, ticks, and mosquitos, which is made by fogging the perimeter of the property as well as spraying nesting areas. Plant material around the house (patio, deck, pool, swing set wood lines if applicable) will also be treated.

Adult ticks are present now, laving eggs, and active any day when temperatures are above freezing. Eggs hatch in the spring. Larvae are present during late summer and nymphs during late spring and throughout the summer. Ticks "hang out" on the ends of branches and tall grass leaves. Any animal or human brushing up against the plant runs the risk of picking up a tick hitchhiker.

Being "bugged" by mosquitos? Adult female mosquitoes lay eggs in anything holding water. Eggs survive drying out up to eight months. Mosquitoes only need a small amount of water to lay eggs. Any container storing water makes a great "nursery". Eggs hatch after water (from rain or a sprinkler) covers the eggs. Larvae can be seen in the water. They



are very active and are often called "wigglers". They become pupae, which live in the water. An adult mosquito emerges from the pupae and flies away. The entire egg to adult cycle takes 7-10 days!

The April meeting of the Makefield Women's Association (MWA) is the organization's most exciting gathering of the year. Each year, through a nominating and voting process, MWA members select a group of local nonprofits as annual beneficiaries. The MWA hosts fundraising events and collects donations for the year and each April, the proceeds are distributed to the beneficiaries to support their continued service to the community. This year, they awarded \$24,000 to these local organizations.

In addition, Pennsbury students Gauri Barot and Rosemarie Reeves received scholarships.

A Woman's Place is Bucks County's only domestic violence shelter. "Some of the things that we offer is shelter, so people can stay there and they are provided with clothing, food, toiletries and anything else that's needed," said Laura Malick-Glaudel, who represented A Woman's Place at the meeting. "We help them find new housing and we have many clients who need other services such as counseling for adults and children, legal services, and we provide education and outreach programs. "We absolutely could not serve the community without the community, and we're so grateful for groups like this one who chose us from all of the other really worthy causes, and we really appreciate this."

Family Service Association (FSA), Bucks County Homeless Shelter is based in Levittown and provides homeless families with critical services. In addition to the homeless shelter, the FSA has an office in Langhorne which provides outpatient mental health and substance abuse services, as well as outpatient counseling. There is also a food pantry, a pet pantry, and a diaper pantry. "We are one of the only 24/7 emergency homeless shelters in the county and we've been able to restructure so we are now able to have up to 90 people at a time," said Anne Marie Richards, the community relations and development manager for the FSA. "The sad part of that is that about half of those people are children. "The fact that we have groups like the Makefield Women's Association who are willing to step in and support us really makes a difference."

Bucks County Housing Group: Penndel Community Food Pantry serves our most vulnerable population. "We want to thank the association for this generous donation," said Steven Keller, who represented the organization. "Without organizations like this one, without private donations, we would never be able to do what we do. "It's a very humbling experience to be working here and I'm very happy and grateful to be serving the community.

Hummingbirds are here!

Spring is upon us and that means the return of the hummingbirds; one of nature's jewels! The Ruby Throated Hummingbird generally spends the winter in Central America, Mexico and Florida. They migrate to Canada and other parts of Eastern North America for the summer to breed.

Hummingbirds can fly up to 60 miles an hour, but typically about 30-45 mph. Did you know they are the only birds that can fly backwards and upside down? They lay the smallest bird egg in the world in a golf ball size nest, usually producing two broods a year.

Hummingbirds eat about every 10 minutes. They drink nectar from plants and sugar water from feeders, lapping up the nectar with their long tongues. You can provide sugar water in a nectar feeder by combining four parts water to one part white sugar. They eat insects and insect eggs on the ground and in trees.

Their choice of preferred flowers are salvia, trumpet creeper, bee balm, thistle petunia and jewelweed.

One of the most significant aspects of the gala was its role in supporting MWGC's scholarship fund. Cindy Singh, Scholarship Chair, emphasized the impact of these scholarships. "The funds raised from our raffle baskets and gala go directly towards our scholarship fund. Over the next few months, our committee will be reviewing applications and selecting recipients," she explained. "Reading these applications is always inspiring. We see young people passionate about making a positive impact on the environment."

Barbara Heisler, a long-time MWGC member, read a testimonial from her granddaughter, a past scholarship recipient. "Thanks to the Jane Parr and Martha Washington Garden Club scholarships, I am nearing graduation from Temple University with a degree in landscape architecture," the testimonial read. "These funds have made a significant difference in my journey, covering the high costs of materials, books, and printing. The award allowed me to focus on my studies

and creative projects."

The Jane Parr Scholarships. named in honor of a beloved former MWGC member, have been a crucial part of the club's mission to support aspiring horticulturists and environmental scientists. "Jane was an incredibly passionate and knowledgeable gardener," Singh noted. "She inspired so many of us, and we are proud to continue her legacy through these scholarships." Her husband gave this club a generous monetary gift in perpetuity to provide scholarships in Jane Parr's name for the young people

Beyond scholarships, MWGC has expanded its community outreach through its Chandler Hall Garden Therapy Program. Cindy Singh, who co-chairs the program, shared how it began. "I was volunteering at Chandler Hall as a hospice volunteer, and I mentioned my love for gardening to the activities director. That conversation sparked the idea of bringing garden therapy to the residents."

Now in its second year, the program has flourished, providing meaningful engagement for Chandler Hall residents. "Last year, we ran a ten-week pilot program, and it was a huge success," Singh said. "Residents loved it. Many of them used to garden, but can no longer do so on their own. Bringing gardening back into their lives has been incredibly fulfilling."

Singh described the variety of activities they offer. "We work with sensory elements, using fragrant plants like lavender and marigolds. We've made dried flower arrangements, planted seeds in milk jugs, and even created bird feeders using peanut butter and pine cones."

Rami Cobb, co-chair of the program, highlighted the therapeutic benefits of these activities. "There's a wealth of medical literature that supports the connection between nature and well-being. Engaging with plants stimulates the senses, improves mental and physical health, and fosters social interaction," she explained. "When residents see the plants on the table, their eyes light up. It's truly heartwarming to witness."

The program operates weekly from April through June, with volunteers working one-on-one with residents. "We have about 17 volunteers from MWGC," Singh noted. "Chandler Hall rotates groups so more residents get a chance to participate."

In addition to the gala and community outreach efforts, MWGC

Spring cleaning: Make sure to include your chimney!

There are many benefits to tackling a top-to-bottom housecleaning project, but what good does it do to clean the entire house and fail to get the chimney and fireplace cleaned?



this rescue truck." Newman said. "This will help us to save lives and we just can't thank you enough."



that I wanted to donate. Jenae helped me clean it out, and we stumbled upon the Upper Bucks Chapter of Fostering Hope. They mentioned how families and caseworkers in Lower Bucks needed more accessible support. And just like that, our chapter was born."

The organization is entirely volunteer-run and donation-led, making the community's support critical in sustaining its mission.

Fostering Hope Lower Bucks operates through four primary initiatives:

- 1. Foster-Share Closet. Located in the Newtown Depot Shopping Center, the Foster-Share Closet provides children in foster care with clothing, toiletries, baby gear, school supplies, and more. "Caseworkers, foster parents, or the youth themselves can come in and shop by appointment," explains Travia. "We want to ensure they have access to essential items in a welcoming space."
- **2. Dignity Duffles**. Far too often, children in foster care are handed a trash bag to carry their belongings when moving between homes. Fostering Hope seeks to change that by providing duffle bags instead. "These kids deserve dignity," Travia states. "Instead of carrying their possessions in a trash bag, they have something sturdy and reliable."
- 3. Bags of Hope. Each child entering foster care receives a string bag filled with full-size toiletries, personal hygiene products, and comforting items. "Imagine being removed from your home with no time to grab essentials," says Anne Munoz-Furlong, Volunteer Consultant. "We take for granted things like shampoo, toothbrushes,

long suggests. Beyond material support, the organization is always looking for volunteers. "We have over 100 volunteers, but not all are active," Travia notes. "We'd love more people to join us in making a difference."

For Burstein, the impact of their work is personal. "This experience has opened up a whole new world of incredible, generous people in our community. Seeing how much people are willing to give—whether it's time, donations, or support has been truly inspiring."

Fostering Hope Lower Bucks is more than a donation center: it's a place of comfort and support for children and families navigating the challenges of the foster care system. "When teens come in, they often expect a thrift store experience," says Travia. "But when they see name-brand items like Nike and Adidas, their faces light up. It means so much to them."

pieces. I write Pysanky Ukrainian eggs. We have five or six iewelers who work in different media. We had one woman who does sculptural wood, which was amazing. We had some watercolor paintings. We had someone who does inkwork. So, we had quite a variety of works on display."







High School **ADHD** Controlled by Neurofeedback

Nicky, a high school student from Ivyland, was struggling with ADHD throughout his school career. He was taking

stimulant medication, the effect of which he did not like. Even with the medication, he reported often feeling moody, having poor sleep onset. Waking up feeling depressed, having poor organizational skills, experiencing memory problems, forgetting to do his homework, and where he put his homework.

Other issues being reported included being easily distracted, forgetful, not completing tasks, and having difficulty learning. He also wanted "a more efficient brain," to focus better and be better organized. Being in high school, he also wanted to have better social skills. He felt very discouraged about making any progress in his life because of the struggles he was going through.

As part of his intake, Nicky took a continuous performance test which identified auditory and visual attention and impulsivity. These results were consistent with what he was reporting about his attention and impulsivity issues.

After his first neurofeedback session Nicky reported that he slept better, felt less hyper, and had better concentration. He indicated he had a feeling of well-being. He also reported feeling like he was moving in slow motion.

Nicky continues with neurofeedback and counseling at our office. He is smiling more and is earning better grades at school, which is very encouraging to him. He is excited about completing high school and thinking positively about college and a future career.

As Nicky continues with neurofeedback and counseling, he is experiencing more consistent progress. He is also extremely happy to be off the medication.

Neurofeedback is a form of biofeedback that tells the body what it is doing so it can change. It is noninvasive and uses a system of rewards to guide the training process. Treatment effects are expectedly longstanding.



United Way's HELP Center celebrates 5 years of serving Bucks County

United Way of Bucks County's HELP Center is celebrating its 5th anniversary, marking five years of providing brand-new essential items – completely free of charge – to local families in need. This milestone coincides with National Volunteer Month, making it the perfect time for community members and businesses to get involved.

The HELP Center (a Healthy Eating and Living Partnership) opened in 2020 as a collaboration between United Way of Bucks County, Bucks County Opportunity Council, and St. Mary Medical Center, with generous support from Penn Community Bank.

Since then, it has become a lifeline for thousands of Bucks County residents and over 120 community partners - including

schools, faith-based groups, and nonprofits - by providing essential items like hygiene products, home goods, clothing, and food.

Many of the HELP Center's shoppers are ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed), meaning they work, but still struggle to afford the basics. Among these shoppers, 58% work in essential, front-line sectors like healthcare, education, and human services.

In 2024 alone, walk-in visits for emergency services like the emergency food pantry surged by 110%, with more than 6,700



Anderson noted that Beno's story "The Lake" was" ...rich in sensory detail, creating a sense of immediacy as the reader follows along with the narrator's journey."

"Childhood fears juxtapose disappointment as the narrator worries about disappointing someone they love," Anderson wrote of the first-prize entry. "In this compelling narrative we are treated to a series of events that lead to a memorable conclusion. Indeed, the reader witnesses an emotional journey that is as compelling as it is profound."

Lueck's story "In the Bleak Midwinter" follows a protagonist caught in a blizzard, who struggles with a lack of selfworth even as he tries to save his life. "His salvation, and his ability to connect with others, comes from an unexpected source," Anderson noted. "Well-crafted details create an experience wherein the reader feels like they, too, are trapped in the snow. Rich imagery and memorable characterization demonstrate the author's

ability to spin a tale that is certainly worthy of recognition."

Ogden's story "On the Corner of Turpin and Thistledown" is about a magical building that a woman returns to throughout her life. "We see how beautifully elevated language, which recalls Austen, addresses the reader rather formally," Anderson noted. "The author demonstrates a deft ability to

move the character throughout her life, from young womanhood, to newlywed, to mother, to widow. Additionally, the story brilliantly considers how a neighborhood evolves over a generation—or more."


