

BCABVI celebrates 80 years of service with New Assistive Technology and a \$25,000 state grant

The Bucks County Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired (BCABVI), located in Newtown, marked a significant milestone on May 2 with a dual celebration: its 80th anniversary and the awarding of a \$25,000 state grant to enhance its Low Vision Clinic. Local leaders, clients, and community members gathered for the special event, featuring speeches, technology demonstrations, and a commemorative tree planting.

The celebration welcomed Pennsylvania Senator Steve Santarsiero and Representative Perry Warren, who played a pivotal role in securing the grant funding.

"We have two legislators here with us today to help celebrate our 80th anniversary and also to thank them for being instrumental in assisting us with \$25,000," said Anne Marie Hyer, Executive Director of BCABVI. "We want to make sure that we recognize you both for your support."

Representative Perry Warren, a longtime Newtown resident, recalled how the initiative began. "This stems from two phone calls that were made to my office and Senator Santarsiero's office that advised us of the need." he said. "We were fortunately able to go back to our respective appropriations committees to get the funds to help with your programs here, and today we're seeing how it works." Senator Santarsiero echoed

work you do, we brought with us a flag that was flown over the Capitol and a citation to commemorate your 80th anniversary."

To honor their efforts, **BCABVI** presented both Senator Santarsiero and Representative Warren with plaques recognizing their support and commitment to the organization. "You have such a good reputation across the community for being responsive and always willing to help out," said Anne Marie Hyer during the presentation. "This is just one way we can say thank vou."

The \$25,000 grant allowed BCABVI to purchase several advanced low vision devices that were showcased by clients who now rely on them to navigate daily life. Each demonstration served as a compelling example of how adaptive technology can restore independence.

Karen Brookins of Morrisville demonstrated the LyriQ Assistive Reader, a device

that uses AI to scan and read printed text aloud. "This works wonderfully for me because I'm totally blind," she said. "It reads documents like my electric bill, summarizes the charges, and skips over unnecessary details. It's changed the way I handle paperwork."

A Newtown client demonstrated the Visolux, a magnifier for books, recipes, and menus. "I've had a passion for reading all my life. This tool is vital to me now that I can't read independently," she said. She is participating in BCABVI's loaner program, another initiative supported by the grant, allowing clients to try equipment before purchasing.

Michele Fekete from Levittown, who lives with macular degeneration, showed the Clover 10, a portable magnifier. "When I first came here. I thought I was going to be unable to continue working," she said. "This device is a godsend. I use it every day

Visitors drove in, and were met with firefighting volunteers directing them to open patches of parkable, green spring

grass. They looked left and saw search-and-rescue K9s obeying their owners' commands. To their right, they spotted a big green, quintessential-looking fire truck. And looking straight ahead, attendees beheld the bright, dizzying rides and fair foods that made up the 2025 Upper Makefield Fire Department annual carnival.

This year's carnival was held from May 6 - May 10 at the soccer fields in Washington Crossing State Park. With the help of volunteer firefighters providing parking and ticketing assistance, along with Houghton Enterprises being contracted to provide the rides, the carnival functioned. and has functioned, as a major fundraising event for the Fire Department and a fun night out for members of the community.

The Upper Makefield Fire Department has been operating since 1967, primarily serving the residents of

viding mutual aid services to surrounding fire companies such as New Hope, Lower Makefield, Yardlev, Newtown, and some NJ communities upon request. Responding to about 200-250 calls per year, the department consists of all volunteer, unpaid firefighters ranging from 18 years old to 70

Upper Makefield and pro-

vears old. In 1979, the first year of the carnival, it was located at the Taylorsville Road firehouse in what is now the River Knoll neighborhood. In recent years, it has been held in the park on River Road south of Route 532. and across from the Washington Crossing Post Office. However, beginning last year, the carnival was held at the soccer fields in Washington Crossing State Park, providing a larger parking area to accommodate all the vehicles driven to the carnival.

The carnival raises about \$20-25,000 each year, which is funneled into a collective fundraising account in which the department may utilize the money throughout the year for special projects, maintenance of the firehouse, and equipment like general turnout gear which could cost upwards of \$25,000.

According to Tim Brewer, the fire department chief, the carnival's main focus when it originally opened was fundraising. Now, Brewer has seen it become more than just fundraising, but a widespread community event. In addition to the immediate Upper Makefield area. attendees travel from outside the nearby area to attend, and has morphed into a favorite community event involving multiple generations.

"A mother approached me last night who came here with a bunch of sixth and seventh graders. As soon as they put their wristbands on, they said, 'thanks mom', and took off. But she said I have them in a place that's in our community, and I'd rather have them here than maybe walking around a mall." Brewer said. "We've had kids that grew up in the community who bring their kids back to the carnival because they were here when they were a kid."

To Kevin Campbell, the fire department vice president and chairman of the carnival committee, the carnival provides "a little bit of luxury" for the community with its old-school fair charm.

"There's not a lot of places to go on a weekday or a weeknight with your kids where you can go back in time to a smaller theme park type of carnival in the area," Campbell said. "It's a nice local draw for the kids to come and have some fun enjoying some rides, buying some funnel cake or cotton candy, or playing some games of chance."

In front of the event and to the left of the ticket booth sat some of the most well-behaved and level-headed carnival attendees-search and rescue dogs from Alpha K9 Search and Recovery. This all-volunteer team is based in Bucks County and receives

calls from the fire department to utilize their services when people have been reported missing.

At the carnival, the team hoped to educate children on K9 search and rescue, and expose the dogs to a loud atmosphere. Cheryl Rose, K9 handler and vice president of the team, introduced "Zeke" to the carnival. "He's a puppy. He's seven months old. So bringing him into these kinds of events gets him used to the loud noises, lots of hands petting him and again, helps build their training as far as being a search and rescue canine," Rose said.

Under a blown-up picture of golden brown turkey legs, a three-man band featuring a saxophone, banjo, and upright bass played old-school music to attendees with corn dogs in their hands. In western Pennsylvania, they may be known as the "Houghton Boys" and could be found adorned with cowboy hats and boots, while in Eastern PA they might be referred to as the "Eagles Pep Band". Yet, at fire department events, as saxophonist Brian Saunders says, they proudly call themselves the "Firehouse Three".

"We certainly like playing for the department. It's a thankless job that they do, and it's good to reward them with whatever we can give them, musically, or support in any kind of way," Saunders said. As the rides slowed and

music faded, the 2025 Upper Makefield Fire Department Carnival wrapped up another year of community, tradition, and support. What began as a fundraiser has grown into a beloved local event, bringing generations together for fun, food, and a shared appreciation of the volunteers who serve this community.







Andrew's Lawn Ranger

Following last year's drought, we still have a rain deficit. We had a cold and dry winter. Plants already drought-stressed were damaged further by extreme cold, coupled with temperature fluctuations in March and April. While lawns may look lush right now, they are still lacking adequate soil moisture.

Flea, Tick and Mosquito Suppression: It's flea and tick season, and mosquitos will be around in large numbers this year. Let us help you enjoy your time outdoors with monthly visits to treat your property for these pests. Applications are made by fogging the perimeter of the property and spraying nesting areas, using organic control with peppermint and rosemary oils. Plant material around the house (patio, deck, pool, swing set wood lines if applicable) will also be treated.

Turf Care: We are finishing our second round of crabgrass preventer and weed control. It's not too late to get you on our program! Mowing height is the most frequent question we receive. The shorter the turf, the more stress on the plant. Height

should be in the 3.75" to 4.25" range. Change the mowing direction so you don't create a 'pattern' in your lawn. Sharp mower blades will prevent your turf from getting a fuzzy brown look.

Plant Health Care: Are your plants protected from insects? Our technicians are applying foliar insect, mite, and fungicide sprays now. This is crucial due to current plant stress as well as rising temperatures coming in the next few weeks. Continued watering of trees and shrubs would be advised until soil moisture levels improve.

Deer Control: Give deer a reason to go elsewhere. Our monthly treatments make your plants taste and smell bad to hungry deer. Protect your trees and shrubs year-round.


A new approach to conservation that starts in your yard

Pennsbury Manor, William Penn's reconstructed estate on the Delaware River in Bucks County, welcomes Norway, a

recently rescued racing horse, to its educational barnyard. Norway Hanover, is a retired Trotter for the Standardbred

harness racing industry, who raced across the US and Canada. These horses often end up in cramped and unhealthy



"kill pens" until they can be auctioned for slaughter. Norway was rescued by the Standardbred Retirement Foundation from a kill pen in Colorado.

Norway has now found a forever home at Pennsbury Manor. After a period of rehabilitation to improve his physical condition, he joined Pennsbury in late March. 



Understanding local regulations is also important. Many states, including Pennsylvania and New Jersey, use a modified version of the three-class system. Generally, e-bikes must be limited to 20 mph to be used wherever traditional bikes are allowed. Pennsylvania adds a 750-watt motor limit, a maximum e-bike weight of 100 pounds, and a minimum rider age of 16.

Overall, e-bikes offer a sustainable, efficient, and enjoyable way to travel. Whether you're commuting to work, getting exercise, or exploring new trails, an electric bike can make cycling more accessible and fun.

Anxiety and depression in high school student nixed by neurofeedback

submitted by Maria Di Donato DEd. BCN. PA Licensed Psychologist, PA/NJ Certified School Psvcholoaist

Paul, not his real name, a high school student from Bensalem, was diagnosed with depression and anxiety. He was treated with several psychotropic medications which resulted in multiple negative side effects. These medications became a type of toxicity for Paul, which caused concern for Paul and his parents. He also reported multiple head injuries from falls over the years and a concussion from sports in 8th grade. A friend recommended neurofeedback. a drug free approach for anxiety

and depression to address his issues. On the intake, Paul reported

multiple problems including difficulty concentrating, being fidgety, stomach problems, nausea, irritability and difficulty sleeping. He also remarked that he had poor sleep patterns at night.

Some of Paul's difficulties include inattention, depression, forgetfulness, tearfulness, lack of motivation, agitation, feelings of aggression, and selfharm.

As part of the intake, a Quantitative electroencephalogram (QEEG) provided information about the brainwave imbalances driving his many behavioral and emotional difficulties. Soon after beginning treat-

ment, which included neurofeedback and counseling. Paul reported sleeping better, being less hyper, feeling more awake and alert. He was beginning to enjoy his life more and reporting engaging in more positive activities. School work was also improving.

Many emotional issues were calming down as anxiety and depression were decreasing. Agitation, impulsivity, and aggression were all reduced considerably. He was smiling more. Over time, Paul will be able to enjoy a more positive lifestyle and have a happier future.
