More numbers should translate to more success for the Storm Lake boys track and field team.

The Tornadoes finished fifth in last year's Lakes Conference meet, but returns several key athletes. Joel Ramirez Parra is a previous state qualifier. Jacob Mills and Alex Ortega had great cross country seasons. Brandyn Azurdia, Sitah Chaiyawong and Andre Machado did well in the sprints last season.

Garbieno Weno, Brennen Anderson, Ryker Doebel and Mauricio Bermudez Mendez look good in workouts so far this season. The Tornadoes have a lot of freshmen that look to help out right away in several events. They include Heath Kampbell, Eden Laguna Zavala and John Schwint, who all had good cross country seasons last fall.

Storm Lake coach Justin Mellmann considered the team's potential strengths entering the sea-

"We finally have some decent numbers and some talented guys that will be able to get some good racing done this season," he said. "It helps to have numbers when we need to consider filling 19 events. Last year, we were unable to run several events due to numbers.'

However, there are some question marks with the Tornadoes.

"We have a very young group," Mellmann said. "It takes a while to gain experience and strength. I think we will make major improvements this season, but the big picture is keeping guys out over several seasons and getting stronger, more experienced, and racing and competing at a higher level."

Mellmann discussed how this year's team will be better than the one from a year ago.

"Just gaining numbers is a big help," he said. "We will be able to on committing to workouts,

focus guys where we have been lacking. We need to get guys in the hurdle events and throws, and so far it looks like we have several that are willing to fill these spots. It also seems like our overall attitude and drive is very good with this group. They want to workout and improve, and they want to compete."

There are a few important factors that will dictate how much success the Tornadoes have this season.

"We have to keep guys healthy," Mellmann said. "We need to focus strength training, working as a team and attending practices. We need to figure out what each guy has for strengths and fill out all the events at each meet."

Mellmann talked about what the Tornadoes will need to do to be competitive in the Lakes Conference.

"It's critical that we have some of our main guys getting points in several events, and getting all the events filled with the combination of guys that can score points," he

Mellmann gave an outlook on

"I would like to see us get off of the bottom of the conference in track and field," he said. "Last season was a struggle because we just didn't have the bodies and the talent. I think this season we add a lot of guys that even as freshmen can help us compete fairly well right away. It will take a few seasons to develop as a team, as we currently have several young members, but I definitely think we can make more noise this year at all of our meets than we did last year."

Storm Lake girls track team looks to make bigger strides in 2025

Storm Lake had a tremendous amount of success during last year's girls track and field season as the Tornadoes finished second in the Lakes Conference meet.

The Tornadoes have five standout performers returning from that team, including four-event state qualifier Mackenzie Harder. She placed fourth in the long jump, eighth in the 200 meters, 15th in the 100 and 16th in the 400 at state a year ago.

Also back is Avery DeHaan, who placed 21st at state in the long jump last season. Melanie Chanthapangna, an eighth-place finisher at state in the high jump; Grace Kenkel, Lakes Conference runnerup in the 800 meters; and Silvia Kampbell, Lakes Conference runner-up in both the 1,500 and 3,000 meters, also return.

There are some top prospects who will join those five, including Ella Robinson and Zoe McCoy in the sprints and Maggie Dahlhauser in the middle to long distance.

Storm Lake coach Evan Franzmeier measured the team's potential strengths.

"Jumps," he said. "We are very experienced in the long jump and high jump. All three jumpers have state experience."

However, there are some question marks with the Tornadoes.

cially throws," Franzmeier said. "We have no returning experience."

Franzmeier discussed the ways that this year's team could be better than last year's.

"Another year of experience," he said. "Mackenzie, Avery, Grace, Melanie and Silvia all will have great seasons and carry us as a team."

The sprint events will be a dominant part of the team.

"Sprints will be dominated by Mackenzie Harder and Avery De-Haan, but we will need to find a third and fourth for a solid relay," Franzmeier said. "In the hurdles, we have girls, but they have little to no experience. Hurdles should improve as the season progresses."

Franzmeier said the middle distance events will be in good hands.

"Grace Kenkel will be our middistance runner along with Avery and Mackenzie in the 400," he said.

The long distance events also appear to be in great shape.

"Silvia Kampbell will hold down the 1,500 and 3,000," Franzmeier said. "A state cross country runner, she is very comfortable in those two distances."

The field events will be heavy in the jumps and light in the throws.

"Jumps we should be very dominate," Franzmeier said. "We have the top two conference places in the long jump and the top in the conference in the high jump. In the throws, we return no one, so we will need to find throwers and develop them as the season goes on."

There are a few important factors that will dictate how much success the Tornadoes have this season.

"We will need our limited num-

bers to really perform well in multiple events every meet," he said. "We have low numbers out, so those few upperclassmen will really need them to dominate when they hit the track."

Franzmeier gave his outlook on the Lakes Conference for this season and included his team's position in it.

"Spirit Lake will be very tough again this year," he said. "Cherokee brings back a lot as well. We should finish middle of the pack in the conference."



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Storm Lake boys soccer team motivated to have better season

The ending of last season left a bitter taste in Storm Lake's mouth. The Tornadoes were routed by Dallas Center-Grimes in the first round of the boys state soccer tournament.

That will serves as a motivational tool for the Tornadoes this season.

"I believe that this year's team can be better than last year's in the sense that they finally have that state experience to really give them a good idea of everything it takes to be successful as a team," Storm Lake coach Roberto Martinez said. "With our first round loss to Dallas Center-Grimes last year, which was a pretty bad one, I'm sure they want to go even further this year with something to prove."

Storm Lake returns its leading scorer from a year ago in Raymond Hernandez as well as Iker Gomez.

"Our top returning players this season would have to include Raymond Hernandez, who was our top scorer last season with 13 goals, as well as our senior center midfielder and captain, Iker Gomez, who has put in a tremendous amount of offseason work to be ready for the season," Martinez said.

and Sisi Poe, who are seniors this year but very talented individuals who will be taking on a more crucial role this season. On the defensive side, the Tornadoes have Adrian Zeledon, who is another talented senior, as well as Jose Hernandez Rosas, who is a sophomore keeper ready to step up to fill the role left by Storm Lake's amazing keeper last year, Alexis Sanabia.

Martinez measured the potential strengths of this year's squad.

"I think that our potential strengths for this year will be to have an overall grit that we kind of lacked last season," he said. "Making it to state last year and getting that first round loss really showed the boys what it takes to be elite, so I believe they'll be taking their game mentality a step further this season."

However, there are some question marks with the Tornadoes.

"Some potential concerns worth mentioning would be the fact that we lost six senior starters after last season, so filling those voids is a must," Martinez said. "We hope that several guys are ready to take on leadership roles and excel in their new positions. It will be a completely different team in a way."

There are a few important factors

that will dictate how much success the Tornadoes have this spring.

"I think the thing that will determine our success this season is just the ability to take things one game at a time," Martinez said. "I'm sure a lot of the returners of last year want to fast forward to state and are already thinking about it, but with every new season comes new players for us and our rivals. We have to earn the right to state again, so it's best we keep our focus on the first game and then the next."

Martinez offered his insight on the Northwest Iowa League for this season.

"I believe our conference is going to be filled with lots of competing teams again this year," he said. "We can't ever count Spencer out. They're one of our big rivals with an exceptional coaching staff, so our first home game against them will give us a good idea on where we stand. Other teams we count on giving us a challenge this year will be Sioux Center, Le Mars, West Sioux and another one of our rivals -Denison-Schleswig. Sometimes it's too early to tell, but I'd put our team up against anyone, so we hope to be conference champs for the first time in six years."

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Storm Lake to feature quick, but young girls soccer team

Storm Lake will feature a very quick but small girls soccer team in 2025.

Storm Lake's top returners are Jezebel Ocegueda, who scored eight goals last season, America Najera, who scored three goals, and Iratzel Ocegueda, who recorded 116 saves last season.

"We are hoping that Jezebel and America will continue to be our offensive go-to people," Storm Lake coach Katie Voortmann said. "I am also hoping that Marlene Coronel and Fernanda Comparan will contribute as well. Each of them had two goals last season. Eva Snyder will also be a great component that we will be adding to the varsity roster."

Voortmann measured the team's potential strengths entering the season.

"We are very quick," she said.
"We are hoping to use our quickness to make the other team turn over the ball in their defensive half. Iratzel is also a decent shot stopper,

and she will be a big part of our defense"

However, there are some question marks with the Tornadoes.

"We are still missing some vital roles within our midfield, and I am hoping that some underclassmen will step up," Voortmann said. "We are also going to be a very small team this year, so we will need to take care of our bodies and recover quickly with the amount of games we will be playing. Two of our defenders who had season-ending knee injuries have returned, how-

ever, it has been a long time since they have seen the pace of our conference."

Voortmann discussed the ways that this year's team could be better than the one from a year ago.

"There has been a group of 6-8 girls who have been playing year-round in different indoor leagues, including one in Storm Lake," she said. "I am hoping that them playing together will establish that connectivity you need for soccer. Also, we have been focusing a lot on the fundamentals and mechanics of

soccer in order to make our speed of play much faster than it has been in previous years."

There are a few important factors that will determine the amount of success the Tornadoes have this spring.

"We are going to have to value our possession of the ball when we have it on offense," Voortmann said. "We need to make them count in order to capitalize on their mistakes. Due to our numbers, we are going to have to stay healthy and make sure our bodies are healing between games. Finally, I think we are going to have to make sure we play as a team instead of individuals."

Voortmann gave her insight on the Northwest Iowa League.

"There were several close games last year within our conference," she said. "Four of them were decided by one goal in the last 15 minutes of the game. We have some potential to do some damage. We just have to show up to every single minute of every single game."

Downs assessed how the sprint and hurdle events will be this season.

"Our sprint and hurdle core this year has some experience, but is overall young," he said. "Newcomer Sanagayle Olpet is looking to help complement the strengths of sophomore Dani Young in the short sprints. Abby Wunschel will build on her hurdle experience from last year to take on the 100. Freshmen Cael Phelps and Aaden Movall along with sophomore Jesus Rodriguez will work across the 100 and 200 to supplement major relays. Junior

Nicolás Calvo has the potential to be a dual threat across the short sprints and hurdles."

The middle and long distance events will be much improved for both the boys and girls teams.

"Filling the cards once again, the mid-distance girls have a lot to work with," Downs said. "Experienced upperclassmen Karla Limones and Isabelle Landgraf will look to lead sophomore Jessa Fetrow along with freshman Peyton Phelps in the 800 to 3,000-meter spread. Seniors Pedro Lopez and Brett Petersen are joined by juniors Brendon Petersen and Dominac Mills to supply speed and savvy from the 400 meter dash to the 1,600 meter run. Both genders are expected to pick up more

points and place-winnings as individuals and relays."

Downs gave an assessment of the field events.

"In the throwing events, Ivan Del Villar's discus improvements set a strong tone for this year's performances," he said. "Freshman Angel Lucht intends to add further depth in the throws while senior McWindel Gomez hopes to make his mark in the long jump. For the girls, senior Avery Smith's utility will aid in team point races as Ruby Phelps and Kielee Larson solidify themselves in the throws. Junior Carissa Elsden is also getting her footing in the high jump and long jump."

There are several important fac-

tors that will determine the amount of success that St. Mary's has this spring.

"First, we must continue to have leaders step up and help guide their teammates through the good times and the bad," Downs said. "Athletes who can buy into working hard on key workout days and taking recovery seriously will see the best outcomes. Our best indication of success will be our ability to control what we can control and keep our focus on the postseason. The emphasis this season is on competing with grit. Ultimately, having faith in our progression and team philosophy is going to have a significant impact on our season outcomes. The coaching staff is dedicated to implementing quality training and individualized approaches to meet athletes' needs."

Downs offered his insight on the conference and included his teams' position in it.

"Like last year, our primary goal is to rise in the conference ranks," he said. "The Twin Lakes Conference is extremely competitive. With greater depth and range of events, our primary goal is to be in the top eight as much as possible. On the girls side, I believe we can compete with the talent of close conference finishers such as East Sac and GTRA. On the boys side, several events need to come together to get on the board and close the gap on West Bend-Mallard and GTRA."

Storm Lake boys tennis team starting over from scratch this season

Storm Lake will be starting its boys tennis season from scratch this year.

The Tornadoes had seven seniors and one sophomore on last year's team, which was coached by Sam Lipps. This year's team has one returning player and a new coach in Gus Loving.

"We are about as close to starting from scratch as possible with six guys on the team," Loving said. "Sebastian Cortez is the lone returning player. He knows the game very well, is fundamentally sound, and I expect him to be a leader of the team. He has a little varsity experience from last year and should be able to carry that into this season."

There are five players who will be joining Cortez on the team.



Yet, there is great team chemistry here, realistic expectations, and a drive to maybe get something going and prove some people wrong."

However, there are some question marks with the Tornadoes.

"Of course, inexperience and a

number shortage is not just a good thing," Loving said. "There are plenty of concerns with that as well. Five guys will be competing in their first official match. Everyone will be a varsity starter. There may be times when experience versus non-experience is a key factor in some of our matches. I am interested to see how we respond after we are matched up against some good competition early in the season. Will we take that as a learning experience and work on that same continuous growth? I hope so. I believe so with this group of guys."

Loving discussed how this year's team could be better than last year's.

"I think this team can still be better than last year's team as the season progresses," he said. "Last year, the team had a lot of experience with seven seniors. This year, we are on the complete opposite side. As we get some experience with some practice and a couple of meets under our belt, I believe that you will see improvement with this team.

"I told the guys at the beginning of the season that I will always meet them where they are at regardless of their experience, and I am excited to see where that leads us," Loving added.

There are a few important factors that will dictate how much success the Tornadoes have this spring.

"If we can focus on getting 1 percent better every day, success will come," Loving said. "A strong commitment to making one another each practice by giving maximum effort will help improve everyone."

Loving offered his insight on the Lakes Conference for this season.

"I am still familiarizing myself with other teams' players and returning players from last year as this is my first year with the boys," he said. "I know Spencer and Spirit Lake have been the two teams to run the table as of late. I would assume all other four teams have the edge on us in terms of experience. We are working to be the best team in the conference. There is no reason to not have that as an end goal. Once our foundational skills are mastered, I hope to have us reaching for new levels to meet those goals. depth there when needed. Right now, Kinnick will be the only one trying the high hurdles, but hopefully, the others will get more comfortable with trying the highs."

Tokheim measured what the team's potential strengths will be entering the season.

"Our biggest strength is our depth," he said. "We have 42 guys out and we will be able to put someone in every event that can compete at the varsity level and possibly score points. 



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

"Our distance runners have gained an



Kohn gave an assessment of the hurdles and sprints.


