

Run production will be key for Storm Lake's baseball success

Pitching will more than likely give Storm Lake a chance to win. It's the run production that needs to improve to allow for those opportunities to win games.

Storm Lake averaged 3.6 runs a game last season, and if that number would have been a run-and-a-half more, the Tornadoes would have been undefeated in the Lakes.


That's been the focus heading into this season and it will be a huge factor in how much success Storm Lake has this summer.

"To be competitive and be in the race for a conference title, we have to bring consistency and aggressiveness at the plate each night," Storm Lake coach Michael Knapp said. "Our pitchers will give us a chance to win. It will most likely be up to our at-bats. Last summer, if we averaged 5.0 runs per game rather than our 3.6, we would've gone undefeated in the conference. That has been a big focus for us preparing for this season."

Storm Lake, which went 12-13 last season, returns first team alldistrict and first team all-conference pitcher Charlie Dvergsten, infielder Brock Edwards, all-conference honorable mention catcher David Gon-

There are several top prospects who will help fill the void left by the loss of last year's starters. They include Trey Boettcher, Rylan Richardson, Peyton Phillips, Bryson Harder, Azael Garcia and Carson Taylor.

Knapp measured the team's potential strengths coming into the season, which begins on Monday at Ridge View.

"Our pitching staff will be the strength of this year's team," he said. "We have many guys stepping into different roles who have worked really hard this preseason and shown a lot of potential."

However, there are a few question marks with the team.

"Inexperience in our lineup is going to be a question mark," Knapp said. "With just five upperclassmen on the roster, we will rely on several young kids to carry large roles this season."

Knapp discussed how this year's team could be better than the one from a year ago.

"I think this year's team can use their speed and athleticism to give opponents trouble," he said. "It will take some time developing our young hitters, but this group plays aggressive and can do a lot of different things on the bases. That dynamic play style can help our offense improve."

Knapp assessed how the Tornadoes will be offensively.

"Our offense will be the big question mark as to how this summer will go," he said. "We return one player with multiple years of varsity experience, five players with one year playing varsity, and the rest of

our team will be getting their first varsity action. Being comfortable and confident at the plate will be important for us, and will dictate how much success we can expect this summer."

The Tornadoes should be better defensively.

"We've done a good job defensively so far this preseason," Knapp said. "We will have our guys in more natural positions this year than last, and that will really help us when fielding a lineup."

The pitching staff will be the team's best asset.

"Pitching should be our strength this season," Knapp said. "Our top six arms have done a nice job improving as the preseason has unfolded. They all provide a unique skill set that will be fun to pair as starters and relievers.

There are a few important fac-

tors that will dictate how much success the Tornadoes have this season.

"The results we can get from our offense is the biggest factor," Knapp said. "If we can average five runs per game or higher, our pitchers will put us in a position to win almost every night. We have to find a way to string together quality at-bats consistently to produce more runs."

Knapp gave his insight on the conference.

"ELC lost a talented group of seniors, but they are always fielding competitive teams and staying in the mix for the championship," he said. "Spencer and Spirit Lake will be tough challenges as well, and playing Cherokee is never an easy task. It is a very competitive league despite being just five teams. We can finish at the top if we get the run production we are setting goals for."

Also back are catcher Brayden Marshall, utility player Gabe Olsen, first baseman Maddux McCov and outfielder Payton Syndergaard.


Angus Miller, Cale Sievers, Tilman Bern and Alex Daughenbaugh are among the players who could increase their contributions from last year.

the leap and pitch big innings. I think we will be scrappy at the plate and compete to drive in runs."

"We have 11 freshmen and 10 eighth graders who will be working hard to push the upperclassmen and earn varsity positions. Throughout the spring open gyms, we had seven pitchers and five catchers who worked hard to get better."

Peterson measured the team's strengths entering the season.

"Our best strength this year is our numbers," she said. "We have 31 girls playing at three different levels. Strong numbers will bring competition at each position, pushing

everyone to be their best, which will inevitably make our team stronger." However, there are some ques-

tion marks with the Warriors.

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
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
