

Invitations Set the Scene

SELECTING A WEDDING INVITATION HAS NEVER BEEN EASIER... BUT ALSO MORE CHALLENGING! ANYTHING GOES THESE DAYS, FROM ETCHING ON REAL WOOD TO GOLD-IN-FUSED GLITTER BOMBS. BUT WITH SO MANY ALTERNATIVES, HOW DO YOU CHOOSE THE RIGHT DESIGN AND WORDING FOR THIS IMPORTANT MESSAGE?

Your invitation should set the tone for your wedding, reflecting its theme and colors as well as your own personality. If you are at the invitation stage of your wedding plans, most likely you have already made significant decisions such as the date, time, place and theme of your special day. Now all you have to do is choose how the invitation will reflect those choices.

Although your parents may encourage you to stick with a traditional white or cream formal invitation and your grandmother might not enjoy a glitter spray upon opening the envelope, remember the invitation is your guests' first preview of your wedding day. Just as an invitation to a destination wedding on the beach should be reflected in a simple casual design, a formal invitation implies that your guests should not wear jeans and a t-shirt.

Contemporary invitation trends are diverse. There are so many options from DIY designs to reviewing books of samples at a wedding supply business. The current trend is to make your invitation "something unique, something special and something that delivers a message about the bride and groom."

And don't forget about the envelope liners. More and more couples are using the inner layer of their invitation as a place to add graphics and/or messages or to emphasize the wedding's color theme. If you can't decide between formal and fun, compromise by making the liner memorable. A metallic foil, a floral patterned print or a map can provide that extra personal touch.

The Market Hall, located within the Colleton Museum and Farmers Market, offers an inviting and spacious wedding venue situated in the heart of historic downtown Walterboro.

The indoor area of the Market Hall can seat 100-120 guests for formal dining; however, the option of opening three overhead doors leading into the covered outdoor area of Farmers Market leads to endless opportunities for larger guest lists.

When it comes to catering, the venue has several options available on site. A small prep kitchen, ideal for food setup and storage, is just steps away from the party. Should catering require a larger space or access to a full kitchen, the Colleton Commercial Kitchen is located on site and offers caterers a bevy of options at their fingertips.

"With the addition of the Colleton Commer-

cial Kitchen, the availability of caterers and custom cakes is greater than ever before," said Matt Mardell, director. "In the kitchen, A Soulful Taste has proven popular for both catering and cakes, but now there is also a surge of new food truck businesses coming in with similar capabilities. Parking in downtown Walterboro is not a concern for those considering the Market

"Before the museum came along, there were limited choices for a local wedding space," said Mardell. At this point in the wedding game, there's not much that's off the table. Archaic wedding rules should be broken, if that means making your big day more "you". But for every traditional rule you should toss, there are a few that should actually be followed — from sticking to your budget to buying a dress you can sit down in and everything in between.

Wedding planning can be overwhelming as it is, and following these rules will help lessen the stress that comes with such a special day. Here are 25 golden wedding rules — take note!

1. Set a budget and stick with it.

It's easy to get into a warped mindset about money when you're planning a wedding and talking about thousands of dollars (or more!) at a time. Anything that's not thousands of dollars starts to feel "affordable" so it's easy to say yes to a lot of "small" purchases in the \$100-\$500 range. But here's the ugly truth: Those smaller purchases add up really fast and can leave you way, way over budget. So, be realistic about all of your wedding spending and make sure to stay organized and on top of how much you're actually spending.

2. If you send a save the date, you must send an invitation.

If you're on the fence about inviting someone to your wedding, then skip sending them the save the date in the first place. And even if you already know someone you're inviting can't make the wedding, still send them a save the date and invitation so they know they're included.



3. Be clear about you guests' plus ones.

If you know the name of a guest's plus one, be sure to include it on the invitation so they know they're truly welcome at your big day. Otherwise, if you're allowing your guests to bring a plus one of their choosing, "and Guest" on the invitation will suffice.

4. Make sure to triple check your seating chart.

Thumbtack wedding planner Renee Steelman told us: "Seating charts can either be heaven sent or a nightmare. Although

seating charts are created to make the day easy and the dinner hour flow, one thing that brides rarely do is triple check their work. When finalizing the wedding details, do not neglect your seating chart and make sure to not over look name spellings, table numbers, the amount of guests per table, or even guests disabilities or health situations. In addition, make sure to make numerous copies of your seating chart for your wedding planner and your catering company to have on hand in case of an emergency."

5. Make it easy for your guests to RSVP.

This means include postage on your RSVP card. Or, if you're having guests RSVP online on your wedding website, make that very clear and easy. Remember not all of your guests spend their lives on the Internet — grandparent types might need some assistance.



6. Don't include registry info on your wedding invite.

Just don't. If you create a wedding website, include your wedding registry info on it and provide a link from your save the date and invitation.

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tradition (and perhaps make your grandma mad) and make the day truly about you.

12. Buy a diess you can actually sit in.


