





Be the "good flavor" – CCHS holds Class of 2021 Commencement

In an exceptional year filled with hurdles along the way due to COVID-19, Colleton County High School held the Class of 2021 Commencement Ceremony Saturday, June 19, 2021, at Cougar Stadium at 8:30 a.m. With limited tickets for graduates, the ceremony was the culminating event for the Class of 2021 who started the year virtually, then went hybrid and finished in-person.

The Class of 2021 had 244 ranked graduates that combined for \$13,274,358.00 in scholarship offers which included external, institutional, Palmetto Fellow, Life, and Hope Scholarships. There were seven Distinguished Honor Graduates with a minimum 4.9 GPA or higher and 23 Honor Graduates with a cumulative GPA between 4.5-4.89

The Class of 2020 boasted 43 National Honor Society Members and 28 students earned an Honor's Certificate. Additionally, there were 125 Career and Technology Completers.

Following the Processional of Graduates through Cougar Field House, the Presentation of Colors was given by the Colleton County High School NJROTC along with the National Anthem.

Recognition of Memorial Honorees included Ja'Kye Kayshawn Butler, Ali Jamani DuBois, Juliun Scott Guy, and Donaisha Angeliah Kelly.

Third Honor Graduate, Ian Patrick McLaughlin, gave the Invocation.

The Colleton County High School Chorus presented a musical selection entitled "You Raise Me Up," followed by the Recognition of Military Enlistees totaling six-plus.

Svdney Mackenzie Howard, Salutatorian, welcomed guests saying, "It is my pleasure to welcome students, families, faculty, and staff here today. Graduates, today is the final step in our journey through high school. This journey was by no means easy, especially in this past year. The COVID-19 pandemic affected all aspects of our lives, like school, work, travel, friendships, family stability, and mental health. Though it was rough on everyone, we can finally see the light at the end of the tunnel quickly approaching. Even though we are all happy to be vaccinated, maskless, and getting back into our normal lives, we should never forget the people who did not get to this point. She is working to provide and design a pilot program to partner with the Colleton County Recreation Center to begin therapeutic recreational activities like basketball, pickleball, and track and field. Lockerman said she needs volunteers and help to implement the program.

Project Search is a Transition-to-Work program led by teacher Karen Lockerman that helps special needs teens learn how to gain real-life work experience.

This program assists high school seniors with significant intellectual and developmental disabilities participate in employment preparation for one-year on a job site. The student interns have a combination of classroom instruction, career exploration and hands-on training at a worksite.

The goal for each intern is successful employment, so students gain real-life work experience, training and independent-living skills. Teens with special needs are able to transition to productive adult life.

Special Needs instructor Karen Lockerman, under the auspices of Colleton County School District's Department of Special Services, has successfully implemented this program at CCHS and Walmart for over a year along with Lynn Marcom of Vocational Rehabilitation.

"This program has been so successful. Project Search provides the life training skills that our students need, and Walmart has been so wonderful in helping us," said Lockerman.

sities. They work with Vocational Rehabilitation and the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs to get support beyond school.

Graduate Caleb Cox said he loves Project Search. "I like everything about it," said Cox.

Lockerman said the program has one more year until the grand ends. "It has been a such win for Walmart as well as the kids that we plan to continue it," said Lockerman.

To honor these special needs seniors, Walmart held the graduation there and served lunch to the graduates and their families. The students were visibly excited and full of smiles as they received their certificates acknowledging 12 years of attendance in school. Karen Lockerman will continue with the program but will also be a facilitator working with CCSD Department of Special Services to expand opportunities for these special needs children," said Parish.
